GOVERNING BOARD NEWS



Governing Board *Minutes*

Regular Meeting – July 14, 2022

Paul Schur called the meeting to order at shortly after 7:00 p.m. on Wednesday, July 14 and the group joined in an opening prayer. A quorum was not present until Bruce Bergen arrived.

Present to Speak: Duffy Brookes, Marsha Creese, Pam Roberts

Old Business

- Cass reported that she had a conversation with Deborah regarding the use of timecards for staff members
- Paul reported that Mike Ader's tenure as Bridge Minister is working out well.
- He said the re-opening task force will continue to encourage members of the congregation to wear masks while on church grounds
- The Board discussed the possible timeline for Pastor Diane's installation. Cass will consult with the Windham Association for available dates
- The Board discussed speeding up the timeline for the annual pledge campaign this fall

Student Parking

Duffy Brookes addressed the board to discuss his views on student parking at the church. Duffy said that while the idea of offering student parking had originally appealed to him, he had revised his thinking, in light of feedback from the board and other congregants. He said he believes the tax issues involved and increasing lack of parking spaces at the church no longer make it practical to continue offering student parking. He noted, however, that five more spaces have been approved by the Fire Marshall for church parking.

Ice Hazard

The board also revisited the problem of ice sliding off the chapel and onto cars in the winter. Nancy and Duffy noted that even if ice guards are installed on the chapel, the church will still need to exercise caution in allowing parking nearby.

New Business:***Curtains for Sanctuary***

On behalf of the Curtain Task Force (Marsha Creese, Jane Ann Bobbitt, Initially Eileen Metzger), Marsha Creese presented a proposal for installing new window treatments in the sanctuary. The existing curtains are approximately 24 years old and showing their age.

In considering possible replacements, Marsha said the group prioritized fabrics that would optimize acoustics, be aesthetically pleasing, and allow the flow of light into the sanctuary so that worshipers could see outside. The committee also explored whether the curtains might provide a degree of insulation to minimize heat in summer and cold in winter.

The group met with representatives from The Kellner Store in Vernon, which had installed the original curtains, and with Budget Blinds of Glastonbury\Manchester. Marsha also visited Congregational churches in Glastonbury and Columbia to look at their treatments.

In the end, the task force's recommendation was for sheer curtains that would allow the right amount of light to filter through, while not interfering with acoustics. The Kellner Store submitted a bid for \$20,000 for the project. That amount would include measurements for the new curtains and removal of the old ones.

It was noted that the committee's recommendations are for informational purposes only and will be subject to congregational approval at a later date. Marsha thanked Jane Ann Bobbitt, Jamie Lang-Rodean, Gail Kapinos, Marjorie Brown, Lynn Brown and Duffy Brookes for their assistance in preparing the proposal.

Tag Sale, Aug. 27 and 28

Pam Roberts presented a proposal for the Welcome Back Tag and Bake Sale to be held Aug. 27 and Aug. 28 on the church grounds. The event is held annually to welcome college students and members of the community to campus and to SCC. Hours for the sale will be from 1pm to 6pm. Saturday and 8:30am to 1pm Sunday, with breakfast available Sunday morning. The event will be held rain or shine.

Proceeds from the sale would be donated to the Holy Family Homeless Shelter Community

Discussion: In response to a question about how the beneficiary of this year's sale was chosen, Pam said the Holy Family shelter is in great need of support. It now has families with 14 infants and toddlers in its community of care. Shelter liaison Marie Hakmiller told Pam that the people of SCC have been steadfast supporters of the shelter for 30 years, and that this would be their greatest gift.

Pam noted that volunteers are still needed for all aspects of the sale.

MOTION: Cass Crewdson moved to approve the proposal to hold the 2022 Welcome Back Tag and Bake Sale on Aug. 27 and 28, with proceeds after expenses to go to the Holy Family Shelter Community, and to authorize Pam Roberts to manage the event on behalf of the church. Nancy Tomastik seconded the motion, which passed unanimously.

Consent Agenda

Cass Crewdson approved, and David Jordan seconded a motion to adopt the following items from the Consent Agenda:

1. That the Board approves the Minutes of the June 08, 2022, meeting of the Governing Board
2. That the Board approves the Minutes of the June 29, 2022, meeting of the Governing Board
3. That the Board acknowledges receipt of the May 2022, report of the Treasurer
4. That the Board acknowledges receipt of updates from the Lead Ministry Coordinators

The motion passed unanimously.

