# Message From Our Pastor

## *St. Alphonsus Parish on National Stage with Eucharistic Pilgrimage on Friday, June 28*

For several years now, the US Conference of Catholic Bishops (USCCB) has been prayerfully planning an initiative calling for a national Eucharistic Revival. It culminates in an four-day long event called the National Eucharistic Congress, which is being held in Indianapolis in mid July this summer. To create a catalyst for the Congress, the USCCB, imagining Indy as a geographical center of the nation (roughly speaking), decided to create a National Eucharistic Pilgrimage -- or actually four of them -- coming from the four cardinal directions and converging on Indianapolis for the start of the Congress. The four pilgrimage routes (respectively from the north, east, south and west), are intended to form a cross that spans the entire country, with the epicenter being the site of the upcoming Congress. The north branch of the Eucharistic Pilgrimage will be passing through the Archdiocese of Chicago in late June. This is a unique, historical, and monumental undertaking by the USCCB, collaborating with many dioceses along the various pilgrimage routes.

Here's the exciting part: not only will this procession be passing through the Chicago Archdiocese, out of many parishes, St. Alphonsus was specifically chosen by the organizing committee to be a host site for a special Mass and Eucharistic Procession! Recognized and affirmed for our vibrant ministry to Catholics in their 20s and 20s, we have been selected as the singular host site for young adults participating in the National Eucharistic Pilgrimage. It is equal parts humbling and exciting!

On Friday, June 28th at 6:30 PM, we will welcome the pilgrims crossing the country on foot who bear the liturgical elements for the Mass and Procession. We also expect to welcome several hundreds of young adults from all over the Archdiocese, the state of Illinois, and beyond to our church for this event. After a couple testimonies from the official pilgrims, we will celebrate Mass, and have a special candle-lit Eucharistic procession around our campus. The procession will return to the church and conclude with Solemn Benediction.



### NATIONAL Eucharistic Revival

Following the procession, there will, of course, be a social afterwards for young adult Catholics to mingle and connect with each other.

While the social might be intended for young adults, anyone and everyone from our parish is strongly encouraged to attend. The National Eucharistic Pilgrimage is an historic event for the Catholic Church in the United States, the Archdiocese, and especially for St. Alphonsus Parish.

Nothing like this has happened in nearly a century -- the closest approximation was back in 1926, when a Eucharistic Congress drew well over 250,000 parishioners to liturgies at Soldier Field and Mundelein Seminary. But this year, as it traverses the country, the National Eucharistic Pilgrimage has already drawn millions of Catholics along the four routes. And how blessed are we, not just to attend, but to be a host site welcoming pilgrims and young adults to one of the most beautiful sanctuaries in the city, with a top-tier music program, and some of the best parishioners anywhere!

## The Goal of the Eucharistic Revival



In preparation for the National Eucharistic Congress this coming July, thousands of pilgrims are making their way to Indianapolis from various parts of the United States. Happily, the pilgrimage will include stops in the Archdiocese of Chicago, culminating with the celebration of the Eucharist at Holy Name Cathedral on June 30 at 12:30 PM.

Of course, the point of reference for understanding any eucharistic pilgrimage and in fact all such processions is the actual celebration of the Mass. For as the teaching of the church clearly remind us, “taking part in the Eucharistic sacrifice (is) the source and summit of the Christian life.” It is in the celebration of the Eucharist that the Christian faithful “offer the Divine Victim to God, and offer themselves along with It. Thus, both by reason of the offering and through Holy Communion all take part in this liturgical service, not indeed, all in the same way but each in that way which is proper to himself. Strengthened in Holy Communion by the Body of Christ, they then manifest in a concrete way that unity of the people of God which is suitably signified and wondrously brought about by this most august sacrament” (“Lumen Gentium,” “The Dogmatic Constitution on the Church,” 11).

This teaching is quite profound and helps us remember that our processions and pilgrimages should always aim at leading us to a deeper conversion, freeing us to offer our lives in union with Christ for the salvation of the world, and specifically as we take up the work of bringing about the unity of the human family.

