Statement of Faith: Mitzi Lesher – Thomas

In sovereign love, God spoke creation into being--creating light and darkness, bringing order in chaos, and bearing witness to God's power and grace. Created in God's image, humanity was entrusted with the care and nurture of God's good creation and called to a life in service to God's kingdom. In sinful disobedience, humanity broke their covenant with God, turning away from God's desire for creation. Nevertheless, God's love for creation is without limit or end, and finds its fullest expression in the life, death, and resurrection of Jesus Christ. Written by human hands and inspired by God, Holy Scripture is the authoritative means by which we come to know the promise and fulfillment of God's love for the world. Scripture teaches us about God as Creator, Redeemer, and Sustainer, bearing witness to the power, mystery, and grace of the Trinity. By the power of the Holy Spirit and through the grace of Jesus Christ, the church celebrates the two sacraments witnessed to in scripture--baptism and communion. Baptism marks our inclusion in the covenant community, an outward and visible sign of God's grace and the new life won for us in Christ. Reconciled to God and one another in baptism, the community gathers at Table, joining together in the joyful feast, proclaiming the saving love of the risen Lord. In Christ we witness the fullest expression of God's love and grace; a God who stoops down, taking on the form of a servant to show all creation a still more excellent way. Christ

proclaimed the reign of God by reordering justice (Matt 20:1--16), freely administering mercy (John 8:1--11), offering unconditional love (Luke 15:11--32), and passing the peace of the Holy Spirit (John 16:1--15) following his resurrection. The church, though in itself imperfect, is a provision of God's grace in a broken world bringing peace where there is strife, justice where there is oppression, and love where there is hate. By the power of the Spirit, the church strengthens the people of God for service in the world.
