


Consecration Celebration

There are a number of factors at play that could explain the decline in volunteers across our country. We don't have the space here to explore them all, but if you are interested in knowing more, a study from the University of Maryland can give you more information.

The main points I noticed in this study, that track with my experience as a pastor and someone who has helped coordinate volunteers in different capacities, include education level, socioeconomic status, connection to community, and availability of community resources. We live in a society where public education is being defunded and devalued, where people are working harder for less pay and benefits, where relationships with neighbors and even extended family members have become less important, and where community nonprofits and resource services are struggling to keep their programs running. It's not just one reason that fewer people are volunteering and becoming members in organizations, but many factors, often out of the individual's control.

Whether that gives you comfort or deeper concern, at least know this: the church is not the only institution struggling to grow and provide services. What may give you more comfort is to know that on the spectrum of congregations in the ELCA, Peace is doing very well with continuing ministries and providing for its community, even with the many challenges the church, society, and individuals face, especially when factoring in all the adjustments we have had to make around COVID.

That all being said, I still think there is great value in officially becoming a member of a congregation. Certainly, people can attend worship, hear the word of God, receive the sacraments, and volunteer with a congregation without becoming a member. All the rights that members enjoy in a congregation are available just as fully to nonmembers. The difference comes down to responsibilities. Members in congregations have a responsibility to the organization to further its mission. Through voting at congregational meetings, participating as council and committee members, giving tithes and offerings, volunteering to further the cause of God's word in the world, members are able to steer a congregation in the direction they feel God is calling it.

Membership may seem outdated in today's world, but in the church, it is one more way to actively live out the faith God has given us. For those who are members, thank you for your continued service to this congregation and to God. Welcome to the new members who recently. To those who are not yet members, or have been on the fence about membership, please prayerfully consider joining the congregation and the ministry of this place.



We begin the month with All Saints weekend. At the end of November, we begin a new Lectionary year with the first weekend in Advent

November 5th & 6th

All Saints Weekend

Readings: Daniel 7:1-3, 15-18; Psalm 149; Ephesians 1:11-23; **Luke 6:20-31**

In holy baptism God makes saints out of sinners. In holy communion God forgives the sins of all the saints. In worship today we give thanks for all the saints “who from their labors rest.” In the same breath we petition our God for the strength to hear and to heed the admonitions of Jesus in today’s gospel. Sealed by the Spirit and sustained by the Savior’s body and blood, we live with joy as God gives us breath, to the praise of God’s glory.

November 12th & 13th

Twenty-third Sunday after Pentecost

Readings: Malachi 4:1-2a; Psalm 98; 2 Thessalonians 3:6-13; **Luke 21:5-19**



Words from the Synod: “*Transitions*”

Dear Friends in Christ,

Transitions! Life is full of them. Sometimes they are positive transitions that bring about change that is needed or hoped for.

Sometimes they are sad transitions that are unexpected and not really wanted. But for life to truly be alive, life must change. Old things must depart for God's new life to enter in. And so we find ways to respond in healthy ways to the transitions that come.

The Montana Synod office is currently experiencing some transitions which will affect the staff and the whole synod over the next few months. Two of these transitions are exciting, with the possibility of new opportunities for the synod as well as some hoped for stability. One upcoming transition brings sadness with some goodbyes but also has potential for the Spirit to work new things in the Montana Synod.

The first transition is the addition of Milissa Jones (pronounced My-lissa) as our new office manager. MJ, as she likes to be called, started last week and comes to us from the hospitality industry. Already, she has been fitting in well, bringing some excellent skills to the job and tackling the many office manager responsibilities with enthusiasm. Please see below for MJ's bio and picture. She is in the office every weekday from 8:30 a.m. – 5 p.m. so feel free to call the office or email her with your questions. Keep in mind, though, that she is only a week and a half in so please be patient as she climbs the steep learning curve of being the Montana Synod office manager. MJ, welcome to the team as together we at the synod office work to equip the synod for the ministry of the gospel.

