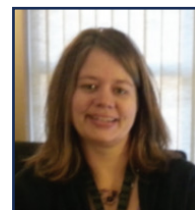
The conference begins on Monday, June 17 at 6pm with a social on the lower patio and concludes at noon on Wednesday, June 19.

#### Crucial Conversations – Tools for Talking When the Stakes are High
