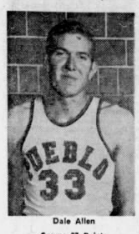


Never-Give-Up Indians Win, 93-83

Simmons Praises Reserves 'Who Played Like Veterans'

HUTCHINSON, Kan. (C.S.J.)—Head Coach Harry Simmons had praise for everyone Saturday night after a yelling group of Pueblo College students and other Indian rooters swarmed over his players as they left the floor.

"Ignatowicz (Vince) did a great job of running the club," Simmons exclaimed. "He had everybody doing the right thing at the right time."

"I'm proud of the way the fellows came back to win the game after it looked as though they were going to lose it. You can't overlook Allen (Dale) and those 37 points, either," he said.

"But it was the reserves who played like veterans under pressure who made the difference. You can't lose with guys like that," Simmons declared.

Pueblo's big third-place trophy was presented to Ken Anderson, the Indian captain, in brief ceremonies directly after the game. The presentation was made by W. Jay Tolman, dean of men at Mesa College, Grand Junction, who is national Junior College Athletic Assn. director for region nine, the Empire Conference.
