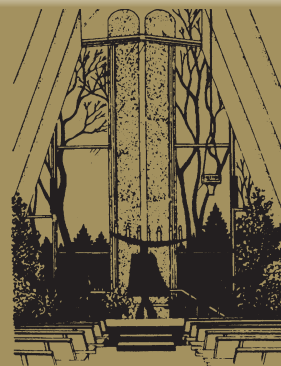

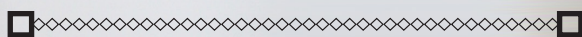

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“On the third day, as morning dawned, there was thunder, and lightening, and a dense cloud upon the mountain, and a very loud blast of the horn; and all the people who were in the camp trembled. Moses led the people out of the camp toward God, and they took their place at the foot of the mountain. Now Mount Sinai was all in smoke, for the Divine had come down on it in fore, the smoke rose like the smoke of a kiln, and the whole mountain trembled violently. The blare of the horn grew louder and louder. As Moses spoke, the Divine answered him in thunder.”

-Exodus 19:16-19

Thoughts about revelation likely differ but imagining the grandeur of that pivotal moment is in part, what the festival of Shavuot invites us to do. Tanhuma Shemot, the midrash on the book of Exodus teaches us that, “The voice reached each Israelite according to his or her ability to hear. The elderly heard according to their strengths and the young according to their strengths, the women according to their strengths. Moses too heard according to his strengths, for it says: Moses spoke, and the Divine answered him with a voice.” Rabbi Jill Hammer in *The Jewish Book of Days* writes that “Midrash Tanhuma shares the surprising midrash that at Sinai, each person heard something different. Each heard the holy voice according to his or her strengths and weaknesses. One imagines Sinai as a little like a United Nations meeting, with each person receiving simultaneous translation into the language of his or her own heart.”

How do we understand the concept of hearing Torah according to our own individual ability? Surely it cannot mean the words themselves, neither the language nor their intended meaning but rather hearing Torah, its wisdom and warnings should be heard differently by each of us over time. Each Saturday morning at Temple Sinai those who join for Torah study commit to doing so carefully, critically, and with tremendous diversity of thought. With discussions that are rich, often leading us to unexpected and interesting places as each explores the same foundational text for our people, together and individually, with a translation of their own

choosing. Each chooses a translation that perhaps reflects the language of his or her own heart.

On the evening of May 16th Shavuot begins and our 10th grade Confirmation students will lead us in prayer and offer us another opportunity to hear Torah from their perspective. They will share with us, as classes before them have, their unique perspectives and how they understand Torah, literally and figuratively.



The festival of Shavuot celebrates the offering of bread on the Temple altar as well as the Revelation of Torah at Mount Sinai. Rabbi Hammer reminds us that the celebration of bread and the celebration of Revelation are similar in theme. The Jewish blessing over bread thanks God for bringing bread from the earth, yet the Divine is only part of the process. Human beings must harvest the grain; winnow it and grind it; use the flour to make loaves, kneading the dough and baking the bread. So too, Revelation is unfinished until humans become part of the process.

This Shavuot, and this year in particular, when much has left us trembling as our ancestors did at the foot of the mountain and we have far greater clarity, let us wonder how best to continue being a vital part of ongoing revelation.

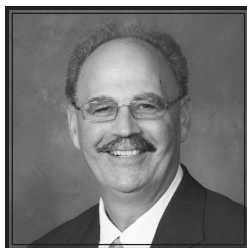

Adult Education in the Temple Sinai School of Life and Learning invites learners at all stages, novice to "seasoned," to forge connections through group exploration of Jewish texts and topics.

AdultED Learning This Spring is Easy as 1-2-3

If you grew up on Schoolhouse Rock like I did, you know that THREE is a magic number. That's certainly true at Temple Sinai this spring, where, at the risk of making a pop culture reference that dates me even further, learning is "easy as 1-2-3." Three is the number of presenters in the AdultED series sponsored to honor the memory of Dennis Goldsmith, z"l. In April, Dr. Joel Hoffman gave ONE fabulous talk, "The Mystery and Majesty of the Dead Sea Scrolls." This month, Temple Sinai native son Rabbi Joshua Garroway delights us with TWO intriguing talks: "Inside the Mind of God: Plato's Influence on Ancient Judaism and Christianity" (Sunday, May 2, 7:00 p.m.) and "Making Meaning in Ancient Alexandria: Jews, Christians, and Allegory" (Sunday, May 23, 7:00 p.m.). And if you guessed that Rabbi Lawrence Englander's June series "Judaism and Science: What Can They Learn From Each Other?" will have THREE parts, you guessed right!

But actually, AdultED learning at Temple Sinai this spring is really easy as 1-2-3-4. Why four? Easy! Rabbi Till's Maimonides "Lunch & Learn"

series, which began last month, continues this month with its final two installments (Mondays, 12:00-1:00 p.m., May 3 and 10), bringing its total number of sessions to FOUR. That's four opportunities for learning in addition to the six (= 1+2+3) in the series described above. Of course, add four and six and get TEN, which happens to be the number of classes in Liz Ornstein's "Prayerbook Hebrew - and More - the Easy Way!" series. Liz's class, which launched Mondays, 8:00-9:00 p.m., in early April, continues through May and into June, affording us ongoing opportunity to better engage with our liturgy while uncovering resonances in conversational Hebrew.

If you're like me, by now you're thinking that maybe our next AdultED offering might have to be one on Jewish numerology! All jest aside, the AdultED Committee is always looking for ideas for our next offerings, so please don't be shy about reaching out with your suggestions. See you in a class or talk in the meantime!

Thank you for your patience throughout this challenging year. We have learned much about the bond between congregants, clergy, and leadership at Temple Sinai. Despite the absence of physical togetherness, we have seen immeasurable commitment to maintaining our connection.