The second transition is also an exciting one. This past week our own Colter McCarty began his studies in the Leadership and Innovation Masters of Arts program at Luther Seminary on the Word and Service track toward becoming an ordained deacon in the ELCA. He will be engaging these studies through Distributed Learning which means he'll continue to live in Great Falls and work full time for the Montana Synod office. Colter will focus his studies on the intersection between ministry and technology which will take him beyond online worship into reflecting on ministry through the ever-growing tools and mindset that technology presents us. (Think: how did the printing press change the church and then bring it to the 21st century.) I am delighted to support Colter in this endeavor and I ask

you to support him as well with your patience, compassion, and prayers as he takes on these greater responsibilities not only for his own sake but also for the sake of the Montana Synod and the wider church. This focus on ministry and technology is a long time coming as we so clearly learned during the pandemic. Congratulations and thank you, Colter, as you engage in this important work.

The third transition is a sad one for me and I'm expecting will be for the whole synod. The current Associate to the Bishop, Pastor Jason Asselstine, has accepted a new call as a pastor of a congregation in the Nebraska Synod and his last day with the Montana Synod will be October 31, 2022. It has been a blessing to have Jason serving as my associate since I took office as the bishop in 2019. His gifts, skills and presence made becoming bishop so much easier than it could have been and I can't offer enough gratitude to God, to Jason and to his family for all they have given to the synod and the wider church over the past nearly 10 years. And while I am sad to see Jason leave, I hope and pray for God's blessings to rest upon him as he enters the new adventure on which the Holy Spirit is sending him and his wife, Jen. I invite your prayers, well-wishes and “go with God's” for Jason during this transition in his life. I also invite your prayers and support for the MT Synod as we too transition into the new possibilities that God has in mind for us. I am in the process of seeking and naming the new A2B (as we affectionately call the Associate to the Bishop) and will make an announcement as soon as that person has been selected and properly called.

Change happens. Life is change and change is life. What matters is how we choose to transition through the change. As the Psalmist writes: “God is our refuge and strength, a very present help in trouble. Therefore, we will not fear, though the earth should change...” (Ps 46) As long as we open our hearts and minds to the God who guides us through our transitions, we have nothing to fear. For God will be our strength and refuge during the positive and the difficult changes ahead and will guide us into amazing possibilities when we let the Spirit lead. May God bless us all in this time of transitions.

1 *All Saints Day* Give thanks and praise to God for saints who have helped enrich our faith in Christ, inspired us to lives of service, cared for us, demonstrated grace when we needed it most, taught us life skills, influenced our values and stirred our hope and joy.

2 Native American Heritage Month Praise God for Native American and Alaska Native neighbors and siblings in Christ, who represent a rich diversity of gifts, backgrounds, tribes, regions, communities and congregations, and whose history long predates the colonization of North America. Pray for the work of ELCA Indigenous Ministries and Tribal Relations in seeking justice and reconciliation for all people, celebrating diversity within Christ's unifying love and supporting Native congregations and ministries.

3 "Learn to do good; seek justice, rescue the oppressed, defend the orphan, plead for the widow. Come now, let us argue it out, says the Lord: though your sins are like scarlet, they shall be like snow" (Isaiah 1:17-18). Pray that we will respect the word and desires of God, seek the Spirit's guidance in responding to our neighbors in need, and trust God to create and renew a spirit of compassion and generosity within us.

4 Pray for those affected by wildfires, flooding, droughts and hurricanes, especially people struggling through immediate and long-term recovery. Ask the Spirit to inspire our generosity toward and involvement in the work of Lutheran Disaster Response and its partners to bring relief, support, hope and resources to our neighbors in need.

5 "God is our refuge and strength, a very present help in trouble" (Psalm 46:1). Pray that, in every challenge we face, the Spirit will increase our trust and confidence in God's presence, care and help in our lives.

6 Praise the teachings and example of Jesus, who calls for us to be caring disciples, unafraid of being involved in the lives of those suffering injustice, persecution, isolation, grief, poverty or illness.

7 Pray for our outdoor ministry leaders as they gather for the Lutheran Outdoor Ministry conference in Boise, Idaho. Pray that their time together in the presence of the Spirit will be rich in mutual care and encouragement, ideas and resources, and opportunities to nurture their skills for serving in camp and retreat ministries.

8 *Election Day* Pray that our elected leaders will respect and serve all people, and that the Spirit will inspire and guide them in mending divisions, creating unity and encouraging constituents to work together for the well-being of all.

