

Dr. Roger Helm worked for the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service for nearly 25 years. He focused on assessing the impact of oil and other contaminants on wildlife and pursuing restoration claims against companies that harmed plants and animals or their habitats. He began this work following the 1989 *Exxon Valdez* oil spill in Alaska and in 2010 he led the Department of the Interior's damage assessment team following the massive *Deep Water Horizon* oil spill in the Gulf of Mexico. Roger received his Doctorate Degree in Biological Ecology from the University of California at Davis in 1990 and his Master's Degree in Biology from Moss Landing Marine Laboratories, in Monterey Bay, California in 1979. Roger has co-authored a book, *Marine Mammals of California*, book chapters on the effects of oil on seabirds and marine mammals, and numerous other publications on marine birds and mammals, natural resource damage assessment and global climate change. Presently, he teaches on the effects of global climate change and works with various organizations on solutions to this potentially catastrophic problem.
