From the Pastor

In a normal year, I would comfort those who could not come to the Holy Week and Triduum Liturgies by telling hospital patients or homebound parishioners that they can share in a very unique way in the Passion of the Lord in their own suffering and crosses. Never in my wildest imagination could I have foreseen the current situation. That advice applies to all of us, who would normally gather as a community of faith to celebrate this most holy week and the Sacred Paschal Triduum. Although our bulletin company is no longer printing paper bulletins, you can find the most up-to-date schedule of all the liturgies on our parish website at www.StPius.net/Lent. Because our church is so new, we have been blessed with the ability to livestream so many liturgies and other offerings.

Today, on Palm Sunday, we would normally gather in the Parish Life Center to hear Saint Matthew's account of Jesus' triumphal entry into Jerusalem, bless the palm branches, and process into the church. By order of the Vatican, we cannot bless and distribute palms because we cannot take the risk of the virus remaining on the palm branches. They will be blessed and distributed at a later date. You can join us for Mass on the parish website (www.StPius.net) beginning at 5:00 p.m. on Saturday, when a link to the Mass is posted. You can then access Mass at any time once that link is available, and watch at your convenience.

In addition to all the other online offerings, (including Morning and Night Prayer, Taize Prayer, Stations of the Cross, and the Divine Mercy Novena) please join us online for Tenebrae at 7:30 on Tuesday evening. This Medieval Liturgy marks the temporary triumph of satan and death, with readings from the prophets and Lamentations. Please join us online for the Mass of the Lord's Supper on Holy Thursday evening at 7:00, when we enter into the Triduum. We plan to

livestream the Passion of the Lord at 3:00 on Good Friday afternoon, online and on TV. You can join us for the Easter Vigil, beginning at 8:00 (on WMYS My Michiana) or 9:00 (www.StPius.net) on Holy Saturday evening. For the first time in my priesthood, we will not be able to celebrate the Sacraments of Initiation. Those will be done later. The Triduum will end at 5:00 that evening with Easter Sunday Evening Prayer. Finally, join us for Easter Sunday Mass anytime beginning at 10:00 a.m. (www.StPius.net) or at 12:00 p.m. (WMYS My Michiana) with Bishop Rhoades presiding.

In the darkness and isolation of these times, please look for "silver linings." Father Nathan, Sam Martinez, and I have another four "silver linings" living, praying, and working with us in the rectory. The seminaries sent the rest of our parish seminarians home to us: Brian Kempia, Brian Florin, Holden Berg, and Andy Barnes. We have been living in community, spending time praying, cooking, cleaning, and working together. They have also helped with the Angelus and daily Rosary, in addition to the classes they are taking online. I am calling this our "home-school seminary", and I enjoy being the rector!

During the last Tuesday of the Lenten Series, Father Bill Schooler will “virtually” lead the assembly in praying *Tenebrae*.

Coming from the Latin word for “darkness” or “shadows,” *Tenebrae* gathers us in a darkened church to pray psalms and listen to Scripture readings, while the candles around the Altar are gradually extinguished. When the Paschal Candle, signifying Christ, is removed, we are enveloped in complete darkness, reminding us of the mystery of Christ’s death, and the apparent victory of darkness and evil in our lives. The congregation bangs their hands on the pews, reminiscent of the earthquake at the time of Jesus’ death. Why not do that at home on the floor this year?

With the return of the Paschal Candle, we prepare to celebrate the last of the Covenants on the floor of our church – the new Covenant sealed with the Blood of the Lamb and celebrated in a solemn way in the Sacred Paschal Triduum, beginning on Holy Thursday evening and concluding on Easter Sunday afternoon.