We express this core belief at two moments in the Mass. The first is when the gifts of bread and wine and the offerings from the collection are brought forward in procession by representatives of the community. After these gifts, which represent us, are prepared on the altar, the presider makes clear the meaning of what is taking place as he invites the community in these words: “Pray my brothers and sisters that my sacrifice and yours may be acceptable to God the Father almighty.”

The second procession comes at the time of the reception of Communion, when the Christian faithful move forward to receive the very gifts they have offered, and which have become the Body and Blood of Christ. In this action, Christ unites the faithful to himself and to one another, transforming us into the Body of Christ.



In other words, the Communion procession is a profoundly religious action of the community, rather than that of an individual’s faith or piety. This is why the norm of the church is that Holy Communion is to be received standing and that all the faithful should be encouraged to participate in singing the hymn as they join the procession. This expression of unity is nothing less than an answer to the prayer of Christ at the Last Supper, when he pleaded: “Holy Father, keep them in your name that you have given me, so that they may be one just as we are ... as you, Father, are in me and I in you, that they also may be in us” (John 17:11, 21).

Our National Eucharistic Revival and our gathering in Indianapolis will be successful to the degree that we root all our efforts in the actual celebration of the Eucharist, which, as the source and summit of Christian life, should always be the point of reference for all that we do in this moment of renewal. The goal of our revival should not be limited to bringing the Christian faithful simply to believe that Christ is truly present in the Eucharist. As the late Cardinal Avery Dulles once observed, Christ does not reveal himself to “mystify” us, but to draw us into the mystery of participating in his work of salvation.

And so, the aim of our revival should be to bring all the faithful to a deeper faith that in the celebration of the Eucharist, Christ makes himself present to give us a share in his victory and triumph over death, which he won for us on the Cross, thus making us more fully the Body of Christ to continue his work of saving the world as we join our sacrifices and our lives to his. This empowers us to join in the final procession as we walk out of the doors of the church carrying our eucharistic experience into a world that is so much of need of salvation.

### Helpful Household Hints by Harvey Levin

#### Double Boiler

Once in a while you encounter a recipe that calls for very gentle heating of something in a double boiler. Do not go out and buy a double boiler. You do not need it that often and no kitchen has enough space for another pot. Just make one when you need it. Take a sauce pot and put some water in it. Then place a metal mixing bowl on top of the pot and you have a double boiler in seconds. This works great the next time you need to melt chocolate, create custards, melt butter or create sauces with eggs, like hollandaise sauce.

# Eucharistic Revival

## **Pope Francis' ambassador conveys Holy Father's enthusiasm for Eucharistic Revival**

Pope Francis' ambassador to the United States conveyed the Holy Father's support for the National Eucharistic Revival in a speech Thursday at the spring gathering of the U.S. bishops held in Louisville, Kentucky.

Cardinal Christophe Pierre, who has served as the apostolic nuncio to the United States since 2016 in addition to being the Vatican's top diplomat in Washington, D.C., is tasked with representing the pope in his dealings with the U.S. bishops.

"Pope Francis is united with us in his desire that people rediscover the power of the Eucharist," Pierre said.

The National Eucharistic Revival, which launched on the feast of Corpus Christi in 2022, has a mission to "renew the Church by enkindling a living relationship with the Lord Jesus Christ in the holy Eucharist," as stated on its website. Sponsored by the U.S. Catholic bishops, the revival aims to inspire people to encounter Jesus in the Eucharist.

In his speech, Pierre said that Pope Francis has embraced this goal as a means to conversion of heart, a commitment to evangelization, service, and community.

"We have set out on this Eucharistic Revival because we want our people to come to a renewed and deeper appreciation of Christ's presence in the Eucharist," he said.

"We want them to know that Christ is there for them in the Eucharist: to receive their adoration, to accompany them in their earthly journey, and to feed them with the Bread of Life," Pierre told the assembled bishops.

