Church on the Hooch

Music Notes

Today's choir anthem, "Here, O My Lord," was composed by our Minister of Music, Darian Krimm, and his collaborator, J.B. Taylor. The anthem was inspired by Horatius Bonar's rich communion text, written in 1855. The music features a newly composed melody supported sensitive vocal lines and a beautiful piano accompaniment.

Organ music this morning is attributed to Johann Sebastian Bach from the collection, "Eight Little Preludes and Fugues," so-named for the relative brevity and by extension lesser development as found in other of Bach's works. In recent years notable scholars have asserted it is more likely that the pieces were composed by one of Bach's students—primarily Johann Ludwig Krebs—though there is debate on exactly who. Others debate whether the works were composed for organ or pedal clavichord. Adding to the mystery is that the works were not published until long after Bach's death; and unlike other of his great works relatively few manuscripts were in circulation at the time. Nonetheless, throughout the years the eight pieces, each of which tends to highlight on a particular compositional form or style reminiscent of other composers (Handel, Corelli, Frescobaldi, et al), have been exceptionally popular as teaching material and, indeed, service offerings.
