### A Learning How to Learn: Practical Applications for the Adult Learner Elizabeth Soderquist E100.01

Literacy is more than reading and writing; digital literacy is increasingly important and can be integrated into ESL/ABE/ASE lessons at any level from reading stories and learning phonics at the first grade level to Algebra and Geometry for the HSE! Students become more active and less passive learners when they use technology. Then you can use these approaches to integrate technology in the content areas and connect with the ability levels of your students. You can provide your students with an active, collaborative, constructive, authentic, and goal directed learning process so they can become better learners. They will be more equipped with the knowledge and skills they need for success in their further education and workplace – while enjoying a positive student centered environment in your classroom or at home!

The past five years have been in the ECC Adult Basic Education Center, helping students transition from the ESL and HSE classes to ECC's career, technical and university transfer programs.

**Jeff Goumas** is a lifelong educator who has served in instructional, professional development, and curriculum development roles at the elementary, secondary, and adult education levels.

**Sally Guy** has been a reading instructor at ECC for 18 years. She teaches HSE content review classes, in reading and math. She has a strong interest in actively engaging students in their education and continues to attend numerous workshops, conferences, and graduate courses to further her knowledge and expertise in adult literacy. Sally has presented at local and state conferences. She has served on the statewide committee working with the ICCB on content standards alignment in reading, participated in revisions of the reading curriculum at ECC, and been involved in the CCR/SIA Pilot Training Program. Sally is the recipient of the 2014 NISOD Excellence Award.

**Michelle Kelty** is an Adult Basic Education Instructor at Elgin Community College in Elgin, Illinois. She graduated from Northern Illinois University with a B.S. in Education, and received a Masters of Education from Benedictine University. In addition, Michelle is a certified Reading Specialist and also a member of the American Federation of Teachers. She has created inhouse and state level workshops that demonstrate the importance of understanding and using standards based instruction. She has been a founding ECC team member working to align Illinois State Standards, and has been recognized for working on the CCR-SIA Pilot Program for the State of Illinois in 2015.

**Lynn Kreutzer** has been teaching math at ECC for the past 32 years. She has her teaching degree from Concordia University, Chicago, and has attended numerous workshops on both math and reading. She also is a STAR trained instructor and has taught reading for ten years. **Michael Matos** is the Director of Adult Education Programs and Data at the Albany Park Community Center (APCC). Michael has trained tutors on a part time basis for over 12 years for Literacy Works, presenting workshops in math and writing for ABE/GED tutor trainings and has presented for state and national conferences, including National COABE Conferences.

Thompson Part-time Teaching Excellence Award. In June 2016 Elizabeth received ICCTA's Outstanding Part-Time Faculty Member of the Year Award for the State of Illinois.

**Kate Thommes** has taught citizenship and ESL at ECC for 10 years in addition to her experience teaching US History, World Geography and American Government in both middle and high school.