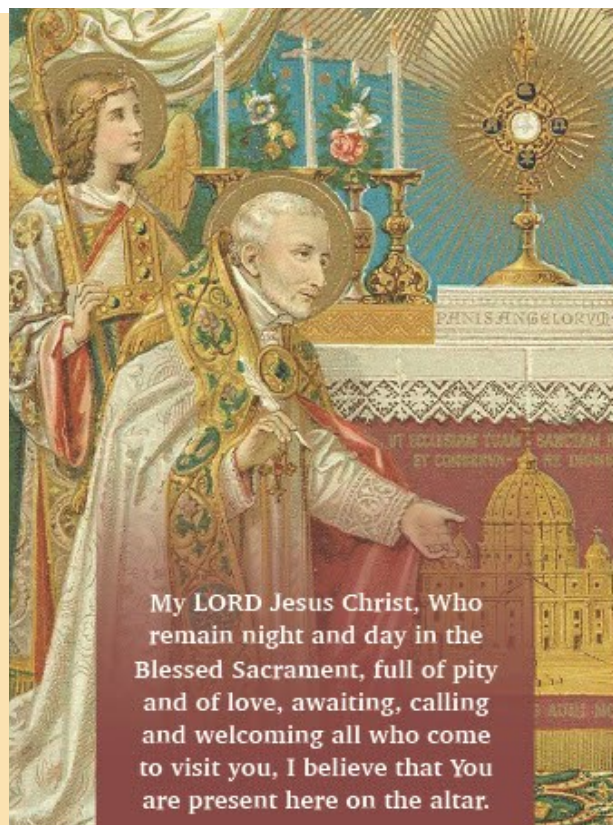
"We want them also to know the implications of encountering Christ in this way: how it calls them to an ongoing journey of conversion, and also how it commits them to a life of evangelization — of being people who offer an openhearted welcome of mercy to everyone who seeks a place in God's Church," Pierre said.

### ***Synodality of Eucharistic Pilgrimages***

The apostolic nuncio also conveyed the Vatican's support for the National Eucharistic Pilgrimages underway across the country, connecting them to the theme of synodality.

"The Eucharistic processions that are going on right now, and which will converge on Indianapolis next month, are an outward symbol of what we want to happen on a spiritual level. We want people to turn to the Eucharistic Lord, to walk with him, and to be led by him. We also want this to happen in the context of community," Pierre told the bishops.

"Our people need to experience that a journey with the Lord is also a journey with others who seek the Lord. That this journey is a true synod," he said.



### ***Bishops as Wounded Healers***

He also called on the bishops to seek the fruits of a Eucharistic revival in their own lives.

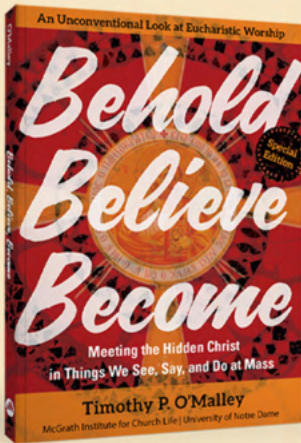
"Let us not forget: We need Eucharistic revival too! Let's be attentive in our own hearts to what the Lord is saying and doing among us," he said.

"The lesson is: The Eucharistic encounter with the risen Lord affords a new personal and ecclesial experience, one in which the wounds suffered in the body of Christ become signs of his victory over death," he said. He then suggested that the "woundedness" of the Church can similarly be a pathway forward to healing and listed those wounds.

"We are painfully aware of the most glaring wounds in today's Church. The scandal of abuse and of failed oversight. The plague of indifference toward the poor and suffering, which can affect us all. Skepticism toward God and religion in a secularized culture. And an agitating temptation toward polarization and division, even among those of us who are committed to Christ and his Church," he said.

"We find the answer in Christ. By showing the apostles his hands, feet, and side, the Lord is saying to them, and to us: 'I choose to make your sin and failure a part of the story of my victory. If the marks of my crucifixion can exist on my resurrected body, then the marks of your own suffering and failures can exist in the body of my resurrected Church,'" Pierre said.

SB 3499 makes it legal for a physician to prescribe an array of lethal drugs to a person diagnosed with a terminal disease who requests to end his or her life. The Catholic Bishops of Illinois oppose this legislation; there is a better way forward for our state.

## Sacrament Series— The Eucharist on Wednesday, June 26 at 7:30 PM



"Take this all of you and eat of it, this is my Body given up for you". These words, the apex of the Liturgy, are intrinsically tied to the Eucharist which is the focus of the next entry in our monthly Sacraments Series. The Catholic Church teaches that the Body and Blood of Christ are truly present in the Eucharist, and yet a staggering number of American Catholics do not believe in this core tenet of Catholicism which has led to the current episcopal efforts to reverse this trend through the ongoing Eucharistic Revival.

