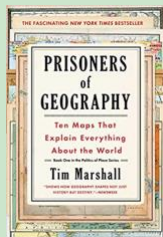
Old Man Winter Stole Autumn

I don't know about you, but it seems like the 90-degree days we had through October stole my favorite season, Fall, pretty quickly. While we can expect enjoyable temperatures for football weather, the first frost has come and gone and we can expect that to be the norm for nighttime temperatures pretty routinely from now on. So let's go through our checklist for winterizing:

- Remove dirt from hand tools, sand off any rust, check the integrity of their handles and repair if necessary and move them to a dry place for winter storage.
- Rakes, shovels, pitch forks and hoes should also be cleaned of dirt, but now is the time to honestly assess whether they have outlived their useful lives (nothing worse than a long handle breaking and flipping back at your face). If they're good, sand off rough spots of wooden parts, clean rust off metal and store them safely with tines and sharp edges against walls or structures. By the way, you might want to sharpen the tips of shovels and hoes now so that they're ready for use as soon as spring chores call.
- Blades on hand pruners, hedgers and clippers need special attention. Remove any clippings and then sharpen. Treat springs with oil to protect against rust. Hand pruners can be expensive but there are readily available kits online to replace working parts and/or blades. You can look up easy tutorials or stop by our ACES office for a quick lesson—just give me a call beforehand.
- Leather gloves for pruning or other hard gardening work are also an investment, often received as a gardener's favorite gift. Protect the palm part of the glove with a dab of linseed (or other plant-based) oil. Store the gloves flat or rolled, but don't fold them as creases can cause cracks in the leather.
- Empty clay pots, sterilize in a dilute bleach solution and store in a dry location for winter. Drain concrete bird baths and pots and turn on their sides so they don't collect any more water this season. And while you're thinking of birds, remove your hummingbird feeders, sterilize your seed feeders, add suet and, most importantly, make sure birds have a reliable, shallow water feeder for winter.
- And the best general advice for the garden is remove diseased plant parts and leaves, mulch permanent plantings, water well, and trust that Spring is just around the corner.

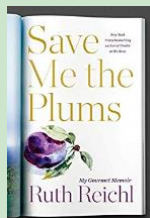