9 Ask the Spirit to deepen our understanding of Jesus and how the gift of God's son has the power to transform our lives and identities in amazing and unimagined ways.

10 Give thanks and pray for leaders of our church as they gather for the ELCA Church Council, that the Spirit will inspire faithfulness, wisdom, vision and creativity in their deliberations, decisions and guidance.

11 *Veterans Day* Honor and give thanks for those who have served in the military to secure freedom, justice, peace and security for our country and other nations. Remembering the sacrifices they have made on our behalf, pray for their families, their congregations, federal chaplains, and organizations that support and care for returning veterans.

12 Give thanks for the ELCA Lay Schools for Ministry Network and for the Select Learning program, through which our church and its partners provide laity with opportunities to deepen their faith, study Scripture and apply their skills and life experiences to following Christ and serving the church, their communities and the world.

13 Pray that the Spirit will help us live our baptismal journeys in anticipation of the return of Christ, with confidence in God's grace and without fear, worry or obsession over when or how that day will come.

14 Reaffirm to God our commitment to equal employment opportunity for all citizens, especially our neighbors and siblings in Christ who live with disabilities but whose gifts enrich our communities and nation.

15 Pray for a peaceful end to the war in Ukraine, and that the millions of people displaced from their homes and communities might find comfort, healing, hope and stability, returning to the daily lives and routines they once knew.

16 Pray for the ELCA's Homeless and Justice Network, a coalition of ministries called to serve those on the margins who experience homelessness, poverty and injustice.

17 "Do not be weary in doing what is right" (2 Thessalonians 3:13). Pray that our assurance of eternal life in the kingdom of God will free us to live in the here and now, fully engaged with our lives and vocations, sharing the gospel, serving our neighbor and working for justice.

18 Pray that we might confess our role in the climate change wreaking havoc throughout the world and might grasp the urgency of managing and caring for the earth, its resources and all living things — fragile gifts that God has entrusted to our use, care and restoration.

19 Pray for the ELCA's advocacy network and the work it empowers us to do for justice, equity and the well-being of society.

20 The love and mercy of God, which we experience in the life, suffering and sacrifice of Jesus, are for our sake and salvation. Pray that the Spirit will deepen our faith in Christ and help us reflect God's unconditional, sacrificial love for humanity.

21 Give thanks for Lutheran Men in Mission, Women of the ELCA and congregational ministries that attend to the spiritual, physical, emotional and relational needs of all ages, and that nurture leaders for the church, our communities and society.

22 Remember the people of Puerto Rico, who have suffered multiple natural disasters and endure ongoing, extensive recovery work. Ask the Spirit to renew their faith, hope, stamina and resilience; pray that they will make progress in restoring their infrastructure and regaining access to food, water, shelter, sanitation and medical services.

23 Give thanks to God for rescuing us from the power of darkness through the gift of Jesus Christ—our teacher, our truth and the light illuminating our complicated lives.

24 *Thanksgiving Day* Remember that everything we have to sustain and renew us, physically and spiritually, comes from God. Let us promise to be generous with all we have and to tirelessly bear the good news that Jesus Christ, the bread of life for the world that is never depleted, is our hope and salvation.

25 *Native American Heritage Day* Give thanks for the cultures, values, accomplishments and spirituality of Native Americans that have shaped our nation and church. We commit to learning more about Indigenous people and tribal nations and to working together to correct inaccuracies of history.

26 Pray that we will be responsible in what we consume and how we spend our money, knowing that our neighbors suffer hunger and poverty amid abundance.

27 *First Sunday of Advent* We will not be disappointed in our confidence in God's love and forgiveness, our anticipation of Christ's return or our welcome in the kingdom of God. Praise God!

28 Give thanks for the diverse work of the 28 ELCA missionaries accompanying 18 church bodies and 18 companion organizations in Latin America and the Caribbean. Ask God to bless and guide our ministry together so that we might respond to the needs of our neighbors in need who are most vulnerable and might spread the good news of Jesus Christ, far and wide.

29 Pray that the Spirit will deepen our generosity in sharing our resources and financial assets for the sake of our neighbors and the well-being of the world.

30 Pray that we will be generous and respectful in responding to and caring for those who cannot find secure shelter, pay for food or medical care, or support the children or older adults dependent on them.
