

PANDEMICS IN THE PAST

People of the past and the present endure many of the same experiences, just in different times. Just as those in the past braced for the Spanish Influenza to hit Windsor in 1918, we too have experienced the anxiety and dread of the inevitable.

As expected, in 1918 the first wave of illness arrived in October and by December, the full effects of the flu were being realized. According to a Poudre Valley Newspaper article published on December 26, 1918, Windsor's death rate from the flu was 15 for every 1,000 people. That was two to three times the death rate of larger cities such as New York (4.1), Philadelphia (7.4), Pittsburg (6.3) and Chicago (3.5). Windsor was in a dire situation, however there was some hope.

The first "anti-flu serums" arrived to doctors in Windsor in December 1918. Reports of the effectiveness of the vaccine were touted and a free vaccine clinic was offered to Windsorites. 248 people were inoculated at the free clinic, dozens more were being privately treated by local doctors, and workers at the Sugar Factory had received their vaccines as well. Flu cases continued into March 1919, but the worst was over by the end of January.

Studying history gives us insight not only into the past, but also into our present. We have the opportunity to learn from those who have lived through similar experiences throughout history by remembering their stories and passing them on.