As the rates of infection are declining and vaccinations increasing, the COVID-19 Task Force has approved a plan to gradually reintroduce in-person services at Temple Sinai.

To prepare the building, we have scheduled an upgrade to the air filtration system to utilize MERV 13/UV filters, created a plan to change over prayer books after each service to avoid shared contact surfaces, and drafted preliminary operating procedures to promote social distancing and limit the number of visitors to the sanctuary.

Beginning in May, the clergy will return to stream and zoom our Erev Shabbat services from the Sanctuary without guests. Invitations will be sent for Shabbat morning services in May to congregants observing a Yahrzeit or who are in a period of Shloshim only.

In June, Erev Shabbat services will remain streamed and zoomed from the sanctuary with no guests in attendance. For Shabbat morning services, invitations will be sent only to families celebrating B'nai Mitzvah to offer an in-person service in the sanctuary with immediate family and a limited number of guests.

Invited guests will be required to register, and all vaccine-eligible guests must be fully vaccinated or have a negative COVID-19 test result within five days of their service. Masks are required for all, and registered guests will be checked in at the

door and assigned a pew. There will be no food or use of the social hall.

Please do not visit temple grounds if you are experiencing any symptoms associated with COVID-19.



All services will continue to be available via Zoom and/or StreamSpot.

We are planning to hold our Get S'more Shabbat Service on June 18th in person, open to all, in the Joel Bloom Garden with no tables or chairs set up. Guests will provide their own seating, i.e., chairs, blankets, etc. to be placed in designated socially-distanced sites throughout the garden. Although there will be no food at this event, attendees will receive a S'mores goodie bag.

Should community indicators shift to indicate another surge is beginning, we will notify you and resume fully remote services offered via Zoom only.

We are working to finalize fully detailed information letters and registration forms for invited guests to prepare them to visit the temple, and we will update the congregation as we continue to progress.

Once again, thank you for your patience and your overwhelming support of Temple Sinai as we have navigated these uncharted waters together. We truly look forward to the day that we can all be together, safely, in person again.



Captioning Temple Sinai Events for Greater Accessibility

The Accessibility & Inclusion Committee is committed to making all Temple events - in-person and on-screen - as accessible as possible to all who wish to participate in them. Toward that end, we are currently auditing the accessibility of our events to people who are deaf and hard-of-hearing. Our focus right now is on captioning our live-streamed and recorded materials. Ultimately, the lessons we learn in these domains will be applied to live in-person settings.

Various captioning options exist. Open captions, such as accompany the pre-recorded sermon in the lay-led services, are on the screen for all to see. Closed captions, in contrast, can be turned on or off by the viewer. It is our vision at Temple Sinai to ensure that closed captions are available across all "gatherings," including, for example, services, classes, and committee meetings.

Captions are generated in one of two basic ways: (1) using automatic speech recognition (ASR); and (2) via the talents and efforts of a live captionist. As you can imagine, there is a scale of cost, depending on the level of expertise demanded by the service. Zoom, our most frequented meeting platform, recently enabled professional account users to turn on closed captioning, either using ASR or integrating third-party live captioning.

At present, we are experimenting using the free ASR-based captioning offered by Zoom. We are assessing speed and, importantly, accuracy. We recognize that the mixing of English and

Hebrew in many Jewish settings presents limitations to ASR accuracy. However, we are experimenting with ways to make it work nonetheless - e.g., by including Hebrew text in slides and turning the captioning off during "Hebrew-heavy" portions.

We are looking to you to help us gather the data needed to decide whether ASR-based captioning adequately meets the needs of our community (both present congregants and those who might feel welcomed by our accessibility). Please, therefore, both enable captioning in your own events, and invite feedback about the captions from those in attendance. (Was it helpful? Fast enough? Accurate enough? Distracting? etc.)

If it is determined that Zoom's free captions are inadequate for our purposes, we will explore paid options, including ASR-based services with customizable dictionaries, as well as live captionists with Jewish communal experience and expertise. However, we'd like to start with the easiest, least costly option and proceed from there.

Proper decision-making will depend on your feedback! Please contact us with questions, suggestions or concerns.

From the Accessibility and Inclusion Committee

Our wonderful newly designed website says that Temple Sinai is:

A Reform congregation affiliated with the Union for Reform Judaism (URJ), we count among us Jews raised in Orthodox, Conservative, humanistic, and other traditions, in addition to the Reform tradition; interfaith families; Jews of Color; LGBT Jews; singles, couples, and families; Jews with disabilities; and Jews across the age span and from many backgrounds.

In sum, we embrace Jews of all ages and backgrounds, as well as those curious about Judaism.

This could not be more welcoming and inclusive.

Inclusion is integral to Jewish principles. Numbers 15:15-16 states "You and the stranger shall be alike before the eternal: the same ritual and the same rule shall apply to you and to the stranger who resides among you." Further, and perhaps better known, Leviticus 19:34 provides: "You shall love your neighbor as yourself."

Nevertheless "otherness" rears its head all too often. It is the basis of biases that have rent apart our society. Racism is perhaps the most obvious of these, but biases against those who are not like "us" in almost any way, sadly, exist. These biases can be deeply buried, and we may exhibit them so unconsciously, so unwittingly, and so subtly that we don't recognize we are doing so.

Although we may not be able to recognize these biases in ourselves, those who are subjected to them do. The Accessibility and Inclusion Committee believes that we should test our articulated values of inclusion by asking our congregants whether at times or in situations they have felt unwelcomed at Temple Sinai. We will do this by emailing to each of you a questionnaire that can be answered anonymously to help us understand where we may need to improve.

From these responses we hope to learn how we can truly abide by our inclusive ideal.
