Commemorating the Holy Sovereigns

Presider Today, we will share our holy meal together for the Feast of the Holy Sovereigns, King Kamehameha IV and Queen Emma. As we thank our Divine Creator for this meal, we give thanks for Queen Emma, who with King Kamehameha IV, graciously invited the Anglican / Episcopal Church to these islands.

In his recent address to the diocese, our Bishop said, “I acknowledge the trust they committed to our Church in 1862 to care for their people – Kānaka ‘Ōiwi – and all of the children of these Islands, and for our responsibility to care for all of creation.

As people of the Church invited to these islands, I deeply regret that we have not always fulfilled our responsibility through these many decades. We have often failed and turned a blind eye to those around us.

For those things which we as the Church and as individual Episcopalians have done and the many things we have left undone that contributed to the harm inflicted on nā Kānaka ‘Ōiwi and these islands, I offer our collective lamentation. I ask God’s forgiveness. I ask the prayers of our blessed ancestors and you, God’s people, that we, God’s Episcopal Church in Hawai‘i, will have the will and courage to better fulfill our responsibility – kā mākou kuleana – to the people of these Islands and to God’s creation.”

Today we recommit to our sacred responsibilities as we look upon this kāhili, which stands in a place of prominence to mark our hearts as we remember the Holy Sovereigns and the Kānaka ‘Ōiwi, especially Kim “Ki‘i” Nakamura and Mila Polevia, who shared their wisdom with Kohala.

Let us speak aloud the name of this kāhili:

Presider Pūlama i nā pu‘uwai o Emma,
People **To care for the hearts of Emma,**
Presider ke ali‘i lokomaika‘i o Honaula.
People **gracious royal of Honaula.**
Presider Mele e! Piha hau‘oli!
People **Sing! Complete joy!**

People **Of support, working together, and unity.**

Presider E pule kākou. Let us pray.
O God of creation: when we gather in this beautiful space, may we remember the ali‘i who invited this church and served these islands as we lament those things which we as the Church and as individual Episcopalians have done and the many things we have left undone that contributed to the harm inflicted on nā Kānaka ‘Ōiwi and these islands.
When we gaze upon this kāhili, may we fully commit to our responsibility – kā mākou kuleana – to the people of these Islands and to God’s creation.
May we always remember that we are called to be “a place to BE the love of God and to FEEL the love of God.” **Amen.**

The Breaking of the Bread

Instructions for receiving the sacraments

You are invited to come up, row by row, to receive the sacraments of bread and wine.

The usher will guide you. If you would like to receive communion at your seat, please tell the usher; the priest and deacon will come to you.

At the font

The waters of our font remind us of the waters that flow mauka to makai through this ahupua'a – a place we enjoy with respect and honor for the Ali'i who granted us permission to care for this 'āina.

Through this water, we are connected to the 'āina, God, and one another. We pause at the font to remember our baptismal vows that recall us to our Creator and remind us to care for all people in this community, in our diocese, and all creation. In remembrance of the sacrament of baptism, we anoint one another.

At the font, you are invited to anoint the person behind you by dipping a finger in the water and making a small cross on their forehead. Anointing is voluntary. If you prefer not to do this, simply cross your arms and the priest will anoint the person behind you.

Receiving the bread and wine

To receive the bread (also called the host), extend your hands with palms flat, one on top of the other. The priest will place the host on your palm with the words "The Body of Christ, the Bread of heaven." Please indicate if you would prefer gluten-free.

To receive the wine, you may drink directly from the chalice. The deacon will say "the Blood of Christ, the cup of Salvation."

If you prefer, you may dip a small part the host in the wine. This is called intinction. Please dip carefully so that your fingers do not touch the wine. The deacon will say "the Body and Blood of our Lord Jesus Christ keep you in everlasting life."

Receiving Bread only

If you do not wish to partake in the wine, simply cross your arms over your chest. Consuming the host is considered the full sacrament of Holy Communion.

Receiving a blessing

If you do not wish to receive either the bread or the wine but would like a blessing, you are invited to come forward, arms crossed, to receive the blessing.



