Recently I officiated at three funerals in three months at Immanuel. The time around a funeral is sacred time, accompanying people at the end of their lives, along with the loved ones they leave behind. Each death we experience anticipates our own death, bringing into sharper focus the end that is before us all.

November is a month of endings. The cooler weather and falling leaves remind us that autumn will soon be ending as it gives way to winter.

And while December is the end of the calendar year, November marks the end of the church year.


While endings can be difficult, they take on new significance for us in the church. For Martin Luther there were two kinds of death—a little death and a big death. The big death takes place in baptism when our old self dies. Sin and death are drowned and no longer have power over us. We are joined in Christ's death and resurrection to live freely as saints, forgiven children of God. Saved through God in Jesus Christ we have nothing to fear knowing that nothing can separate us from God's love. We can therefore face the little death, physical death, with hope, trusting that in the end is a new beginning.

With that hope we gather to celebrate All Saints Sunday on November 3rd. As we remember those who have died, bringing pictures and memorabilia to display, as we call out their names and light candles, the communion of saints surround and encourage us to keep the faith. So that on the final Sunday of the church year, November 24, we can say with confidence that not only our individual endings but the end of this world itself will bring a new beginning where Christ reigns forever. Alleluia!



Build Us Up, Lord! By Renée Bergquist, ReJuv Committee


Current Financial Status - \$84,740 Needed to Pay Off Loan by January 2021!

Our current Loan Balance as of September 30, 2019 is \$248,316 plus monthly interest of \$799.

Through our **Build Us Up, Lord!** Capital Campaign we have received over \$1,156,590 through September 30. We have \$124,009 in pledges still to be received and \$7,497 BUUL Cash on Hand plus the \$45,000 reserve for one year of loan payments.

This year, we have received additional gifts of \$146,000 which, in addition to our minimum monthly loan payments, have helped to significantly reduce our loan principal. As of September 30, 2019, our current gap between funds given/pledged and the final project cost is \$72,609. In other words, if all pledges were completed today, we would still need additional funds of \$72,609 to pay off the loan.

Our goal is to pay off our loan by January 2021. We have extended the Capital Campaign to December 2020 to raise the additional \$84,740 needed to close the gap (\$72,609) and cover the additional interest through January 2021 (\$12,132). With the generosity of our members and friends, we continue to make amazing progress in paying down our loan this year!



COVENANT OF CONDUCT

From the Church Council

At their October meeting, the Church Council approved a Covenant of Conduct (see below) for Immanuel Lutheran Church (ILC). This covenant is an outgrowth of the *Healthy Congregations* workshop presented earlier this year for the ILC congregation by Immanuel member and Retired Pastor Jim Grunow. One of the goals of this workshop, which was attended by Council members, committee/ministry team chairs, Immanuel Staff (including Pastor Gretchen), and other members, was to "promote healthy communication within the community". Our "community" is everyone inside and outside of Immanuel Lutheran Church with whom we interact and communicate on a daily basis.

The Church Council invites you to carefully read and think about how you can incorporate these healthy communication guidelines into your community. We will all benefit from open, honest, respectful and healthy communication as we continue our journey as a *Healthy Congregation*. A copy of this Covenant of Conduct will be posted on the wall outside the Library, next to pictures of the Church Council.

COVENANT OF CONDUCT

Immanuel Lutheran Church - Boise, Idaho
Our Purpose Statement: "We share God's gift of love with all."

We affirm the right of every member to express their ideas, opinions or concerns about the life and ministry of our congregation. To promote open, honest, respectful and healthy communication within the community, these guidelines will be followed:

- 1. Leaders within the congregation will seek to continually listen to those they serve—members and friends of Immanuel as well as those in the wider community. They will also listen for God's voice through Scripture and prayer in order to fulfill our purpose.
- 2. Members are encouraged to routinely express their gratitude to one another regarding positive experiences in the life and ministry of the congregation. Members are also encouraged to express their concerns that may arise from time to time.
- 3. When a member expresses a concern to a chairperson, ministry team leader, staff person, council member, or another member, that leadership person, staff person or member shall ask, "What would you like me to do with this information?"
- 4. If the member with a concern desires to have the information transmitted to a chairperson, ministry team leader, staff member or council member, the concerned member shall be invited to bring that information directly to that person or to the next meeting of that group. The time and date of the next meeting for that group shall be given to them.
- 5. If the member does not wish to appear in person, the leadership person shall ask the member for permission to use their name in reporting. The member may also be invited to share their concern in writing and sign it to be certain their concern is communicated accurately.
- 6. If permission is <u>not</u> given and the member declines to share their concern in writing and sign it, the leadership person shall say, "I'm sorry, but I will not be able to report this to (name of person or group) since we do not deal with anonymous letters, comments or concerns."
- 7. If permission is given, the leadership person shall report the concern/idea/opinion to the person or group and use the member's name.
- 8. At his/her discretion, a leadership person may ask that the member refer the issue to an alternative leadership person for presentation.
- 9. When referred to a group, each concern shall be placed on the agenda and be subsequently reflected in the regular minutes of that group, citing any action taken by the committee, ministry team or Congregation Council.
- 10. The member initially expressing a concern shall be informed of any decision made or action taken in response to their concern.

This **Covenant of Conduct** guides us to grow into God's vision for the Church as the beloved community rooted in and built up in Jesus Christ our Savior and Lord.
