We welcome Eddie Morrison (Cherokee), Earl Plummer (Navajo) and George Willis (Choctaw)



has won numerous awards in juried competitions for his sculpture, was our highlighted Artist of the Month in August of 2000 and was awarded and named by the Cherokee Nation a Cherokee National Treasure in 2014. Eddie has dedicated his lifetime to carving and sculpting, bringing the beauty of stone and wood to the form of animal and human sculptures with a powerful presence.
