

Assumption Reflection



This Monday, August 15th is the Solemnity of the Assumption of the Blessed Virgin Mary. Mass will be celebrated at 8:30 AM and 7:00 PM. Because it falls on a Monday, the day after Sunday, it is not observed as a Holy Day of Obligation. But that doesn't mean we shouldn't celebrate!

The Assumption was proclaimed a dogma of our Faith by Pope Pius XII in 1950, although belief in the Assumption has been held since the earliest days of the Church. He stated, "We proclaim and define it to be a dogma revealed by God that the immaculate Mother of God, Mary ever virgin, when the course of her earthly life was finished, was taken up body and soul into the glory of heaven."

This feast day gives us many things to think about given what we believe about the Blessed Virgin Mary. First of all, because we know that Mary was assumed into heaven, body and soul, that means she is truly there, totally, in constant communion with the Holy Trinity, interceding for us in all the things that we need. We should have great faith that she hears our prayers. Secondly, upon reflecting on the fact of the Assumption, we should be filled with hope. When looking around at our world, we may tend toward despair. But how can we fail to be filled with Christian hope given the fact that the Mother of God, Mary most holy, after finishing this life on earth ascended to heaven body and soul and awaits us there and pleads on our behalf to her son, Jesus Christ? Thirdly, Mary's Assumption acts as a reminder to all of us that this earth is not our eternal home. We live in a time of so much focus on the here and now and we struggle to put things in the grand perspective. When we celebrate the Assumption of Mary, we are reminded that it is there that Mary is, not here. And it is there, heaven, to which we also are headed. May she keep us on the path of holiness, serving her Son in all that we do until our very last breath.

Mary, Queen of Heaven and Earth, pray for us!

Are You Ready To Become Catholic?

Registration is open for The Rite of Catholic Initiation for Adults (R.C.I.A.) Each year we are blessed with several individuals who desire to enter and learn more about the Catholic faith. The RCIA program is the study of the Catholic Faith and the process of introduction into the faith community.

This class is offered for adults in three situations:

1. Un-baptized adults who desire to be baptized in the Catholic Church.

- 2. Baptized non-Catholic Christians who desire to be formally admitted into communion with the Catholic Church.
- 3. Baptized Catholics who have not yet been confirmed and desire to receive the Sacrament of Confirmation.

Adult baptism (and if applicable, Confirmation and First Holy Communion) takes place at the Easter Vigil (Evening before Easter Sunday). It is one of the highest celebrations in the Catholic Church's liturgical year!

St. Alphonsus Men's Group Thursday Evenings




St. Alphonsus Men's group meets Thursday nights to pray the liturgy of the hours, have fellowship, and to propose challenging topics to discuss.

Stewardship Reflection

"Do you think I have come to give you peace on Earth? No, I tell you, but rather division." Luke 12:51

Many of us like to play it safe, not cause waves with our family and friends, especially when it comes to politics and religion. We don't want to cause any turmoil. However, many times this is at the expense of the truth. The truth being Jesus Christ. Too many people are misguided because they rely on their own limited human ability to reason and are not allowing faith in God to guide them. Form your conscience; take a stance for life, marriage and religious liberty.

Gospel Meditation



An inward transformation occurs in a person who decides to follow Jesus Christ. Things change. They see the world differently, understand their journey more deeply

and profoundly, have their sights fixed on eternity and union with God and hold themselves to higher standards and virtues. It requires a conscious choice to be a Christian, and this choice must be renewed at least daily. While the basic premise of Jesus' message may appear heartwarming and straightforward: love of God, neighbor, and self, the implications of doing so are challenging. The true disciple is called to live radically, and often finds themselves at odds with the world or even with those in their own homes.

Holding ourselves to higher standards comes with a price. We have to leave other things behind. It is difficult to be people of faith, hope, and love in a world often fixated with its own fulfillment and self-absorption. Justice, temperance, prudence, and fortitude require sacrifice if they are to be lived with integrity. God's ways are not ours. This becomes crystal clear to those who have enough courage to stand

against the tide. Putting love into action requires that we challenge accepted modes of doing business and fight complacency. This is what makes the saints stand out as witnesses. They are simply sinners, just like us, who persevere.

People do not want to be told that they're sailing their ships in the wrong direction. Clinging to their insistence and need to be correct, they can become defensive when challenged. This can happen even with those closest to us. As much as the Gospel calls us to unity, it also can easily create division. When we love seriously, we encounter more than feelings of warmth and acceptance. "What does love look like? It has the hands to help others. It has the feet to hasten to the poor and needy. It has eyes to see misery and want. It has the ears to hear the sighs and sorrows of men. That is what love looks like (St. Augustine)." Love also has the courage and honesty to tell people what they may not want to hear but need to, and model, without wavering, a life of humble, loving, and faithful service. Don't lose heart! There are many examples of faith before us and around us. If Jesus endured the voices of opposition, so too can we. There is no need to apologize for speaking the truth.

