The McPherson Lectureship

We welcome to worship husband and wife team Catherine Barsotti and Robert Johnston, our 2023 lecturers for the McPherson Lectureship. Their visit has been long delayed by Covid, so we are delighted to welcome them to Durham. The wider theme of their talks is Finding God in the Movies. This morning we welcome Robert to the pulpit. Later today (3:00 p.m.) Robert and Cathy will share ways we encounter God outside of church and scripture. The Lectureship continues with a breakfast with clergy and youth leaders on tomorrow.

~ About the Lecturers ~

Robert Johnston (PhD, Duke University) is Professor of Theology and Culture at Fuller Theological Seminary and a past President of the American Theological Society. His recent books include God's Wider Presence: Reconsidering General Revelation (2014), Don't Stop Believin': Pop Culture and Religion from Ben Hur to Zombies (coedited with Craig Detweiler and Barry Taylor; 2012), Useless Beauty (2004), Finding God in the Movies (co-written with Catherine Barsotti; 2004), Life Is Not Work/Work Is Not Life (co-written with J. Walker Smith; 2001), and Reel Spirituality: Theology and Film in Dialogue (2000, 2nd ed. 2006). Catherine Barsotti (PhD, Fuller Theological Seminary) is affiliate assistant professor of interdisciplinary studies at Fuller Theological Seminary and a professor at Centro Hispano de Estudios Teológicos (CHET), a Latino ministry training center in Compton, California. She is a minister in the Evangelical Covenant Church and has worked in international community development, youth ministry, as a chaplain at a domestic violence center for women and children, and a mentor at a Latino ministry training center. Her teaching areas include theology, ethics, and spirituality (in Spanish), missiology, and theology and film (in Spanish and English).

This lectureship is made possible through an endowment initially given to First Presbyterian Church by the McPherson family in memory of lifelong members Dr. and Mrs. Samuel D. McPherson, Sr, and Dr. Samuel D. McPherson, Jr. It was established in 1999 by Mrs. Margaret "Peaches" McPherson (wife of Dr. McPherson, Jr.) and her family. Following Mrs. McPherson's passing in 2018, the lectureship now also honors her life of service and generosity. Former lecturers have been John Kuykendall (1999), J. 