Jesus promises that those who make a timely Confession and go to Mass and receive Holy Communion on Mercy Sunday will have their souls made as pure and clean as the day of their baptism. Because this is not possible this year, please remember that you can obtain the graces available on this day by receiving Jesus in your heart with great longing and love — also known as making an act of Spiritual Communion. God will give you all the graces you need because of your great trust in Him. God does not abandon anyone. He is especially close to the broken-hearted and those bound by disease, sin, despair, loneliness, or physical handicaps. To help us prepare for this special grace, we will pray the Divine Mercy Novena as a parish community in the Saint Pius X main church, beginning on Good Friday, April 10, and continue following this schedule:

HOLY THURSDAY

This is the day when Christians everywhere celebrate the gift of the Eucharist as our nourishment and our salvation. The Mass of the Lord's Supper begins with this proclamation: "We should glory in the Cross of our Lord Jesus Christ, in whom is our salvation, life and resurrection, through whom we are saved and delivered."

These are important words, basic to our belief that glory and suffering, cross and resurrection go hand in hand.

Three stories weave together this evening: the Passover, St. Paul's account of the Last Supper, and John's account of Jesus washing the feet of the disciples. The Gospel makes startlingly clear what the other readings imply: we are to hand ourselves over to others. To help us live out this Gospel call, we sing the *Gloria* this evening. The church bells ring during the hymn. The bells remain silent until the *Gloria* at the Easter Vigil.

After his supper with his disciples, Jesus went to Gethsemane to pray. He struggled with what was to come: "Acceptance of God's will" was his prayer. All are encouraged to pray for a while as we, too, struggle with our own wants and needs and what God would have us do. We do not end on Thursday night, but rather, break for a time to gather to tell more of the story of salvation on Friday.



GOOD FRIDAY

The celebration of the Lord's Passion picks up where the Mass of the Lord's Supper left off. We begin in silence, and the presider leads us in the humble act of prostration before the altar. The first two readings are powerful texts, followed by



John's account of the Passion. The Passion is a hard story to hear each year, yet its retelling helps us focus on Jesus' love and sacrifice for us and how great the victory and triumph. The cross is an instrument of torture and death: yet we claim it, in light of the resurrection, as a symbol of glory.

Today we know triumphant destiny in the midst of tragedy. We remember a humiliating death that leads to the glorious victory of life. We claim the cross as the wood of salvation rather than a means of torture. Good Friday is truly a good day.

(Please adhere to the CDC guidelines, including no gatherings of 10 or more people, maintaining a social distance of at least six feet between individuals, and staying home if you are sick or have been exposed to someone who was ill).

EASTER VIGIL

This longing for new life is fulfilled at the Easter Vigil celebration, in which we begin in darkness and retell the story of salvation from creation to the resurrection. We sing of our salvation in the Exsultet and then retell the story of salvation from creation, to the Exodus of the Israelites through the Red Sea, to the words of the prophets. We hear Paul's words to us, reassuring us of our share in salvation and sing, for the first time in forty days, our "Alleluias." We tell the amazing story of Christ's rising from the dead. The Vigil is the holiest night of the year! Hear the entire story, in one powerful evening.



EASTER SUNDAY

At last, our "Alleluias" burst forth like the spring flowers that surround us! After forty days of fasting, we begin our fifty days of feasting! We hear the Gospel account of Christ's resurrection and recognize Him risen in our midst.

Shaken




Today's Readings: Matthew 21:1-11; Isaiah 50:4-7; Psalm 22:8-9, 17-18, 19-20, 23-24; Philippians 2:6-11; Matthew 26:14-27:66. As we hear in the opening Gospel, the city is "shaken." People wonder who is entering their midst. During the short time Jesus spends in the city, he only rattles its residents more. He attacks the temple, the Torah, and the Jewish authorities until it all becomes too much—too much judgment, too much upheaval, too much change, and they put an end to it. They put an end to him.

But the shaking continues. Darkness enfolds the land, the earth quakes, and tombs split open as holy people are raised up. Creation proclaims what the people fail to accept:

the crucified Jesus is lord of all—lord of Jerusalem, lord of the nations, lord of heaven and earth. Let all creation bend the knee to the Lord.

All creation shook with homage to the Lord. Now it is our turn. The season of Lent gave us time to be shaken out of our complacency, to make changes, and to bend our knee before the Lord. We only have one week left to prepare ourselves for the holiest time of our liturgical year. This week we can open ourselves to being shaken still further by the only one who can rebuild our lives and ensure that we are never shaken again.



