# Program Motes and Translations

## Voi Che Sapete – from The Marriage of Figaro, by W.A. Mozart (You Who Know)

This famous aria is sung by the young page Cherubino in *The Marriage of Figaro*. The song expresses the confusing and intense feeling of puberty and first love as Cherubino describes his newfound desires and emotional turmoil to the Countess and Susanna. The aria serves as a commentary on adolescence, infatuation, and the bewildering journey of discovering romantic emotions.

You who know what love is, Ladies, see if it is in my heart. I'll tell you what I feel; It's new to me. and I don't understand it.

I feel an emotion, full of desire, That is now pleasure, and now suffering. I freeze, and then I feel my soul go up in flames; And in a moment, I turn to ice. I search for something outside of myself, I don't know what it is or how to hold it. I sigh and groan without wanting to; I quiver and tremble without knowing why. I find no peace night or day, But I like to languish this way.

You who know what love is, Ladies, see if it is in my heart.

## Parto, Parto – from La Clemenza di Tito, by W.A. Mozart (I depart, I depart)

This aria is sung by Sesto, a male character played by a mezzo-soprano in what is known as a "trouser role" (a male character that is sung and acted by a female singer). The scene takes place in Act 1. Sesto is in love with Vitellia, who, in a fit of rage, has commanded Sesto to assassinate the Roman emperor, Tito. In the aria, Sesto wrestles with his conscience but ultimately agrees to carry out her request to win her affection. The aria is renowned for its prominent obbligato basset-clarinet part, which interacts with the mezzo-soprano's vocal line.

## Je Ris de Me Voir – from Faust, by Charles Gounod (The Jewel Song)

The Jewel Song is an aria from Charles Gounod's opera Faust. The aging scholar Faust believes he has wasted his life and longs to be young again. In a deal with Mephistopheles, Faust sells his soul to the devil and in return is transformed into a handsome young man. When he falls in love with the beautiful young Marguerite, he soon finds that having all that you desire comes with a price. In this scene, Marguerite tries on the jewels delivered by Mephistopheles as a gift from Faust and is captivated by how they enhance her beauty, as she sings in the famous aria, the Jewel Song (Ah! Je ris de me voir se belle en ce miroir).

## Senza Mamma – from Suor Angelica, by Giacomo Puccini (Without mother)

Senza Mamma is a heart-wrenching aria from Puccini's opera, Suor Angelica. The aria expresses the profound grief of Sister Angelica as she learns that her son has died and laments that he died without his mother by his side. The aria is known for its emotional depth, masterful composition, and is considered one of the most beautiful arias Puccini ever wrote for a soprano.

Without a mother, My baby, you died! Your lips, without my kisses grew pale and cold!

And you closed, My baby, your beautiful eyes! Not being able to caress me, You folded your little hands in a cross!

And you died without knowing How much your mother loved you!

## Duo des Fleurs – from Lakmé, by Léo Delibes (The Flower Duet)

The Flower Duet is a duet for soprano and mezzo-soprano in the first act of the tragic opera Lakmé, which premiered in Paris in 1883. It is sung by the characters Lakmé, daughter of a Brahmin priest, and her servant Mallika, as they go to gather flowers by a river.

Song to the Moon comes from Antonín Dvořák's opera, Rusalka, an opera based on the fairy tales of Karel Jaromir Erben and Bozena Nemcova. This particular aria is sung by the title character Rusalka, in the opera's first act. Rusalka is the daughter of a water-goblin who wants nothing more than to be human after she falls in love with a hunter/prince who frequents the lake in which she lives. Rusalka sings this song asking the moon to reveal her love to the prince.

## Quando Me'n Vo' – from La Bohème, by Giacomo Puccini (When I Go)

Quando Me'n Vo' is sung by Musetta, in the presence of her bohemian friends, hoping to reclaim the attention of her occasional boyfriend Marcello. The scene takes place at Café Momus. Shortly after Mimi, Rodolfo, and their friends have taken seats for a drink, Marcello's former girlfriend, Musetta shows up with her current patron, the elderly Alcindoro. They quarrel for a bit, then the episode begins as Musetta initiates her move on Marcello. She grabs the spotlight, musically speaking, for the short self-promoting aria.

