Welcome to St Aidan's! Thank you for sharing your worship with us. We pray you will experience God's presence in our worship and hope you join us again. If this is your first time with us, relax and simply follow along with those around you. Please fill out a guest information card located on the chair shelf, or sign the guest register on your way out. A few tips...

- We all use Name Tags to help us not only get to know our visitors more easily, and vice versa, but to refresh our memories about who we are. If you do not have a name tag, please fill one out for yourself and place it on your chest. Name tags supplies may be found in the green satchel on the shelf of the chair in front of you. If you desire a permanent name tag, sign up near the name tag wall in Dietel Hall (no cost).



WHY DO WE ANGLICANS USE BLUE FOR ADVENT?

Blue paraments and vestments were primarily popular in Scandinavia and the British Isles. "Sarum blue" according to the English Sarum rite (11th to 16th cen.) was a darker hue than what's used at St Aidan's. This color is often favored due to its resemblance to the night sky just before dawn. There are many references to the night sky when we read about Christmas: angels appearing to the shepherds, a star guiding the Wise Men, and even the nighttime flight of Mary and Joseph, carrying the baby Jesus, to Egypt. Like the nighttime appearances of good news, this time just before dawn signals hope and a new beginning. Those who favor blue as their Advent color ask themselves whether we should really be thinking about this season as a strictly penitential season or one of expectation, hope and joy; the beginning of a new year in the life of the Church. Scholars also point out that blue dye was cheaper for centuries, and more readily available in northern climates. Blue is also the color of Mary, who bore the Savior of the world. Of course, Advent is partially about her, and from this standpoint, blue is very much considered a proper color.

Today we light the first candle of the Advent wreath.


Each candle has a meaning.



"Rejoice, O Gentiles, with his people"; and again,


> "Praise the Lord, all you Gentiles, and let all the peoples praise him";

THE GOSPEL MATTHEW 3:1-12

The Holy Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ according to Matthew.

People: Glory to you, Lord Christ.

In those days John the Baptist appeared in the wilderness of Judea, proclaiming, "Repent, for the kingdom of heaven has come near." This is the one of whom the prophet Isaiah spoke when he said,

"The voice of one crying out in the wilderness:

'Prepare the way of the Lord, make his paths straight."

Now John wore clothing of camel's hair with a leather belt around his waist, and his food was locusts and wild honey. Then the people of Jerusalem and all Judea were going out to him, and all the region along the Jordan, and they were baptized by him in the river Jordan, confessing their sins.

But when he saw many Pharisees and Sadducees coming for baptism, he said to them, "You brood of vipers! Who warned you to flee from the wrath to come? Bear fruit worthy of repentance. Do not presume to say to yourselves, 'We have Abraham as our ancestor'; for I tell you, God is able from these stones to raise up children to Abraham. Even now the ax is lying at the root of the trees; every tree therefore that does not bear good fruit is cut down and thrown into the fire.



The people remain standing. The Celebrant, whether bishop or priest, faces them and sings or says:

Celebrant The Lord be with you.

People And also with you.

Lift up your hearts.

We lift them to the Lord.

Let us give thanks to the Lord our God.

It is right to give him thanks and praise.

It is right, and a good and joyful thing, always and everywhere to give thanks to you, Father Almighty, Creator of heaven and earth; because you gave Jesus Christ, your only Son, to be born for

us; who, by the mighty power of the Holy Spirit, was made perfect Man of the flesh of the Virgin Mary his mother; so that we might be delivered from the bondage of sin, and receive power to become your children. Therefore we praise you, joining our voices with Angels and Archangels and with all the company of heaven, who for ever sing this hymn to proclaim the glory of your Name:




We give thanks to you, O God, for the goodness and love which you have made known to us in creation; in the calling of Israel to be your people; in your Word spoken through the prophets; and above all in the Word made flesh, Jesus, your Son. For in these last days you sent him to be incarnate from the Virgin Mary, to be the Savior and Redeemer of the world. In him, you have

delivered us from evil, and made us worthy to stand before you. In him, you have brought us out of error into truth, out of sin into righteousness, out of death into life.

Therefore, according to his command, O Father,





The gifts of God for the people of God.


THE COMMUNION The ministers receive the Sacrament, and then immediately deliver it to the people.

All who desire a deeper walk with Christ are welcome at the altar for Holy Communion.

- At this time the wine is being received by sipping or intinction (dipping the bread in the wine before eating it).

 Please be mindful to not let fingers touch the wine when intincting the bread.
- If you wish to receive the bread only and not the wine cross arms over your chest as the chalice is presented to you.
- If you need gluten-free bread, please inform the priest at the altar rail.
- If you do not wish to receive Communion but rather desire a blessing, cross arms over chest at the altar rail.
- If you do not wish to receive Communion at this time you may choose to remain in your pew for prayer.
- If you are not baptized but want to explore becoming baptized, please let someone, like an usher, know.

 A priest will be delighted to work with you and talk with you about next steps.


send us now into the world in peace, and grant us strength and courage to love and serve you with gladness and singleness of heart; through Christ our Lord. Amen.
