NEWS FROM THE GOVERNING BOARD

Governing Board Minutes—Oct. 12

Attendance: Bruce Bergen, Cass Crewdson, Tina Huey, David Jordan, Annetta Miller (Clerk) Paul Schur (Chair), The Rev. Diane Seaborn (Senior Minister) Zoe Strickler, Nancy Tomastik

Paul Schur convened the meeting at 7:04. The meeting opened with a prayer and reflection.

Present to Speak: Carol Jordan spoke about the pecan-sale fundraiser. Pecans will once again be available for pre-order from Schermer Pecans in Georgia. A number of varieties will be available. The pecans will be sold at a fixed price of \$12 per bag as in years past. Proceeds will go to WAIM's energy assistance fund. The pecans are slated to arrive sometime in November.

Consent Agenda:

Nancy Tomastik moved to approve the following agenda items, with thanks to all for their good work. Zoe Strickler seconded the motion, and the board approved unanimously.

1. That the Board approves the Minutes of the September 14, 2022, meeting of the Governing Board.
2. The Board acknowledges receipt of the September 2022 report of the treasurer.
3. The Board acknowledges receipt of updates from the Lead Ministry Coordinators

OLD BUSINESS

Stewardship Update: Paul Schur reported that the Stewardship Committee was hard at work on this year's campaign. Fliers and a bulletin insert were complete, and speakers lined up to participate in Sunday services.

Oct. 9 Congregational Meeting: The board reviewed comments from the special congregational meeting on October 9 and set funding priorities based on the results of a priority-ranking exercise completed by those who attended.

The results of the exercise were as follows, ranked from highest to lowest priority.

1. Heat and air condition (AC) the Office and Memorial room
2. Heat and AC the Auditorium
3. AC for the Parish House Lounge (heat is adequate)
4. Portable AC for the offices, library, and room 201
5. Complete the repairs of the chapel organ

6. Consider repair or replacement of the windows in the Meeting House
7. Consider window treatment such as sheer curtains, shades or drapes for darkening, or not have window coverings
8. Consider ice sheet shields to prevent damage to parked vehicles or harm to people from ice falling from the slate roofs. Block off parking / walkways as necessary
9. AC for the Meeting House. There were several comments that this should be removed from consideration.

Funding: David Jordan, Assistant Treasurer, spoke about possible funding sources--both budgeted and off-budget-- that might be available for financing the projects. A contribution of \$5,000 is also anticipated.

Special Congregational Meeting on Oct. 23: Based on the congregation's input, the information Dave provided, and board discussion, the board unanimously approved a motion to call a special congregational meeting on October 23. Nancy Tomastik made the motion and Cass Crewdson seconded.

Motions to be considered at the congregational meeting:

MOTION: To approve the expenditure of \$9,360 to install mini-split heat pumps for the Office Administrator's office and the Memorial Room both serviced by a single condenser for heating and cooling to be funded as follows:

Women's Fellowship Legacy Fund:	\$ 5,000
Putnam Dividends Fund:	\$ 3,110
Eversource Rebate:	\$ 1,250
TOTAL	\$ 9,360

Nancy Tomastik made the motion, which was seconded by Cass Crewdson. The motion passed with unanimous approval.

MOTION: To approve the expenditure of \$17,275 to install three mini-split heat pumps for the Parish House Auditorium serviced by a single condenser for heating and cooling to be funded as follows:

Donations:	\$ 5,000
Major Projects Fund:	\$ 12,275
TOTAL	\$ 17,275

Nancy Tomastik made the motion, which was seconded by Tina Huey. The motion passed with unanimous approval.

MOTION: To call a special congregational meeting for Oct. 23, 2022, following worship to consider these projects and other items the congregation may wish to raise.

Nancy Tomastik made the motion, which was seconded by Cass Crewdson. The motion passed with unanimous approval.

Other budget discussion:

- Duffy Brookes said he has a line on a possible donation of 5 air conditioners for the lounge.
- Dave presented options for financing the second phase of the projects, i.e., projects 4, 5, and 6 on the priority list.

MOTION: To authorize board members to investigate ways to complete Projects 4, 5, and 6 on the priority list. Nancy Tomastik made the motion; Zoe Strickler seconded. The motion was approved with no dissent.

Weekend Holidays: The board discussed the possibility of offering more flexibility to staff for paid time off when holidays fall on a weekend. The Personnel Committee will further consider the matter.

NEW BUSINESS:

Resignation

MOTION: The board moved to accept the resignation of Elaine Chague from the board, with gratitude for her service.

2023 Budget Discussion: Paul announced that December 4 was being considered for a congregational budget discussion meeting. The board will discuss the budget at its next meeting, which was moved from Nov. 6 to November 16 to accommodate budget discussions.

