

background to the numbers

Sumpango is a microcosm of Guatemala City in many ways. Although Sumpango is a more rural area than the city, many key issues that lead to poverty remain the same. Lack of jobs, education, and substance abuse remain the most prevalent source of despair.

Sumpango is home to a garbage dump that is a focal point of the community's poverty, similarly to Guatemala City. The dump attracts community members seeking anything they can find to sell (usually cans, plastic, or scraps).

Next Step teams will be serving alongside families that are living in the most rural areas of Sumpango, even outside the 'city' area of Sumpango where there is some economic opportunity.

Many families teams will be serving along side will be living 5-10 individuals in a room. In addition to the overcrowded space, families struggle with finding privacy for young boys and girls as they grow into teenagers.

Because of the high percentage of youth (63%) living below the poverty line, many children are forced to leave school at a young age and go work in the fields to bring in any extra income they can for the family. This survival method creates a cycle of poverty that is very challenging for families living in rural Sumpango.

As noted, Guatemala has the highest rate of indigenous people in Central America, which leads to a beautiful country full of rich tradition and pride.

beyond the numbers



Sumpango is the poorest of the poor. Although amongst the poverty, the church has a dream; a dream to serve the community by serving the children of the area. It is our dream is that someday our church will not only have pastors but also have teachers and that someday our children will learn to read and write. Without being able to read and write, kids will never be able to read the bible. But, the leaders of this community are very passionate, very smart and very hopeful.

things you should know

In your time in Sumpango you will have the privilege of serving alongside Betty Merida. Next Step met Betty about ten years ago when we were serving in Guatemala City. In 2012, Betty felt God calling her to move to Sumpango to start her ministry called, 'Breaking Cycles'. Betty now has a home in Sumpango and lives there with her adopted son, Miguel Angel. Betty serves with Next Step in addition to working within various capacities within the community to bridge the gap between different needs and resources within the local community structure and families and the local church. Betty is a tremendous resource for information about the community and it will be a joy to serve alongside her during your trip.

Next Step has chosen to partner with Breaking Cycles and Busca a Dios Church in Sumpango. Pastor Marvin and his family have a strong heart for the Gospel, missions and evangelism. He believes the way to spread the love of Christ to the community is to serve the community in very tangible ways such as housing, education, and food. The pastor and his family will be serving alongside teams during the summer as their ministry efforts reach out into the community.

Spanish and Mayan will be the two most common languages spoken in the neighborhoods that you are serving in on your trip. Most native Mayan speakers also are fluent in Spanish. Next Step will provide a translator on every work project.

Many of the communities you will be partnering and serving in are traditional Mayan communities. Mayan communities have a beautiful and rich tradition. Mayan's are native to Guatemala and love to share about their history and culture so be encouraged to ask questions. You will notice some physical characteristics right off the bat (height, dress, number of children), but their heritage goes much deeper and families will be honored to talk about their life.

As in any community, the range of personal faith is quite vast between the residents of Sumpango. The predominant religion is Catholicism, however, other families may practice traditional Mayan beliefs. While most residents are familiar with Christianity, many follow closely and others are far from God. Feel encouraged and comfortable to openly share your faith. Take the time to relate to the residents and listen to the stories they have to share. God is moving in big ways in Sumpango.

long-term involvement

Below are five practical ways that you and your group can be involved on a year round basis in the community, extending your service much beyond your one-week trip. Please contact us if you are interested in becoming involved in any way.

1. SUPPORT THE EFFORTS OF BREAKING CYCLES

The Breaking Cycles ministry survives on support alone. They work year-round in Sumpango running the programs you got to be a part of during your trip, as well as several others. It costs money to run these programs and upkeep the ministry. They have administration expenses, employee salaries, and many other costs they need to pay to keep serving like they do. Please consider supporting the ministry.

2. RECRUIT A SKILLED TEAM FOR AN OFF-SEASON TRIP

Next Step trips expand beyond the summer and we are always looking for skilled teams to work on specific projects in Sumpango. There is great need throughout the year for plumbing, electric and foundation work. Please consider bringing teams back out to serve in the fall, winter or spring.

3. SUPPORT THE EFFORTS OF BUSCA A DIOS CHURCH

Unlike many churches in the states, Busca a Dios does not bring in much money through tithing and thus is hard to support the Pastors and projects of the church. Next Step hope to help build a financial foundation for the church to work off of. Please consider supporting the church's efforts by sponsoring a pastor or project.

4. CREATE A PRAYER TEAM

No doubt you saw and experienced a multitude of things that can use the power of prayer during your time in Sumpango. Please consider creating a prayer team to pray at specific time each day for specific prayer items in the community.