THIS WEEK AT HOME

Monday, April 6

The Lord of Life

As Jesus anticipates his death, we notice a terrible irony. People want to kill the one who raised a man from the dead. Moreover, Jesus is the servant God sent into the world. The Father, who breathes life into people and sustains creation with his Spirit, sent his Son to lead people out of darkness, to open their eyes and give them life. Although the people will crucify this servant, he will rise from the dead. During the Sacrament of Reconciliation, confess the ways you have harmed others. *Today's Readings: Isaiah 42:1-7; Psalm 27:1, 2, 3, 13-14; John 12:1-11.*

Tuesday, April 7

Failures

When Jesus speaks of his glorification, he refers not only to being raised up to new life but also to being raised up on the cross. He undergoes his glorification as one friend betrays him and another denies knowing him. Jesus is the servant who seems to have accomplished nothing, to have failed in revealing his Father to the world. As God declared to his servant, however, Jesus' work has not been in vain. Should you try again at something you had given up on? *Today's Readings: Isaiah 49:1-6; Psalm 71:1-2, 3-4a, 5ab-6ab, 15 and 17; John 13:21-33, 36-38.*

Wednesday, April 8

Facing It

We hear again from God's servant, who perseveres in doing God's will despite offensive and painful mockery. As Jesus eats with his disciples for the last time, he knows what he will endure because of his ministry, yet he "sets his face like flint" and remains steadfast. Despite all that is done to him, he will neither falter nor be ashamed. Is there a particular conflict you have been avoiding? How can you face it calmly and prayerfully? *Today's Readings: Isaiah 50:4-9a; Psalm 69:8-10, 21-22, 31 and 33-34; Matthew 26:14-25.*

Thursday, April 9

Holy Thursday

As Jesus celebrates the liberation of his people from Egypt and the many blessings God had bestowed, he prepares his disciples for the blessings of eternal life that God bestows through him. To share in this new life, we must be humble and selfless enough to give up the lives we have now. Read and pray with John 17. *Today's Readings: Exodus 12:1-8, 11-14; Psalm 116:12-13, 15-16bc, 17-18; 1 Corinthians 11:23-26; John 13:1-15.*

Friday, April 10

Good Friday

God's servant offers himself up for judgment. Like Pilate, our decision about Jesus becomes a statement about us. We profess that Jesus is God's Son and our Savior, but have we followed his way, accepted his truth, and welcomed his life? Surround yourself with as much silence as you can today. *Today's Readings: Isaiah 52:13-53:12; Psalm 31:2, 6, 12-13, 15-16, 17, 25; Hebrews 4:14-16; 5:7-9; John 18:1-19:42.*

Saturday, April 11

The Easter Vigil

Ancient texts are proclaimed to us this holy night, but even these could not prepare people for the Resurrection. Creation again shakes in fear and wonder, yet we are told not to be afraid but to embrace our Risen Lord and to go quickly to share this joyous news. *Today's Readings: Genesis 1:1-2:2 or 1:1, 26-31a; Psalm 104:1-2, 5-6, 10, 12, 13-14, 24, 35 or Psalm 33:4-5, 6-7, 12-13, 20-22; Genesis 22:1-18 or 22:1-2, 9a, 10-13, 15-18; Psalm 16:5, 8, 9-10, 11; Exodus 14:15-15:1; Exodus 15:1-2, 3-4, 5-6, 17-18; Isaiah 54:5-14; Psalm 30:2, 4, 5-6, 11-12, 13; Isaiah 55:1-11; Isaiah 12:2-3, 4, 5-6; Baruch 3:9-15, 32-4:4; Psalm 19:8, 9, 10, 11; Ezekiel 36:16-17a, 18-28; Psalm 42:3, 5; 43:3, 4 or Isaiah 12:2-3, 4bcd, 5-6 or Psalm 51:12-13, 14-15, 18-19; Romans 6:3-11; Psalm 118:1-2, 16-17, 22-23; Matthew 28:1-10.*
