


Winter at Lee Memorial Garden

There's a lot to see when you take a walk in the woods in the winter. Tracks in the snow, winter birds on bare branches, and with the branches bare, evergreens become more evident to the eye.

Did you know Lee Memorial Garden has a Japanese Umbrella Pine? You can find it by entering the garden and walking along Wood Road. About half way down, on your right, you'll see this magnificent specimen. With the foliage surrounding it gone for the winter, you can walk right up to it and feel the large, plastic-like needles.