## O Mio Babbino Caro – from Gianni Schicchi, by Giacomo Puccini (Oh my dear Papa)

This aria is sung by Lauretta after tensions between her father Schicchi and the family of Rinuccio, the boy she loves, have reached a breaking point that threatens to separate her from Rinuccio. It provides an interlude expressing lyrical simplicity and love in contrast with the atmosphere of hypocrisy, jealousy, double-dealing, and feuding in medieval Florence.

## Je Veux Vivre – from Romeo and Juliet, by Charles Gounod (I Want to Live)

This is Juliet's first aria, and she sings it after her nurse *yet again* brings up the fact that she has to get married to Paris. Juliet is young, and that can either mean she's giddy and excitable, or that she's nervous and insecure about things like arranged marriages and being only 13 or so.

#### Elsa's Procession to the Cathedral - from Lohengrin, by Richard Wagner

Wagner finished the opera *Lohengrin* in 1848. It tells the story of Elsa, a princess in Brabant (what we now call Antwerp), who is rescued and wedded by a knight in shining armor who insists on remaining nameless. Drama and tragedy ensue, ending with the death of several characters in typical Wagnerian fashion. *Elsa's Procession to the Cathedral* comes at the end of Act II, when Elsa is on her way to be married to the knight, who we later learn is Lohengrin, knight of the Holy Grail.

#### Carmen Suite No 1 and 2, by Georges Bizet

*Carmen* is an opera in four acts by the French composer Georges Bizet. The opera was first performed in Paris on 3 March 1875, where its breaking of conventions shocked and scandalized its first audiences. Bizet died suddenly after the 33<sup>rd</sup> performance, unaware that the work would achieve international acclaim with the following ten years. *Carmen* has since become one of the most popular and frequently performed operas with the *Habañera* and *Seguidilla* from Act 1 and the *Toréador Song* from Act 2 being among the best known of all operatic arias.

In the Seguidilla, Carmen is in jail for disturbing the peace. She is trying to seduce her guard, Don José, into letting her escape – and it works! She only intends to get out of jail, but he thinks she is proposing a long-term relationship and deserts his post to be with her. When the famous toreador Escamillo comes to town, Carmen leaves Don José to be with him, but the jealous soldier tracks her down and murders her during the bullfight.

We'll dance the Seguidilla and we will drink Manzanilla, Tra-la-la-la-la-la-la-la, Tra-la-la-la-la-la-la-la-la-la-la-ah! Habañera is a bold and beautiful statement from the title character. She opens with "Love is a rebellious bird that no one can tame." Translations vary describing the bird, but one thing is consistent, no one can tame it. While the early audiences of *Carmen* in 1875 were unsure how to receive the complex and controversial characters, the opera has become a standard, and *Habañera* has become its most recognizable area.

#### Dance of the Comedians - from The Bartered Bride, by Bedřich Smetana

The Bartered Bride is a comic opera in three acts that is generally regarded as a major contribution towards the development of Czech music. Set in a country village and with realistic characters, it tells the story of how, after a late surprise revelation, true love prevails over the combined efforts of ambitious parents and a scheming marriage broker.

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Admission tickets cover only a small share of the orchestra's costs, which is why Symphony in the Valley depends on the generosity of individuals, businesses, and foundations to present each year's concert season.

Behind the scenes, the orchestra pays for equipment and services that make each concert special, including music purchases and special arrangements, lighting and sound, piano tuning, storage space, transport, insurance, archive recordings, and venue rental. The Symphony also offers multiple Special Programs to foster music participation and scholarships.

Donations of any amount are greatly appreciated and vital to helping the Symphony achieve its mission of enriching our community through live musical performance.

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## Symphony in the Valley is proud to offer the following auxiliary programs to benefit young musicians in the Valley

**Instrument Lending Program:** Symphony in the Valley teams with local music educators to provide and/or repair instruments to any high-need middle or high school student that wishes to participate in their school's music program. We recognize that cost is often a barrier to participating in the arts and hope this program allows more students the chance to learn an instrument.

**Student Enrichment Program:** Symphony in the Valley collaborates with local music educators to identify students with musical promise that could benefit from additional instruction.
