

Wandering Indiana ~

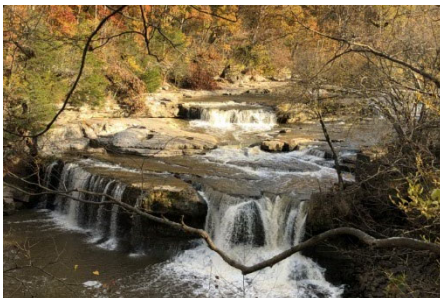