- Dave Jordan reviewed an initial draft of the budget, which revealed a projected deficit. However, Dave said the operating reserve fund could be used to help offset this.
- He said church members often step up with donations in the face of such shortfalls. On a positive note, he said the church property and buildings have gone up in value and are now worth between \$2.25 million and \$2.5 million.
- Zoe Strickler noted that more members of our congregation are on fixed incomes and that there are fewer young families in the church, which has contributed to shrinking budgets.
- Paul encouraged board members to talk to congregants about what their priorities are for the budget

Food Pantry Expansion: Pastor Diane said there has been conversation among Food Pantry volunteers about expanding the food pantry to be more inclusive of food-insecure UConn students. The question is whether to further expand here at the church or put energy into supporting the development of a food pantry on the UConn campus.

Christmas Bazaar: Pastor Diane noted that plans for the Christmas Bazaar were uncertain, as no one has stepped up to take a leadership role this year. There may not be time to pull a team together.

Pecan Sale:

MOTION: Bruce Bergen moved, and Tina Huey seconded, a motion to approve the pecan sale fundraiser, with proceeds going to WAIM. The motion was unanimously approved.

Safe Church Policy: While Elaine Chague has resigned from the board, she is willing to help review the policy. Cass is still looking for one more person to help with this review.

Review of Lead Ministry Coordinators: Paul suggested having conversations with each Lead Ministry Coordinator to discuss their ministries. Pastor Diane noted that a decision about whether to make Just Peace a lead ministry was pending and would be considered by Sue Irvine, chair of the Leadership Discernment Committee, and Jan Hoyle, lead ministry coordinator for Outreach.

Confidentiality of Prayer Requests: Paul noted that our worship services are public on YouTube and asked the board to consider whether prayer requests should be confidential. Right now, Paul said he would pull together a committee to look into the matter.

Heritage Sunday Honoree: The board considered whether the church should recognize an honoree this year on Heritage Sunday. It was decided that, in the interest of time, such honors should be conferred at a later date.

Juneteenth Holiday: Should Juneteenth be added to the calendar as a holiday for church staff? The matter was deferred to the Personnel Committee.

Spring Fair Proceeds: Dave Jordan noted that the Board had never officially approved a recipient for the proceeds of the Spring Fair.

MOTION: Dave moved to establish an Environmental Justice Fund that could be used to support environmental causes, with the recommendation that it be distributed by the Outreach Ministry. Cass Crewdson seconded the motion. The motion was approved unanimously.

MOTION: Bruce Bergen moved, and Tina Huey seconded, a motion to approve the pecan sale fundraiser, with proceeds going to WAIM. The motion was unanimously approved.

TASKS:

- Paul to send the dates for the next meeting and communicate with the Leadership Discernment Committee about open positions on the board.
- Cass to look into finding another person for the Safe Church Committee, and to look into the adding the Juneteenth holiday for church staff.
- Everyone: Review the budget before the next meeting

The meeting was adjourned at 9:15 pm. Next meeting: Nov. 16 at 7pm.

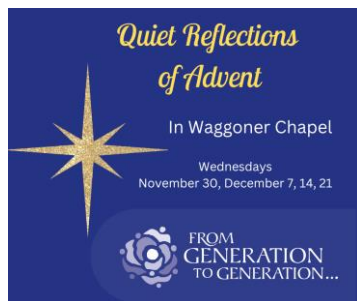
FAITH FORMATION NEWS

YOUR OUTREACH IS MAKING A DIFFERENCE

This is a busy time of giving as our church continues to assist food insecure individuals four days a week in our pantry and with special Thanksgiving and Christmas deliveries. This is possible because of your generous giving through your pledge, your extra contributions of money and products and our association with CT Foodshare and Midwest Food Bank, Big Y Tolland, Big Y Mansfield, and Price Chopper. Thank you for your donations and, especially, for your gift of your time and energy.

Volunteers from the congregation are always needed in the pantry. Please communicate with Jane Joesten or Jan Hoyle to sign up. We have several dependable UConn students and a couple of community volunteers each week in addition to church members. Communications between SSC pantry, CT Foodshare and representatives of the Student Government at UConn is continuing as we determine how to best serve more undergraduate students. The Food Pantry at the Storrs Congregational Church currently serves 171 households (390 individuals) in the community, more than half of which include UConn Students. The number of visits to the pantry has grown from 155 in August to 220 in October, while the number of individual families who visit remains constant at 83 per month. The “typical” pantry guest visits the pantry twice a month and leaves with 15 pounds of food, although a quarter of our visitors leave with 25 to 75 pounds of food on a visit. The total amount of food distributed has grown from 3558 pounds in August to 4818 pounds in October. The scale of food insecurity in our community is large. The good news is that about half of the families who visited the pantry in July through September, did not visit in October, suggesting that for these families the situation that led to their food insecurity has resolved. Behind the numbers are many personal stories. Thanks to the strong backs and open hearts of pantry volunteers, SCC pantry has become a welcoming and non-judgmental place where members of the community can “shop” our shelves, fridge, and freezers to provide nourishing meals for their families. “We share in God's love.....”

