

National Humanities Center Graduate Student Residency Program

Nomination Deadline: April 1, 2022

Graduate Studies is happy to announce a collaboration with the <u>National Humanities Center</u> to fund registration costs fully for ten doctoral students in the Humanities and the Humanistic Social Sciences to attend the National Humanities Center's Graduate Student Residency Program, which will take place virtually from July 11-15, 2022.

This year's summer program focuses on Meaningful Teaching and Learning in the Humanities Classroom. The week-long remote residency program will introduce and model instructional strategies, teaching practices, and emerging pedagogical resources specifically for humanities instruction. The program also addresses career and professionalization practices to better prepare early career humanities and humanistic social sciences scholars and educators for post-doctoral work. It is an exceptional opportunity for networking, professionalization, and building pedagogical and scholarly experience in humanities-related fields.

Eligibility and Nomination Process:

Departments and programs in the Humanities and Humanistic Social Sciences are encouraged to invite a call for interested applicants and may nominate no more than two students for the program. All doctoral students in good standing are eligible if they are in the fields of the Humanities or Humanistic Social Sciences. Nomination packets to Graduate Studies include:

- 1. A student statement of interest, indicating the student's current academic status and how the summer program will enhance, advance, compliment, or develop the student's pedagogical, professional, or scholarly goals, experience, or expertise in humanistic instruction.
- 2. Two letters of support, at least one of which must come from the nominating department or program graduate director or department chair.
- 3. A current CV.
- 4. Unofficial transcripts indicating that the student is in good academic standing.
