"Israel"

1. Solidarity

Last Sunday an estimated 40,000 marchers many with Israeli blue and white flags, moving up Manhattan's Fifth Avenue, participated in the Salute to Israel Parade with the theme, "Together Again." Because of Covid, it was the first such gathering of the annual parade in three years.

Congregations and organizations from all across the Jewish spectrum showed their support for Israel, in this challenging time for our Jewish State. For the first time in the parade's history, Christian marching groups joined the procession. There was even a Moslem contingent in the parade.

Colorful floats, Spirited bands, politicians from across the political spectrum, cabinet officials from Israel, marched behind the banners proclaiming unity and solidarity. As always, as I've seen in the years that I led a congregational contingent in the parade usually held on the first Sunday in June, (this year, it was moved up because of Shavuot) the most powerful component is always the tens of thousands of Jewish students waiving American and Israeli flags, from congregational and private schools throughout the area, singing Hebrew songs as they marched together up the parade route, often dressed in coordinating colors.

Over the years I've taught that Judaism is not

simply a faith, it's also a Peoplehood. It's also an ethical system, and a call to repair the suffering and inequity in the world, without standing idly as silent spectators. Amid all this, in our own time, is the need to support and to uphold the existence of the Jewish State.

You've heard me say that it doesn't mean that we have support or uphold any particular political party in power, or to support its policies. However, we must, each of us, do what we can to support the State of Israel and her people. Regardless of the false claims of our detractors, we have both an historical, and moral claim to our "Old-New Land."

Beyond this, Israel has existed as a sanctuary for Jews enduring hardship in any foreign land. Had the British occupiers not curtailed Jewish immigration into Palestine (when we were also called Palestinians) in the 1930's and 40's, and before, millions of our People might have been saved from the Holocaust. Israel must continue as a haven for Jews everywhere, who might require it as a refuge.

The Jewish school children in the parade waving flags and singing songs, are guarantors of this process for the years to come.

2. Shavuot

From the first day of Passover Jews count the days of the Omer, and on the fiftieth day is the holiday of Shavuot, the time celebrating the

giving and receiving of Torah. Whether an individual believes that the Torah was given to the People by God through Moses at Mount Sinai, or one sees Sinai as a metaphor, and that the Torah was given progressively over time through God intoxicated teachers, or if one understands the supreme value of Torah without being certain how it was derived, but knows that we are called to extend its teachings by the choices we make, and the way that we live, Shevuot celebrates matan torah, Hebrew for giving and receiving of Torah. Shavuot is the first Saturday night and Sunday in June.

There is a tradition of serving dairy foods on Shavuot, as it was taught that Torah has been? Is as mother's milk to the Jewish People. (Foods and recipes are on line) There is further a tradition of reading the Ten Commandments as the Torah Portion on the Holyday. The essence of Torah is decent and respectful living.

The Israelites wandered forty years in the wilderness from Sinai until the Promised Land. They had to absorb Torah and grow up a new generation. It's been 4,000 years since Sinai, some say, and we still are absorbing and learning how to do Torah.

Shavuot, in the Bible was a time to give thanks for the grain harvest, and to give thanks for Torah.

Let us pause for our own thanksgiving for the Book and for the Land, and for the blessings we receive, and can become.

Jewish Education News

During the first weekend in June, corresponding to the 6th of Sivan, we celebrate the holiday of Shavuot. It is this day that the Torah was given by God to the Israelites on Mount Sinai more than 3,300 years ago. Shavuot which means “weeks”, which marks the end of the 7-week period between Passover when the Israelites left Egypt, and Shavuot. It is a mitzvah to count each of 49 days, known as Sifirat HaOmer, and is a period of introspection, as we prepare ourselves to receive the Torah. A custom arose among Ashkenazic Jews to read from the Book of Ruth on Shavuot. Ruth’s conversion to Judaism is analogous to our voluntary acceptance of the Torah and God’s covenant on Sinai. Ruth says to her mother-in-law Naomi, “Your people shall be my people, and your God shall be my God.” The Book of Ruth end with the genealogy from Ruth down to King David.

We read in Midrash, that the journey Moses took to reach the top of Mount Sinai was not easy. The climb itself took many days. Moses needed to walk slowly, taking care as to where he placed each step. However, when Moses finally got to the top of Sinai there were great rewards awaiting him; God’s Torah. Often this too is true along the pathway of our own Jewish development. Ask any young person as he/ she prepares for their own Bar/ Bat Mitzvah. This is not easy. The preparation, learning the Torah and Haftarah portions, learning to chant, writing a d’var Torah all take many months, and that is after the students have spent several years in school. Yet the rewards of all their effort are great; their becoming a Bar/ Bat Mitzvah, as they present themselves as adults, in front of our Jewish community. This spring we opened our Temple for in-person services for the first time since it closed in December 2019, with a Bat Mitzvah in the beginning of May, and an upcoming Bar Mitzvah the first weekend of June, Shavuot weekend. Jewish learning and Jewish growth, however, do not end at a Bar or Bat Mitzvah. There are many opportunities available if we are willing to make an effort, and here too the rewards are great. Judaism values our continued personal growth. Each time we read the Torah we have new insights, often as a result of what we have been learning. Each Shabbat service Rabbi Pomerantz speaks to us and teaches us about a holiday or other Jewish topics. The Union for Reform Judaism (URJ) has a weekly podcast called “10 Minutes of Torah”, with insights on the weeks’ Torah portion. The URJ website, My Jewish Learning, Aish.com, PJ Library, and many other Jewish sites, have resources for children and adults alike.

This year we held Hebrew School classes by zoom, where students learned, connected with one another and grew Jewishly. We would like to thank Morah Mindy Knaster for teaching our students each week with a creative, interactive, and engaging program. Thank you to Richie Chiger for working with our B’nai Mitzvah students. As this year winds down, we should reflect on all that we have learned and how much we have grown. It may not have been easy, which is why it is so valuable. May we always continue to learn and grow, until we reach the age of Moses, 120.
