



Father Bauer's Reflection

Seminarians, Sacraments and Joy

Almost everyone feels happier when spring unfurls itself and grows: the warmer weather, leaves on trees, flowers blooming, birds singing, and longer daylight. This "opening up" in the realm of nature hopefully also helps our hearts and minds open up to the spiritual beauty and blessings that surround us. Parishes commonly experience that in the Sacramental life of the Church as children receive their First Holy Communion, eighth graders are confirmed, and couples get married – all sources of spiritual joy.



This spring St. Alphonsus is blessed to have an additional cause of great spiritual joy: we are privileged to witness our seminarian, Michael Mehringer, receiving the Sacrament of Holy Orders as he is ordained to the Diaconate. In the journey through the seminary, the

last milestone before being ordained to the Priesthood is for a seminarian to be ordained a transitional deacon.

The Ordination Mass, celebrated by Cardinal Cupich, was held on Saturday May 21st at Holy Name Cathedral. Michael was ordained as a transitional deacon during the same liturgy when two seminarians were ordained to the Priesthood. Then on Sunday, May 22nd, the Rev. Mr. Mehringer is assisting at Mass as a deacon and preaching for the first time at the 9 AM and 5 PM Masses, with refreshments and fellowship on the veranda for Deacon Michael following those two liturgies.

When a parish is able to witness an ordination, it is a cause for rejoicing. It is ultimately a celebration of God's activity in the life of the man ordained, as well as His presence and activity in the parish community.

Religious vocations, whether to the Priesthood or to consecrated religious life, are born out of the two-fold workings of the Holy Spirit: first, in the heart of the individual who responds to the promptings they feel, and secondly, in the parish community who affirms the person and supports them in their spiritual journey and formation. Even though God speaks in the silence of our hearts, a vocation to the Priesthood is not formed in a vacuum. A community of faith helps encourage and nurture a seminarian in his formation.

For the past two years, Deacon Michael has been very connected and involved here at St. Alphonsus Parish. Those here on Sundays are accustomed to seeing him serving at Mass, and those in the Religious Education Program remember him from the zoom classes and prayer services he led. Students at AACA wave excitedly whenever he makes an appearance. He has genuinely been a blessing for the whole parish community, and it has been fun to see him interact with a many different people in a variety of contexts. We are grateful to God for sending him to be a part of our parish family.

As a seminarian, Michael had a positive impact on the faith and spiritual lives of many parishioners. And now as Deacon Mehringer, he will do that in more ways for many others, especially as he undertakes new roles of service and the ministry of preaching.

We are very proud of Deacon Michael, and we express our thanks to the Lord for all of the blessings we have received. And I'm sure every parishioner will join me in congratulating our new Deacon!

Additionally, as we are all inspired through the celebration of the Sacrament of Holy Orders, I invite all parishioners to join me in praying that God will raise up more vocations to the Priesthood and to consecrated religious life from our parish community, that our sincere faith and spiritual life may inspire others to respond with courage, hope and joy to the voice of the Lord in their hearts.

Tips to Help Your Child Participate in Mass

Here are a few tips that might help your child enjoy mass more. First **sit up close** so that s/he can see the action at the altar. Second, if your child is beginning to read, or is a more secure reader, find the passages in the missalette and, using your finger, **help him or her to follow along**. Third, **use this technique for songs**, too. It is often difficult for a child to keep up with the verses, but with your guiding hand, they will enjoy singing along. On the short refrains or Alleluias, it is possible to sing without knowing how to read. Fourth, **help your child to begin to internalize the prayers.** Even holding your child and saying the Creed into her or her ear helps a young child to know the rhythm and recognize the words as s/he grows. One last tip: **Have your child kneel beside you, and quietly explain the action** during the Liturgy of the Eucharist. Your gentle commentary can help develop both faith and participation.

Gospel Meditation

Jesus tells his disciples, "Peace I leave with you; my peace I give to you. Not as the world gives do I give it to you." The peace that Jesus gives is far different than the kind that comes from the absence of war, conflict, or affliction. The peace that God offers is found alongside suffering and hardship, not necessarily in their absence. St. Teresa of Avila offers us a bit of wisdom regarding peace: "May today there be peace within. May you trust God that you are exactly where you are meant to be. May you not forget the infinite possibilities that are born of faith. May you use those gifts that you have received and pass on the love that has been given to you. May you be content knowing you are a child of God. Let this presence settle into your bones and allow your soul the freedom to sing, dance, praise, and love. It is there for each and every one of us."

