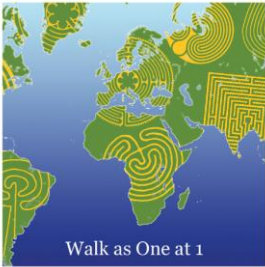

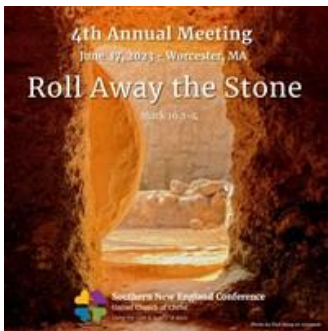

A REFLECTION BY ELLEN BRADLEY

Last month's end of daylight savings time, and springing forward, got me thinking.

My husband Ted collects clocks, and has a cuckoo clock repair shop in our home as a hobby. There are literally clocks everywhere including an entire wall of cuckoo clocks, which have recently begun migrating into the entranceway, hallway, and even the porch! People come and go, dropping off broken clocks in dusty boxes that had not seen the light of day in decades, and then pick them up a few weeks later after he cleans them and works the magic of making all of those tiny gears and infinitesimal innards cooperate symbiotically again.

His own numerous clocks (mostly cuckoos but other kinds too), are a nice display, and very unique, but the fact is, very few of them run on a regular basis. Most need to be wound every day which of course with that amount of clocks would be nearly impossible for anyone to keep up with; so most of the time they hang there silent, the cuckoo birds waiting to be summoned once again with a few yanks of the chains.

The bigger issue to me are the ones that are wound, but are in need of repair and are incorrect. Do you have any idea how it feels to have an appointment at, say, 3:00, and look at the nearest clock while getting ready and it says 8:30? You have this moment of panic immediately followed by a wave of relief as you realize that you did not in fact miss your appointment by five hours. Or you look one by one at all the clocks hanging nearby, and each one of them shows an entirely different time. Or, you hear a Westminster chime, but when the gongs begin, they occasionally go on and on and on. Where in any part of the world can it be 38 o'clock? Then you hear the mighty thunk of the weight hitting the floor and only then the gong is silenced.

If this isn't all disorienting enough, then there is the ship's clock. It's primarily used to keep track of sailors' watch time on a ship. Unlike civil clock bells, the strikes of the bell do not indicate the number of the hour. One stroke of the ship's bell indicates the first half hour of the watch. Then an additional bell is struck for each succeeding half hour. Thus eight bells indicate the end of a four-hour watch. When the time calls for two or more strokes, they are sounded in groups of two. Ted's ship's clock is the one clock in the house that always works just fine, naturally, but I can't tell the time from it! Every fifteen minutes I hear a confusing, undecipherable series of bells. Ted has tried many times to explain it to me, and has even taken to saying something like, "It's 4

bells” when I ask the time, hoping for my a-ha moment, which never arrives. I like my time in hours and half hours, thank you very much.

So while I’m down the rabbit hole of clocks, I just remember the true words of Charles Dodgson, author of “Alice in Wonderland,” to whom the following quote has been attributed: “*A clock that stands still is sure to point right once in twelve hours.*”

And, unworking clocks in fact appear to be preferable to Rev. Samuel Rutherford, a Scottish Pastor in the 1600’s who tells us to “set no time to the Lord the creator of time, for the Lord’s time is always best”. So, from now on, I will consider our clock issue to be living by the Lord’s time! And while we are doing so may we ask the Lord to help us to make the most of each and every hour and to use our time wisely to listen to each other and do beneficial things for ourselves and for others. Amen.

FACILITIES CLOSED MEMORIAL DAY

Memorial Day commemorates the men and women who died while in the military service of their country, particularly those who died in battle or as a result of wounds sustained in battle. **In other words, the purpose of Memorial Day is to memorialize the veterans who made the ultimate sacrifice for their country.** We spend time remembering those who lost their lives and could not come home, reflecting on their service and why we have the luxury and freedom that we enjoy today. We might consider how we can support and safeguard their grieving families and loved ones who are left behind.
