





Message From Our Pastor

Celebrating the Source and Summit

Years ago, before I had entered the seminary, I was employed as a graphic artist at a publishing company. Most people at work knew that I was active in my parish and was sincere about my faith. One guy who worked in the warehouse belonged to a church he described as a non-denominational Bible-believing community. He would periodically challenge me about Catholic beliefs and practices, and was usually surprised to learn that there were real answers and solid explanations for things he misunderstood about Catholicism. He said to me one day, "The real reason I'm not Catholic is that you guys teach all sorts of things that aren't in the Bible."

"Really? Like what?" I asked. "Can you give me an example?"

"Well, take the Eucharist for starters." I was taken aback. My co-worker's response was the last thing I was expecting.

There are a bunch of times in the Bible when the Eucharist is mentioned. The Last Supper, of course, contains the Institution Narrative when Christ celebrates the First Mass, where He says the bread and wine are His Body and Blood. Chapter 6 in the Gospel of John contains the Bread of Life Discourse in which Jesus gives us the theological teaching with which we understand the Last Supper/First Mass. The Second Mass occurs Easter Sunday night at Emmaus when the Risen Lord was made known to two disciples "in the Breaking of the Bread" (Luke 24:13-35, which is depicted on our altar's mosaic, very appropriately!). In Paul's first letter to the Corinthians, he explains the tradition of the Church handing on the celebration of the Eucharist (1Cor 11:23-26). The Letter to the Hebrews describes Jesus as the Great High Priest, and the Book of Revelations offers a glimpse into the Heavenly Liturgy, which the earthly liturgy (the Holy Sacrifice of the Mass) already participates in, uniting ourselves to Christ. These are a but a few examples, there are more. The Old Testament, too, contains many more references which point to the Eucharist, the most obvious being the story of the Passover).

Many saints, theologians, popes and preachers have expounded on the depth, beauty, reality and ultimate meaning that the Body and Blood of Christ has for us, especially as it is the heavenly and liturgical meal in



which we are invited to share, and in which we are called to find hope, healing, new life and joy.

For all these reasons – and more – the Catholic Church teaches that the Holy Eucharist is the source and summit of our faith. Receiving the Eucharistic Heart of our Lord in the *appearance* of bread and wine is the source of our strength, faith and grace we need to live as disciples in the world. But it is also the goal and

pinnacle of discipleship: being united with Jesus, the author of life and artist of love. The Eucharist "is the culmination both of God's action sanctifying the world in Christ, and of the worship humanity offers to Christ, and through Him to the Father in the Holy Spirit" (*Catechism of the Catholic Church*, 1325).

Today, in the great feast of Corpus Christi (which are simply the Latin words for Body of Christ), we take time to contemplate and appreciate the most sublime of truths. Doing so helps us to grow in love – and gratitude – first, simply for who Christ is; and second, for what He has done for us. And that inspires and motivates us to worship Him.

Worship can be understood as simply a verbal, musical or ritual expression of our gratitude and love. And on Corpus Christi, the Catholic Church does that with added prayers, song, and even a procession, a procession which envelops our campus, a 'sacramental' sign of how we desire Christ's sanctifying love to envelope our hearts, lives, parish and world. There is a pattern, a relationship, that what is done on earth will be fulfilled in Heaven, and what is in Heaven will be imitated on earth – *on earth as it is in Heaven*, as the Lord taught us to pray in the Our Father.

And so I invite you to join in this Corpus Christi procession today, which will flow outwards after the 11 AM Mass, travel around the block with song, prayer and Scripture, and then return into the church for solemn Benediction. If we dream of a world that is more conformed to goodness, truth, and beauty, a Eucharistic Procession is the perfect way to begin that transformation.

Additionally, as we celebrate a year of Eucharistic Renewal in the United States, all are invited to a similar Mass and Procession on Friday evening, June 28th as our parish becomes a host site for young adults in the National Eucharistic Pilgrimage.


NATIONAL Eucharistic Revival




Eucharistic Prayer Companion

The Solemnity of the Most Holy Body and Blood of Christ:
Blessed, Broken, and Shared

THE GRACE I SEEK: to have a spirit of loving obedience to all that God asks, especially to help build a Eucharistic culture

IN THE NAME OF THE FATHER, AND OF THE SON, AND OF THE HOLY SPIRIT. AMEN.