Family Life Ministry

Ten Commandments of a Husband & Father



"Take courage and be a man. Keep the mandate of the Lord, your God, following His ways and observing His statutes, commands, ordinances and

decrees, that you may succeed in whatever you do." – 1 Kings 2:2-3

- **Develop an intimate**, personal relationship with Jesus, allowing Him to forgive you of your past, to talk to you, to heal you and to guide you. Then, trust the Holy Spirit in all things. Trust Him to provide everything you need, including financial help.
- **Get your priorities** in order: Jesus, your family, your work, etc. Develop a weekly schedule, blocking out quality time for the Lord, your wife, each child and the family as a whole. A husband's most important time during any given day is the first five minutes when he gets home from work and the love and attention he shows his wife and children at that time. Remember that your human fatherhood is rooted in the Divine Fatherhood of Almighty God.
- **Realize that you** are the "priest" of the home. It is your primary responsibility to oversee the TV and its influence, the internet and its influence, as well as the books and magazines that enter into your home. You must stand *firmly* against all evil influences, asking constantly for God's strength and guidance to lead your family in living a pure, holy and non-violent lifestyle. *Esto vir!* (Be a man!). A father fosters moral virtue within his home first and foremost by example. Get into the habit of blessing your children both alone and with your wife before they go to sleep at night or before they leave the house in the morning.
- Make sure you know what your children are being taught at school regarding morals and values. All teachers teach "in your place" as you and your wife are the primary educators of your children. If objectionable subjects or materials are being taught in the classroom, you must stand strong. The primary place for Christian morals and values to be taught and practiced is within the family home your home, which you oversee. This is an awesome responsibility given both to you (as the "head" of your household) and to your wife (as the "heart" of your household).
- **Pray with your** wife and regularly so. Try to keep a simple, but sincere spiritual journal and share it

- with her, even if your entries are just short, inspirational sentences. Trust the Lord to guide, purify and sanctify your relationship with your wife. She is the "heart" of the home. Reverence her as such. Love her with the same love and affection Christ has for His Church.
- **Spend quality time** with each child. Treat each child in a unique and personal way. The power of a father's affirming love is tremendously overwhelming and something truly wonderful. Children need it. They require it for their full and proper development. Let each child share his or her ideas, feelings, fears and problems with you. Do everything in your power to ensure that your child can always approach you in any matter. Be sure to share periodically with your wife your insights concerning each child.
- Consecrate your home to the Sacred Heart of Jesus. Set up a "prayer corner" within the home in the room where the family most gathers. In this room should be an "altar-table." On this table place a Bible, a good condensed version of the Lives of the Saints and a copy of the Catechism of the Catholic Church. On or around this table also place images (statues, pictures or icons) of the Sacred Heart of Jesus and the Immaculate Heart of Mary. The daily family Rosary is a powerful prayer. A wonderful, fixed time for daily family prayer and spiritual reading (say, a total of just 15 or 20 minutes) is immediately after supper each evening. Included here could be the Readings from the Mass of the day; purchase a daily Roman missal for this. Again, remember that you are the priest of the home. As such, you are called to be a true leader. A child will remember well into his adult life these early family practices of the Faith. They will never be forgotten. A father must be the first Christian witness to his wife and children. This is both a duty and a responsibility. Also, be sure to foster the use of sacramentals among your family members.
- Do not let sports or outside activities become more important to you or to your children than Christ and family. Spend fun time at home. Do things together as a family. This calls for creativity, imagination and frequent planning in advance. Seek suggestions from your wife and older children in this regard.

- **Pray that each** one of your children may answer the call to the vocation that Almighty God has chosen for him or her from all eternity. Never ask your children, "What do you want to be?" Rather, ask each child, "What do you think God is calling you to be?" Help them to discern their states-inlife, whether it be singlehood, the married state or consecrated religious life. Have this discussion often with your children, especially after they reach the age of 15.
- **Ensure the frequenting** of the Sacraments by your family members. The Sacrament of Confession should be partaken of at least monthly and the Sacrament of the Holy Eucharist should be partaken of at least weekly. You must make sure that your family's sense of sin is never dulled. Take your family to Sunday Mass precisely as a family. Do not give your teenagers an option here. If you do, you are not fulfilling your vocation as a father. Foster among your family members a great love of the Holy Eucharist. Tithe regularly and devotedly. Do everything in your power (as the wise and prudent king of your home) to truly make Sunday the Lord's Day and a day of family togetherness; that is, a day of prayer, relaxation and recreation. Again, this calls for creativity, imagination and frequent planning in advance. Seek input from your wife and older children in this regard. Remember, any good and wholesome recreation is really a "re-creation" of both body and soul.

Prayer For Our Family

Heavenly Father, most good and gracious God, sustain our family in Your love. Make our family home a place where holiness and love abound. In our daily actions, help each one of us to learn to be more like Jesus. Aid our family to imitate the Holy Family of Nazareth: Jesus, Mary and Joseph. Help our family to learn from the good example of those families that especially please You in their way of life. May our family members learn to give good example always by living lives in true Christian faith. hope and love. Assist our family in learning to bear pain and suffering as Jesus did. Aid our family members, too, in overcoming difficulties and carrying their crosses. Help our family life to lead to Jesus Christ, the Source of all Truth and happiness. We ask this through Your Son, our Lord Jesus Christ, Who lives and reigns with You in the unity of the Holy Spirit, one God for ever and ever. AMEN.

Holy Mary, Virgin Mother of God, we seek your patronage and we invoke you under your title "Queen of Families."


