Freres Lumber donated the plywood needed in this project for wall and floor construction. A groundbreaking ceremony of the family's home was held June 25. Nayeli has completed 176 hours in volunteer sweat equity including construction of other Habitat homes, homeowner education, and other volunteer opportunities. This represents more than ½ of the total hours required by the Habitat program—and they are just beginning to build their own home! When their home is completed, the Navarrete Bravo family will have contributed at least 300 hours in sweat equity. Truly, this family is making an investment in their future.