As we explore the Sacrament which is the "source and summit of the Christian Life" (Catechism of the Catholic Church 1324-1327) we are joined by Fr. Jaroslaw Mikuczewski, SJ as our guest lecturer. Alongside a Master's of Divinity, Fr. Mikuczewski is a visiting lecturer on bioethics at Loyola University's Stritch School of Medicine with a PhD in healthcare ethics as well as a Master's of Science in biotechnology with a focus on protein engineering and genetics. This event will be held in the second floor common room of the rectory. Doors will open at 7 PM and the talk will begin at 7:30.

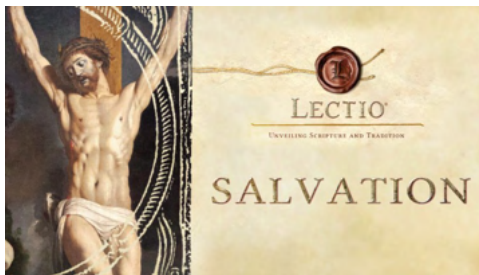

When the priest prays over the offering of the bread and the wine, they are no longer bread and wine, but become the body, blood, soul, and divinity of our Lord.

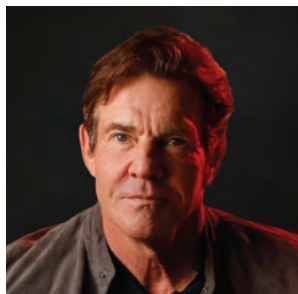

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# Gospel Reflection

*Jesus was in the stern, asleep on a cushion. They woke him and said to him, "Teacher, do you not care that we are perishing?" He woke up, rebuked the wind, and said to the sea, "Quiet! Be still!" The wind ceased and there was great calm. Mark 4:38–39*

## God Is Speaking

Do you desire to hear God speak to you? The most common way this happens is through prayerful meditation on the Gospels. Over the centuries, the saints have prayerfully pondered the Gospels and have offered various insights on the stories and our Lord's actions. Their insights are not primarily an intellectual exercise. Rather, they are first an exercise of prayer and meditation, revealing that the Scriptures have various layers of depth and meaning.

One Church Father, Saint Bede, explains from his prayerful pondering of today's Gospel passage that the boat in which Jesus crossed the sea represents the Cross by which safe passage is obtained to arrive at the shores of Heaven. The other boats that followed represent those who have faith in the Cross of Christ and follow. Though they suffer the waves of temptation and hardship, they press on, relying upon the saving power of the Cross. Jesus being asleep represents His sleep of death, and His waking represents His resurrection. The pleas of the disciples represent our need to turn to Jesus during the storms and temptations of life. The rebuke of the waves and the ensuing calm reveal the grace won by His death and resurrection, which is able to silence the demons and disordered passions. The fear that the disciples encountered points to our own fear that results from a lack of faith and trust in God.



God is able to speak these and many other truths to us through His actions and words contained in the Scriptures. There is no limit to the depth and meaning we can receive through His holy Word. Therefore, though it is useful to reflect upon the saints' various interpretations of the Gospels, it is also very important to reflect upon these passages ourselves, so as to allow our Lord to reveal to us the message we need to hear.

Reflect, today, upon this Gospel scene. Try to find time to slowly read today's Gospel from beginning to end. Read a sentence and then close your eyes and try to imagine it. See Jesus entering the boat. Ponder the boat being an image of the Cross. See the sea as the many evils within this world. Consider the fear the disciples encountered during the storm. See yourself in that boat, waking our Lord. Listen to Him silence the waves and restore peace. Hear Him say to you about your own struggles in life: "Why are you terrified? Do you not yet have faith?" As you prayerfully meditate upon this and other Gospel passages, know that God will speak to you and reveal to you the meaning that He wishes to communicate to you today.

*My sleeping Lord, as I endure the many storms of life, may I always have faith in the saving power of Your Cross and Resurrection. May I always call upon You to calm the storms and hear You speak to me the many truths I need to hear. Jesus, I trust in You.*
