BUILDING & GROUNDS PROJECTS

Chapel Roof

In recent years, the giant oak tree near the office area has come to tower over the slate roof of the Chapel. Because of it, a good portion of the roof stays shaded and damp which encouraged the growth of mildew, mold and moss. If allowed to grow unchecked, the moss can grow into the cracks in the slates causing them to become brittle and crack. This is the third time in nine years that Bob Berube and Duffy Brookes have cleared the roof and then lightly bleached the slates to kill any remaining growth. The pictures show the remarkable improvement in appearance of the slates once the job is finished. Of course, a possible solution to the problem is to have the oak tree cut down. However, the shade provided by this tree for the pedestrian path and play area would be a significant loss. With due diligence, both the tree and roof will last for the foreseeable future.



Fall Work Day

Spring and fall each year is a time when an invite goes out to members to volunteer a few hours to work on a project to help improve our facilities. **Saturday, October 19** will be the primary day for organizing groups or individuals with **Sunday, October 20** for any additional time, if necessary. The success of these endeavors depends entirely on individuals selecting something to work on with advanced notice to ensure materials are available. The following are potential opportunities:

- Power washing and sealing slate landings in several different areas.

- Clearing brush clippings and "junk" from various areas on our property.
- Painting the "fish" railings that are along the walkway to the lower lawn.
- Weeding in several of our gardens.
- Weeding and raking the Play Area.
- Washing windows outside the Parish Lounge and in the elevator hallway.
- Painting the bollards in the Meeting House parking lot.
- Spreading loam and seeding areas along the asphalt walkway.

Parking Lot Improvements

Last week Duffy Brookes, Katie Duval, Pastor Diane, and Dr. Raafat Elfouley, Director of the Islamic Center of UConn (ICUC), met with University Staff to discuss some of the parking challenges.

You will notice some new changes taking effect. There will be striping done to clarify where people cannot park, there will be speed bumps installed to slow cars coming around the corner, and UConn is allowing the Islamic Center to utilize the grass for overflow parking during their service as well as their Thursday night events.

So far, parking violations have been minimal and students have been responding well to the notices put on their cars.

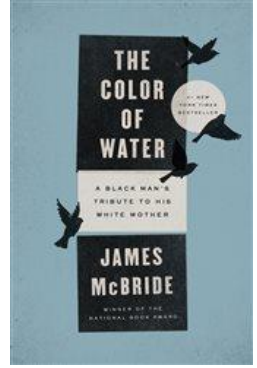

SCC BOOK DISCUSSION GROUP

THE COLOR OF WATER: A BLACK MAN'S TRIBUTE TO HIS WHITE MOTHER by James McBride is the book for discussion November 17 in person and via Zoom.

According to Kirkus Review, THE COLOR OF WATER is “an eloquent narrative in which a young Black man searches for his roots against the wishes of his mother”. As a child, McBride becomes aware of others around him and wonders why he looks different from his mother, Ruth. She is a Jewish Polish immigrant who marries a Black man, converts to Christianity and raises eleven children. Both James and his mother spend much of their lives feeling that they do not belong to their communities. The book explores the themes of racial identity, family and self-discovery.

Thanks to Price Chopper patrons for donating \$10 for a bag of food to be given to a pantry. Our pantry received 122 bags each containing peanut butter, chicken noodle soup, a can of tuna, a can of white meat chicken, pasta, and a can of kidney beans. What a help!!

Four pairs of size 10 shoes arrived at the pantry and all were distributed to young men. Did you know that Gail Kaponos picks up leftover food from the three Mansfield schools every Friday and takes it to Covenant Soup Kitchen? This is part of a "Waste Less" emphasis for the Town of Mansfield.

Spotlight on the Volunteer of the Month

Ray and Jane Joesten are in the spotlight this month. The Joestens have been long time members of SCC, and they have participated on many boards and committees and volunteer activities and are both part of the deaconate.

Ray is amazing! He has been the chair for Diane's search committee, past chair of the Governing Board and has served on many other boards and committees.

He is currently involved in the pantry by taking pantry registrations and statistics, he and Jane weekly pick up food from Cumberland Farms in Coventry and Big Y in Tolland and Midwest Food Bank in Manchester once a month. He and Jane spent hours of hard work transporting hundreds of pounds of food and household goods from Hilltop Apartments to the food pantry at the end of the UConn spring semester last year.

Both in charge of Thanksgiving food organization and distribution

They spend endless hours in the pantry and working behind the scenes to make it run smoothly.

Ray is in charge of transportation needs and quietly takes many people to doctor's appointments, etc. (If you are interested in helping out in this area let Ray know). In 2023 he spent 75 hours driving a total of 964 miles on 33 trips.

He also shares his musical talent by sharing his guitar with the rest of us when we have had sing-a-longs.

Jane seems to have tireless energy and always is positive and upbeat. Along with the many things she does with Ray, she also has a list of accomplishments.

She has been in charge of pantry for several years; currently does all retail purchases and in charge of inventory, and many other parts of the operation

She orders flowers and poinsettias for the spring plant sale and the Christmas Bazaar.

Jane, with many others worked on the refugee resettlement for two different families

She participated in WALK for HUNGER in May.

Jane always quietly volunteers for many activities and responsibilities around the church.

Storrs Congregational church is blessed beyond measurement for these two outstanding individuals.

REFLECTION

A Reflection for October

Did you ever throw away things in a different trash container so people won't know it is yours? Many years ago, I had a large bucket of candies in my office at work. I remember mindlessly eating them during a stressful assignment, until the end of my work day arrived and I looked down into my trash and it was filled with candy wrappers! What would the janitor think of me when she emptied my trash, seeing that many candy wrappers? I scooped them out and put some in the bathroom trash and some in the break room trash, leaving a respectable few in my own trash bucket.

I was trying to hide my overindulgence, lest I be judged.

Judgement is not always a bad thing. As human beings, we have to make judgements throughout our lives. Should I go on this trip? Should I take this job? Should I adopt this dog/cat? (yes, always!) Making judgements based on the knowledge we are able to gain from researching a situation beforehand is a good thing. "Use your own judgement," my mother would always say when asked to help us make a decision.

But, what about judgement of other people? Many times, as much as I try not to, I'm sure I slip into judgement of others, too, even subconsciously. Seeing a shriveled dead philodendron plant, my first thought might be, how can someone possibly kill a hardy plant like that? Turns out they were away from home for a long time helping a sick relative. Or, when seeing an unkempt lawn, I might wonder how can someone let their grass grow so long. Then finding out they were recovering from an injury and could not do it. And, the janitor wouldn't have known I was trying to meet an important deadline when I ate all those candies out of stress. It's worth keeping in mind that there's usually a different perspective attached to a situation we are tempted to judge, which might not be immediately obvious.

With so many much larger controversial topics facing our world today, there seems to be no end to judgement. Wouldn't it be wonderful if the diverse inhabitants of our earth could be more tolerant of others' differences in religion, politics, and lifestyles, and refrain from the labels of good, bad, right, or wrong or believing that there is only one way to do things or one correct belief system? Let us continue to do our part to build a culture in which judging is diminished, and kindness, perspective-taking, and understanding are given plentiful grounds to grow.