In order for us to experience the divine peace that Jesus offers, we have to allow God's presence to settle into our bones! It is only when this happens that we can be truly taught by the Holy Spirit to discern the true path

to peace and find ourselves with untroubled hearts. The world and our lives are so unpredictable and changeable. If we look for a source of lasting and real peace only there, our search will never be satisfied. Something will always unsettle and disturb us. The Jewish disciples could really relate to what Jesus was saying about peace (shalom). They already knew that it was more a matter of achieving wholeness and wellbeing than anything else.

Wholeness and wellbeing are precisely what is uncovered when we begin to really see and know the height, depth, and breadth of God's presence and promise. The elegance of God's Divine life flows through our blood and the marrow in our bones. It is that close and deep. As we breathe in and exhale God's life, peace becomes what we know within and what is exhaled out. This remains in the midst of intense conflict, persecution, suffering, rejection, and even death.

Know Your Saints



St. Philip Neri (1515 - 1595), Feast Day - May 26th

Philip Neri was known in his early years as a "good little boy." His father, Francesco, provided the necessities to his family, and his friendship with the Dominicans influenced the life of Philip. Growing up, he studied

humanities under some of the best scholars of the Renaissance. At the age of sixteen, he was sent to help his father's cousin with his business. Philip was very diligent and responsible which made him very successful at business, but he would often take time from work to withdraw to a little mountain chapel belonging to the Benedictines to spend time in prayer.

In 1533, he renounced the success and fortune he received from the business and journeyed to Rome with no money. There, he dove into the studies of Philosophy and Theology and became the tutor to two children. Philip became well-known for his humor and joy in teaching and building relationships with people. Under his care, these children improved in their studies and their faith. He dedicated years of his own life to the study of Philosophy and Theology, and then, when he felt he had learned enough, he sold his books and gave the money to the poor and began to go out to minister to people. He visited the sick in hospitals, bringing joy and laughter in the midst of their illness and suffering. He would spend time in shops, warehouses, banks and other public places in Rome, spreading his

warm personality and kindness and exhorting those he encountered to serve God.

In 1544, Philip had a mystical experience while praying in the catacombs of San Sebastian. A globe of fire entered his chest, expanding his heart and breaking two ribs as it made an arch around his heart.

In 1551, Philip became a priest and, never losing his joy and kindness, became known for being a great preacher and confessor. He shared with his community that his two favorite books were the Bible and a book of jokes.

In 1575, Philip began the Congregation of the Oratory, also known as the Oratorians. This order was dedicated to preaching and teaching. Cardinal John Henry Newman was a member of his congregation.

Philip died in 1595, and the entire city of Rome mourned the loss of the Apostle of Rome and the saint of joy.

Throughout his life, St. Philip Neri was known for his kindness and strong call to serve those in need. He was truly an apostle accompanying the poor in their needs and could always be counted on to share his good sense of humor while doing so. He was also an evangelizer who encouraged others to serve God with a cheerful spirit. **Today he is the patron saint of Rome, the US Special Forces, humor and joy.**

Mental Health Awareness


May is Mental Health Month. Mental health is as important as physical health. Total wellbeing means that you feel fulfilled in all aspects of your life. Your mental health is a big part of your wellbeing. It is important to be aware of the signs or symptoms of mental stress so you can seek help or recognize when someone you care about may need help.

5 reasons why it is important to pay attention to your mental health and wellbeing

- 1. Mental illness is more common than you think. Mental illness does not discriminate, it affects people of all ages, genders and ethnicities. One in five U.S. adults experience mental illness, 1 in 20 U.S. adults experience serious mental illness and 17% of youth aged 6–17 experience a mental health condition. Unfortunately, too many don't seek help.
- 2. Mental illness affects your physical health. Your brain is part of your body. Mental and physical health are connected. In fact, mental illness can be the root of many physical symptoms. For example, if you are suffering from insomnia, heart palpitations or fatigue, your doctor may want to rule out depression, anxiety or other mental health conditions as a potential cause
- 3. Diseases or injuries can increase your risk. Just as mental illness can cause physical symptoms in your body, physical diseases, like cancer, multiple sclerosis, diabetes and trauma such as head injuries, can raise your risk of mental illness. It is important that you are honest about your experiences when speaking with your doctor.
- 4. It runs in families. Mental illnesses tend to run in families due to both genetic factors and family cultural issues. Remember to include things like depression, bipolar disorder and attention deficit hyperactivity disorder in your family health history along with information about heart disease, cancer and other conditions.
- 5. Early detection makes a difference. Like medical conditions, getting diagnosed early generally leads to better outcomes. Getting the help you need can prevent symptoms of mental illness from getting worse and causing negative effects on your life, including strained relationships and difficulty managing work and finances.
