





May the Fourth Be with You!

Deacon Kevin Gregus, former parishioner of St. Alphonsus and classmate of our Deacon Michael Mehringer, originally wrote this reflection in the June 26, 2022 bulletin of his teaching parish, St. Paul of the Cross. Used by permission.

Movies are full of instances of self-sacrifice. Harry Stamper in *Armageddon*, T-800 in *Terminator 2: Judgement Day*, and Boromir in *The Fellowship of the Ring*, to name a few, all willfully choose to give up their own lives for another. They recognize some cause greater than themselves that they give all to ensure that it comes to completion. None of these come close as a perfect analogy to Jesus Christ, but they can point to the nature of sacrifice. When we see it in our lives, we can set ourselves toward it like Jesus does towards Jerusalem.

Perhaps you’ve been watching the new *Kenobi* show. I think Obi-Wan Kenobi’s sacrifice in *Star Wars* is one of the best examples. After watching over Luke Skywalker on a distant planet and guiding him on his quest towards finding his place in the galaxy, Kenobi finds himself fighting with his former pupil, Darth Vader. He remarks that Vader cannot defeat him, warning him, “If



you strike me down, I shall become more powerful than you can possibly imagine.” Not only is he defending Luke and his friends as they escape, but he will continue as a teacher after he dies. He eventually allows Vader to kill him so that Luke can be free and eventually strengthened.

There is, however, a major difference between Kenobi and Christ, besides the obvious lack of divinity in the former. Obi-Wan, appearing as a Force ghost, tells Luke that the only way he can complete his Jedi training is to strike down and kill the evil that is Darth Vader. He sees Vader as irredeemable, that the man he was before was killed by Vader and the dark side of the Force.

Jesus, on the other hand, spends extended time among the broken and marginalized. He does not seek vengeance, even when full villages reject him. Belief in this redemption is essential. Sacrifice is a beautiful thing, but its true value is seen when we believe that redemption is possible. It’s then that we can participate in sacrifice and salvation, and we point people to the One who offers it.

- Small Appliances


- Household Decorations

Know Your Saints

St. Joseph the Worker—Feast Day May 1

To foster deep devotion to Saint Joseph among Catholics, and in response to the “May Day” celebrations for workers sponsored by Communists, Pope Pius XII instituted the feast of Saint Joseph the Worker in 1955. This feast extends the long relationship between Joseph and the cause of workers in both Catholic faith and devotion. Beginning in the Book of Genesis, the dignity of human work has long been celebrated as a participation in the creative work of God. By work, humankind both fulfills the command found in Genesis to care for the earth (Gn 2:15) and to be productive in their labors. Saint Joseph, the carpenter and foster father of Jesus, is but one example of the holiness of human labor.

Jesus, too, was a carpenter. He learned the trade from Saint Joseph and spent his early adult years working side-by-side in Joseph’s carpentry shop before leaving to pursue his ministry as preacher and healer. In his encyclical *Laborem Exercens*, Pope John Paul II stated: “the Church considers it her task always to call attention to the dignity and rights of those who work, to condemn situations in which that dignity and those rights are violated, and to help to guide [social] changes so as to ensure authentic progress by man and society.”

Saint Joseph is held up as a model of such work. Pius XII emphasized this when he said, “The spirit flows to you and to all men from the heart of the God-man, Savior of the world, but certainly, no worker was ever more completely and profoundly penetrated by it than the foster father of Jesus, who lived with Him in closest intimacy and community of family life and work.”

Helpful Household Hints by Harvey Levin

Here is a terrific French recipe for your indulgence.

Entrecote au Poivre

2 high quality boneless steaks
2 T roughly cracked peppercorns
2 T unsalted butter
1/2 C heavy cream
1 oz. brandy

Pound peppercorns into both sides of steaks. (It is even better if this is done the day before.) Melt butter in a heavy skillet. Add steaks and sauté until steaks are at your level of doneness. (Use tongs to turn the steaks. A fork will polk holes and let the delicious juices run out.) Salt to taste. Pour in brandy and ignite the brandy. Let the alcohol in the brandy burn out. (This is very dramatic.) Remove steaks and keep them warm on a platter in the oven at 200°.

Pour cream into the skillet. Heat while gently scraping bottom of pan with the front edge of a spatula to mix the cream with the gunk from the bottom of the skillet. When cream thickens and darkens from the residue from the skillet, pour sauce over steaks.

Gospel Reflection

Hope and Invitation— Good Shepherd Sunday

“The gatekeeper opens it for him, and the sheep hear his voice, as the shepherd calls his own sheep by name and leads them out. When he has driven out all his own, he walks ahead of them, and the sheep follow him, because they recognize his voice.

—John 10:3-4

In his message for the 50th World Day of Prayer for Vocations (which is celebrated each year on the 4th Sunday of Easter) Pope Benedict XVI observed, “Hope is the expectation of something positive in the future, yet at the same time it must sustain our present existence, which is often marked by dissatisfaction and failures ... To have hope, therefore, is the equivalent of trusting in God who is faithful, who keeps the promises of the covenant.”


This sense of hope is at the heart of this week’s Gospel which places before us one of the greatest biblical images of God’s faithful care and mercy: the Good Shepherd. The Evangelist John uses the image of the Good Shepherd to illustrate the intimate way Christ knows each of us — the flock entrusted to his care — and how, like a faithful shepherd, he constantly watches over us and lifts us up.

The most important point of this Sunday’s Gospel is that eternal life is the Good Shepherd’s gift. Through Jesus and because he has given his life for “his flock,” we have an abundance of life. While it seems so simple, this fundamental Christian belief is one that we can often take for granted. And that is unfortunate, because this Gospel also includes an unspoken invitation for us: listen to the Shepherd’s voice.

Accepting that gift of “abundant life” means that we listen to and follow the direction of our Shepherd. We can see this lived out in the preaching and witness of Peter and the other Apostles (in this Sunday’s first reading and throughout the Acts of the Apostles) as they remind the people of Jerusalem that God is calling them to do and be more in Christ Jesus. The Holy Spirit blessed the Church with many new members through the obedient service of the Apostles. We have to have the same obedient spirit if we want to see the Church continue to grow in our own time.

On this Good Shepherd Sunday, we ask God to bless the Church with an increase in men and women willing to serve the Kingdom as priests, deacons, and religious brothers and sisters. But the readings also remind us that each of us (and not only our pastors and religious) has a vocation

follow the example of the Shepherd and listen to his commands by building up the Church as we promote what Henri Nouwen has called the “three spiritual qualities of the resurrected life”: unity, intimacy, and integrity. “We are called to break through the boundaries of nationality, race, sexual orientation, age, and mental capacities and create a unity of love that allows the weakest among us to live well” (from *The Road to Daybreak*), www.henrinouwen.org/read/the-road-to-daybreak/



While we can (and should) take comfort in the Shepherd’s provident care and protection — and the gift of abundant life that he offers us — we can only say we truly know this Good Shepherd if we are willing to listen to his voice and follow his commands in our daily lives. As we continue our Easter celebrations, we would do well to remember the words of Saint Cyril of Alexandria, “The mark of Christ’s sheep is their willingness to hear and obey... People who hear God’s voice are known by him.”