Pause for a few moments, and allow yourself to become aware of Jesus' gift of himself in the Eucharist. Realize that, at this very moment, the Lord of Life is gazing upon you with great love. Allow yourself to receive his loving gaze. You are his beloved child. Rest in his loving gaze.

Thank Jesus for the gift of himself in the Eucharist.

ASK FOR THE GRACE: Jesus, help me to have a spirit of loving obedience to all that God asks, especially to help build a Eucharistic culture.

SCRIPTURE MEDITATION — Read slowly, 3–4 times. Allow the words of Scripture to wash over your mind and heart. Allow the Holy Spirit to speak to you through this passage.

"Taking the book of the covenant, he read it aloud to the people, who answered, 'All that the Lord has said, we will heed and do.' Then he took the blood and sprinkled it on the people, saying, 'This is the blood of the covenant that the Lord has made with you.'" (Exodus 24:7–8)

REFLECTION QUESTION — Allow yourself to sit with these questions for a while, being attentive to how the Lord is speaking in your heart.

Every time God made a covenant with his people, it was "sealed in blood." He chose to send his Beloved Son, who shed his Blood to set us free, sealing the "new and everlasting covenant." How can I grow in gratitude for the Blood of Christ outpoured for my salvation? How can I stand in true awe as I consider how the Body of Christ was literally tortured, realizing that he did this out of love for me?

SCRIPTURE MEDITATION — Read slowly, 3–4 times. Again, allow the words of Scripture to wash over your mind and heart. Let the Holy Spirit speak to you through this passage.

"While they were eating, he took bread, said the blessing, broke it, gave it to them, and said, 'Take it; this is my body.' Then he took a cup, gave thanks, and gave it to them, and they all drank from it. He said to them, 'This is my blood of the covenant, which will be shed for many.'" (Mark 14:22–24)

REFLECTION QUESTION — Allow yourself to sit with these questions for a while, being attentive to how the Lord is speaking in your heart.

What a profound moment in salvation history! Jesus celebrates the first Mass with his disciples, instituting the Eucharist. With deep gratitude and wonder in our hearts, let us pray, "Lord, I give you thanks and praise for the gift of the Eucharist—the renewal of the Paschal Mystery in which I participate at every Mass. I ask you for the grace to receive your Body and Blood in Holy Communion with awe, allowing you to transform my life so it can be a living reflection of your Eucharistic Heart: blessed, broken, and shared so that all may have life."

Remain in silence with the Lord. Allow him to speak in the silence, in your heart. Receive his presence. If it helps, write down what you sense the Lord communicating to you during this time of prayer.

CLOSING PRAYER — O God, who in this wonderful Sacrament have left us a memorial of your Passion, grant us, we pray, so to revere the sacred mysteries of your Body and Blood that we may always experience in ourselves the fruits of your redemption. Who live and reign with God the Father, in the unity of the Holy Spirit, God, for ever and ever. Amen. (Collect, Solemnity of the Most Holy Body and Blood of Christ)

SUNDAY MASS CONNECTION — At every Mass, Jesus offers himself to the Father for us. We can always join our own offerings with Jesus at Mass. This Sunday, offer your desire to enter more fully into Holy Mass so that you can become a living sacrifice of praise with Jesus.

LOVE IN ACTION — During the coming week, make your love for our Eucharistic Lord concrete by spending extra time with him in Eucharistic adoration, offering that time of prayer for those in most need of his mercy.

While they were eating, he took bread, said the blessing, broke it, gave it to them, and said, “Take it; this is my body.” Then he took a cup, gave thanks, and gave it to them, and they all drank from it. He said to them, “This is my blood of the covenant, which will be shed for many.”

Mark 14:22–24 (Year B Gospel)

Wonder and Awe Before The Eucharist

At the holy Mass, as soon as the priest pronounces the words of the consecration, transforming the bread and wine into the Body and Blood, Soul and Divinity of Jesus Christ our Lord, he genuflects, rises, and then says, “The mystery of faith.” What is “the mystery of faith?” Oftentimes, when we say that something is a mystery, we mean that the conclusion is hidden but that there are certain clues to help solve the mystery. And once the mystery is solved, everything is clear and it is no longer a mystery.

