PASTORS MESSAGE











"BLESSED ARE THE PEACEMAKERS. FOR THEY SHALL BE CALLED CHILDREN OF GOD." MATTHEW 5:9

In these turbulent times, Jesus' words ring more urgently than ever. "Blessed are the peacemakers." In a world marked by division across political lines, racial and cultural boundaries, economic struggles, and international conflicts, we are reminded that Christ's call to be peacemakers is not optional. It is central to what it means to follow Jesus.

The divisions we see in our country and around the globe are more than headlines. They touch families, friendships, neighborhoods, and even churches. It's tempting to take sides, to argue louder, or to withdraw altogether. But Jesus calls us to something higher. He calls us not to be peacekeepers—those who avoid conflict—but peacemakers—those who enter the broken spaces and bring reconciliation.

Being a peacemaker doesn't mean compromising truth, but it does mean embodying grace. It means choosing love when it's easier to hate, listening when others shout, breaking down walls brick by brick and building bridges. Peacemakers do the hard work of healing and Jesus tells us that in doing so, we reflect our identity as children of God.

As we reflect on this call, consider these words by Jimi Hendrix: "When the power of love overcomes the love of power, the world will know peace."

And Mother Teresa reminds us:

"If we have no peace, it is because we have forgotten that we belong to each other."

And finally, Martin Luther King Jr. once said:

"Peace is not merely a distant goal that we seek, but a means by which we arrive at that goal."



In a fractured world, the church must be about creating peace as a witness to the peace of Jesus Christ and the kingdom of God. This month, our Vacation Bible School will be about "Creating Peace." It's especially important that our children see the church following Jesus' example of creating peace through our love for others.

A REFLECTION ON BACK BAY MISSIONS



And the Lord said, well done, good and faithful servant... (Matthew25:23). On June 7th our team was commissioned to go to Back Bay Mission and do whatever work that we were called upon to do. Our team returned after a week of service and with the help of God and lots of people we indeed completed great work. Over the next few months our team members will share their experiences in the newsletter.

You never know what will happen when you set out for a mission trip. Expectations from past mission trips and expectations of what we would like to happen often change as the trip progresses. This trip was no exception. Our work at the Mission exceeded any expectations. After 215 hours at the work site, we completed the renovation of an apartment for an unhoused veteran and renovations of the Pantry (provides food much like our FISH) to improve workspace. Rarely does a team get to complete a project at Back Bay and with the help of our Mission leaders we were able to complete two.

In addition to the work hours for these projects, we cooked and served meals four out of the five days at the Mission. Over 65 meals were prepared each day, including our "own spaghetti recipe". We covered the desk in the Micah Center, monitored shower time, sorted clothes, worked in the Pantry, shopped for the apartment, and spent time with the clients.



Although many thanks to the whole team, a special shout out to Lizzie and Kai who could often be found well after working hours visiting with the people in the parking lot, taking pictures and just "seeing" them. One special man told me, "They have been like daughters to me". Thank you to our "domestic goddess" Barb Fritz who joyfully cooked, cleaned and washed clothes all week along with her other work. Thank you to the Flexers and the Ides for transporting the team and the many suitcases to and from the airport.

Thank you to Pastor Barb who was a source of strength all week and guided us through devotions and meaningful processing and sharing. We were and are blessed to have her with us. Our expectation for our partnership with the other church did not go as planned, however we got to know them better, sharing experiences, work and meals with them. Our team felt it was meant to be.

Prayers for their continued work and all that they may need right now.

It takes a whole team to complete a mission and that is the fun part. We came together and made this happen. We laughed, poked fun at each other, cared for one another, shared "meditations", and met for devotions. With the help of God, we learned to be careful with our expectations and to look up to see God (as well as for the coffee making instructions) and that God is in control. Thank you for supporting us in the Mission.



PERSON FIRST VS. IDENTITY FIRST LANGUAGE

ONA has been exploring what it means to be a truly inclusive church. We have been considering Person-First Language vs. Identify-First Language. "Person-first language emphasizes the individual before their condition, while identify-first language prioritizes the condition as a key aspect of identity.

Definitions

Person-First Language: This approach places the individual before their condition, focusing on their humanity. For example, saying "person with a disability" instead of "disabled person". This language aims to avoid defining individuals solely by their disabilities and promotes respect for individuality.

Identify-First Language: In contrast, identify-first puts the condition before the person, emphasizing that the condition is an integral part of their identity. For instance, saying "autistic person" instead of "person with autism". Many individuals within the autism community and other groups prefer this form, as it acknowledges their condition as a significant aspect of who they are.

The choice between person-first and identify-first language can vary widely among individuals and communities. Some people feel strongly about being recognized for their personhood first, while others see their conditions as crucial part of their identity. For example, many in the Deaf community prefer identity-first language while others, particularly in the medical contexts, may favor person-first language.

Choosing between person-first and identify-first language should be guided by the preference of individuals or communities being referred to. It is essential to be respectful and flexible, recognize that language is always evolving and that individual preferences may vary. Engaging with self-advocacy groups and listening to the voices of those within the communities can provide valuable insights into the most appropriate language to use."