The History of the Anglican/Episcopal Church in Hawai'i

The King and Queen's Church:

Ka Hale Pule a Na Mo'i, 'o Kamehameha 'Aha lama 'o Kaleleonalani



King Kamehameha IV and Queen Emma were Christian rulers who encouraged the building of Christian schools and hospitals and who contributed greatly to the spread of Christianity among the Hawaiian people.

The King was worried by the growth of American political influence, directly connected with the work of American missionaries, many of whom openly favored annexation of

the islands by the United States. He accordingly invited the Church of England to send missionaries and to establish a presence in Hawaii. (While touring England as a prince, he had attended worship services, and had been favorably impressed.)

But, although the King's support of the Church of England was perhaps politically motivated, his support of Christianity was not. He and his wife were earnest in their devotion to both the material and the spiritual welfare of their people. The King personally translated the Book of Common Prayer and much of the Hymnal into Hawaiian. Their only son died in 1863, and the King died, apparently of grief, on 30 November 1864. The Queen devoted the remainder of her life to charitable endeavors (Queen's Hospital, the largest civilian hospital in Hawaii, is largely her doing). She died in 1885.

The King and Queen gave land, part of their royal garden, on which the Cathedral was to be built. While planning and fund-raising began, a small Pro-Cathedral was constructed of wood; this would remain in use for more than twenty years, the time it would take for the first phase of the cathedral to reach completion. The untimely death of King Kamehameha IV on St. Andrew's Day, November 30, 1863, led his brother, King Kamehameha V, to dedicate the cathedral to St. Andrew as a fitting memorial to a King.



The first twenty years were a struggle for money, men, and materials, but with the aid of staunch supporters, the first phase of the Cathedral was completed in time for Christmas 1886, in great part because of the support for the Queen's vision of the Cathedral as a memorial to her husband. Queen Emma did not live to worship in the Cathedral. She had died the previous year on St. Mark's Day 1885.

The King and Queen dedicated their marriage to serving the health, educational, and spiritual needs of their people. To these ends they founded The Queen's Hospital (now The Queen's Medical Center), several schools, including The St. Andrew's Priory School for Girls (now The St. Andrew's Schools, with separate programs for boys and girls) and St. Alban's School (now 'Iolani School), and were instrumental in bringing the Anglican church to the islands to provide access to a form of Christian spirituality that the King felt was eminently suited to the character and temperament of his people.

In recognition and commemoration of these deeds the Episcopal Church of the United States honors King Kamehameha IV and Queen Emma throughout the church on November 28, the anniversary of their Confirmation in 1862.

St. Augustine's Kāhili

We are grateful to Mila Polevia for suggesting a kāhili for St. Augustine's to honor Queen Emma and remember his friend Kim "Ki'i" Nakamura. Mila brought the idea to then-vicar Diana Akiyama, who was enthusiastic about the project and worked with the lei hulu laulima in Waimea to begin the project.

When the pandemic broke out in 2020, the project was put on hold. Later that year, Diana was elected Bishop of the Diocese of Western Oregon. In 2021, St. Augustine's hired Jennifer Masada as its new vicar, who, at Bishop Diana's request, restarted the project with the help of Yonette Nakamura and Bill Randolph. The project progressed with renewed vigor, love, and commitment, fueled by our collective desire to honor Mila, who died unexpectedly on October 18, 2022.



After over six years, countless volunteer hours, and thousands of feathers, the completed kähili was blessed in a community ceremony on November 23, 2024 and on the Feast of the Holy Sovereigns on November 24, 2024.

When we gather in this beautiful space, may we remember the ali'i who invited this church and served these islands as we lament those things which we as the Church and as individual Episcopalians have done and the many things we have left undone that contributed to the harm inflicted on nā Kānaka 'Ōiwi and these islands.

When we gaze upon this kähili, may we fully commit to our responsibility – kā mākou kuleana – to the people of these Islands and to God's creation.

May this kähili remind us that we are called to be **“a place to BE the love of God and to FEEL the love of God.”**