“The mystery of faith” is much different. Those words are spoken at Mass immediately after the consecration as a way of drawing the faithful into a holy awe and amazement of what just took place. But this mystery can only produce wonder and awe if the reality of what just took place is understood through the gift of faith. Faith is knowing and believing without perceiving the reality before us with our five senses or through logical deduction. In other words, faith produces true knowledge of a spiritual reality that can only be known, understood and believed through spiritual insight. Therefore, if we attend the Mass and have been gifted with the knowledge of faith, then as soon as the consecration of the bread and wine takes place, we will cry out interiorly, “My Lord and my God!” We will know that God the Son is present before us in a veiled way. Our eyes do not perceive, nor do any of our senses reveal to us the great reality before us. We cannot rationally deduce what just took place. Instead, we come to know and believe that the Son of God, the Savior of the World, is now present before us in His fullness, under the veil of mere bread and wine.



In addition to the divine presence of our Lord and our God, the entire Mystery of our Redemption is made present. Saint Pope John Paul II tells us that in this moment there is a “oneness in time” that links the *Paschal Mystery*, that is, the Life, Death and Resurrection of Jesus, to every moment that the Eucharist is celebrated and made present through the words of consecration. And that unity between each Mass and the *Paschal Mystery* “leads us to profound amazement and gratitude” (*Ecclesia de Eucharistia*, #5).

Do you sense and experience this profound amazement and gratitude each time you attend the Holy Sacrifice of the Mass? Do you realize as you attend the Mass and as the words of consecration are spoken that the entire Mystery of your redemption is made present before you, hidden from your eyes but visible to your soul by faith? Do you understand that it is God the Second Person of the Most Holy Trinity Who descends to us to dwell with us in that moment of time in this glorious Sacrament?

Reflect, today, upon the hidden but real Mystery of Faith. Allow yourself to be drawn into a wonder and awe at what you are privileged to attend. Let your faith in the Most Holy Eucharist grow by being open to a deepening of this gift of faith through spiritual insight and belief. Behold this great Gift of the Eucharist with the eyes of faith and you will be drawn into the wonder and awe that God wants to bestow upon you.

My ever-glorious Eucharistic Lord, I do believe that You are here, made present in our world under the form of bread and wine, every time the Holy Mass is celebrated. Fill me with a deeper faith in this Holy Gift, dear Lord, so that I may be drawn into wonder and awe every time I witness this holy Consecration. Jesus, I trust in You.

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

A BETTER WAY FORWARD

A Message on Assisted Suicide from the Catholic Bishops of Illinois

April 2024

Legislation has been introduced to legalize assisted suicide in Illinois. SB 3499 makes it legal for a physician to prescribe an array of lethal drugs to a person diagnosed with a terminal disease who requests to end his or her life. The Catholic Bishops of Illinois oppose this legislation; there is a better way forward for our state.

As Pope Francis underscores, "We must accompany people towards death, but not provide death or facilitate assisted suicide."

Assisted suicide disregards the Hippocratic Oath, "Do No Harm," and sends the wrong message about the role of medical professionals. We cannot say it any better than the American Medical Association, "Physician assisted suicide is fundamentally incompatible with the physician's role as healer, would be difficult or impossible to control, and would provide serious societal risks."

This legislation brings a range of possible abuses. It should alarm us that in states with legalized assisted suicide there are documented cases of people being offered inexpensive lethal drugs to end their life rather than being provided more costly treatment. The poor and those with disabilities are particularly in jeopardy because they are the most vulnerable to abuses. Every major national organization that represents people with disabilities is opposed to assisted suicide.

In Oregon, where assisted suicide has been legal since 1997, data show that pain is not among the top five reasons why a person wants to end their life. Loss of autonomy, feelings of being a burden and being less able to engage in activities that make life enjoyable are most often cited as reasons for choosing assisted suicide. A better way forward is to expand mental health coverage and strengthen social supports such as community programs to help those dealing with depression and feelings of hopelessness.

No one wants to suffer or experience a loved one's suffering. Fortunately, there are effective ways to alleviate suffering or make a person more comfortable at the end of life through palliative care. This relatively new specialty area of medicine cares for the whole person – physically, emotionally, socially, and spiritually – to relieve symptoms and stress that often accompany serious illness or side effects of treatment. A better way forward is to expand the number of palliative care locations and services in all areas of Illinois.

Assisted suicide is not a compassionate solution for those who are suffering. There is a better way forward that truly offers compassionate care and compassionate choices.
