

A Black woman is 3 to 4 times more likely to die of pregnancy-related complications than a white woman. Research shows that inequities in outcomes are primarily due to differences in how women are treated within the health care setting based on race (racism).

The SPEAK UP Champion™ Implicit and Explicit Racial Bias education is a total of 8 hours over two days (Oct. 12th & 19th) of live virtual interactive learning that outlines quality improvement strategies to support individuals and groups with dismantling racism, providing quality equitable care, and reducing health disparities.

Target Audience

Healthcare professionals who support and care for patients before, during and after pregnancy or professionals that care for newborns.

- Describe factors that contribute to perinatal disparities based on a racial equity framework.