Two pop-up clothing giveaways took place in our courtyard this summer and fall. We received many items from the past members of Wesley Memorial Church in East Hartford who are remaining active in missions even though their church has closed and they are working through other churches.

Also, two cooking demonstrations and tastings were held to share nutritional information and creative recipes for the products available in the pantry. Thank you Don, Lisa, Nancy, Charles, Swapna, Chandra, Ray, Jane, Jan, Jan, Cindy, Laurie, Duffy, Anne and the SNAP program for making this happen.

WAIM Walk for Warmth place took place on November 20th. A donation of 1500.00 was sent from the Outreach budget because of the great need for heating assistance this year. If you wish to contribute to this fund, or any Outreach project, you may always do that by sending a check to SCC, indicating in the memo line where the donation should be distributed. It is also possible to do this online.

A Christmas tree will be set up in the narthex of the Meeting House for your donations of socks and gloves or mittens to be donated to the homeless, along with the many fleece hats that were made by the high school students in our summer program. Thank you to Lisa Haupt for providing the youth with the opportunity to reach out to others.

Included on page 20 of this *Carillon* is a note of 'thanks' from Patrick Barton. He is studying the manual in preparation for getting his first driver's license upon his release in March. Transportation is vital to anyone looking for work and he hopes to be able to afford a used car. Let's all be on the lookout for a reliable, affordable vehicle going on the market. You may place an order for his original design Christmas cards using the order form found on page 21 in this issue of the *Carillon*. This money will go into the account of card money and donations that will be available to him at his release.

In the season of Advent keep an eye out for ways we can help the people in the community less fortunate than ourselves. Possible areas for either gift giving or donations may include requests from WAIM and Covenant to Care in Hartford. These potential needs will be posted in the weekly emails and in the Sunday bulletins. Thank you for your generosity.

As you make your pledge and approve the church budget, remember that part of your giving goes toward many projects that help people in our community and beyond. Thank you for being a generous people.

That will serve as the last meeting for this year. However, that does not mean that the work is done because we are always in need of shawls to comfort and celebrate those in need of them.

We encourage any knitters or crocheters to join in as you are able. It is a ministry that can be done at home to fill in some of the darker, colder days of the winter season. Our group also provides the prayer squares that are given to visitors and newcomers to the church – a great way to use up small amounts of yarn and can usually be completed in less than an evening.

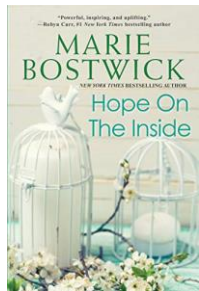

The season of Christmas *begins* Christmas Eve... and extends for 12 whole days -- a season of joy and gratitude, of reflection on what's truly important, and of generosity and giving.

Our Truest Lover -- the God who creates and redeems and sustains us all -- has given us far more than just calling birds, French hens, or turtle doves. In particular here at Storrs

Congregational, we know that God has given us a joyful, wondrous, and transformative part in God's mission to this community and to all the world.

We know that we here at SCC have had no lack of invitations to share generously from our financial resources in recent months. But we also know that as the end of the calendar year -- and, thus, the tax year -- approaches, many people make prayerful decisions about some final offerings of financial support. And we'd like you to consider whether you may be hearing the call to make Storrs Congregational Church UCC a part of that *end-of-the-year giving*.

Perhaps you might think about a special end-of-the-year gift to SCC in one of these ways:

- an ***unrestricted/undesignated gift***, which helps support our ongoing life and ministry as a congregation; or
- a contribution to the ***Ministerial Discretionary Fund***, which is an account used solely by the pastoral staff for financial assistance in confidential and/or emergency cases, among both congregants and members of the wider community.

These are only a couple of options, but they do represent a some of our strongest needs at the moment.

To make an end-of-year gift, please make sure the church office receives your donation on or before December 31st. If you intend for a contribution other than an unrestricted/undesignated gift, please clearly indicate it with your contribution (anything without clear indication will be assumed to be an unrestricted gift).

Happy Late Fall! Can you believe, we are beginning the holiday season? Some of you know how much I love to cook and bake, and that is what I am thinking about today. With the arrival of frosty weather, my cravings have turned from summer and fall grilling, salads, and smoothies, to stews, casseroles, and the comfort foods of the holidays.

If it immediately takes me back to my childhood and my grandmother's kitchen, then I know my creation will be a success.

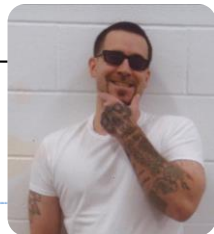