On-Going Projects and Proposed Projects

David Jordan presented a spreadsheet detailing projects and proposed projects awaiting church funding (attached). These include:

- The HVAC project (upgrades to heating and air conditioning systems throughout the chapel, parish house, auditorium and offices and repairs to the chapel organ) Part of this project is already complete. Total cost: approximate \$69,000
- The Curtain Project (to replace curtains in the meeting house): approximate cost \$20,000
- Numerous maintenance and repair projects throughout the church. Cost \$78,000

Sum of all project costs: Between \$160,000 and \$170,000

Particular priority areas cited were the leakage in the education building, sliding ice from the chapel, and inadequate air conditioning in staff offices.

David said the church as a whole would need to decide which projects should be prioritized. Factors to be considered include whether the church should seek other sources of income and whether people would be willing to increase their donations to help fund the projects. David noted that drawing on too many church resources at once could be financially detrimental.

HVAC Discussion

Duffy Brookes and Nancy Tomastik presented the HVAC Committee recommendations concerning heating and cooling in the Parish House and Education Building.

Nancy spoke about the HVAC Phase 2 project, which is intended to provide mini-splits heating/cooling for the administrative office*, memorial room*, auditorium* and lounge and for window air conditioners for individual staff offices, the library, and meeting room 201. Recently the HVAC Study Committee voted via email to move Phase 2 forward, with 8 in favor and 3 non-replies. Laying the groundwork began 6 months ago with contractor descriptions and quotes. Phase 2 is essentially ready to go. Nancy said it makes no sense to delay the project because general inflation and the cost of materials, including copper, will soon increase the pricing of the quotes. She noted the importance of heating/cooling for the staff work environment and for everyone else in terms of human comfort and functioning. Phase 2 is expected to cost \$39,900, and Nancy said it is her understanding that the funds are available in the Major Projects budget.

** Areas that need both heating (due to aging steam pipes) and cooling.*

David had specific questions concerning the HVAC Committee proposal that had been presented. These included:

- Parish House auditorium – There is agreement that three mini-splits is probably the right approach for this room. Placement of the units and the condenser should be chosen carefully for maximum effect and minimum visual impact. Dave is concerned with the controlling units. The control should be centralized much like a thermostat. It should be switchable between heat and AC with the seasons and not require daily intervention.
- Parish House Lounge: Since the lounge has sufficient heat, mini-splits are not necessarily the best solution. The newest generation of window air conditioners are much quieter and more efficient. So, two window ACs, permanently installed may be a better solution at a very significant reduction in cost.

- Memorial Room/Office: Since these rooms require both heat and AC, mini splits are probably the right approach. However, due to the attractive and historic nature of the Memorial Room, great care must be taken not to destroy its ~~nature~~ ambience. Alternative solutions should be considered. The unit should not be highly visible, ~~particularly on entering~~ particularly when one enters the room. One solution may be to replace the non-functioning radiator with a mini-split covered by the ventilating shroud now surrounding the radiator – if this is possible. Also, congregants who worked on the room's restoration should be consulted.
- Office ACs: Trisha's office should be included in the "new AC" list – even though she might say her existing set-up is okay.

Members of the finance committee will prepare a report on the projects, which will then be shared with the congregation.

The meeting was adjourned at 9:20 p.m.

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SERVICE SEWING, CONNECTING IN

School Supply sales have already begun! There are reports that with the students returning to in person learning the need for school supplies will exceed the demand from last year. Our Service Sewing team depends upon the savvy shoppers of this community to gather the needed items for the school kits to pack into hand sewn bags for delivery around our nation or where the need is greatest.

Supplies needed for ***School Kits*** are:

- One pair blunt scissors (rounded tip)
- Three 70-count spiral or tape-bound pads of 8" x 10-1/2" ruled paper or pads with 200-210 sheets.
No loose-leaf/filler paper.
- One 30-centimeter ruler (12")
- One hand-held pencil sharpener
- Six new pencils with erasers
- One eraser, 2-1/2"
- One box of 24 crayons (only 24)
- \$2 for mailing



Supplies needed for ***Health/Hygiene Kits*** are:

- One hand towel measuring approximately 15" x 28" to 16" x 32" (no fingertip, bath, dish towel or micro-fiber towel)
- One washcloth
- One wide-tooth comb removed from the package
- One fingernail or toenail clipper, removed from the package
- One bath size bar of soap, in the original package
- One toothbrush, in the original package
- 10 standard size Band-aids
- \$2.00 for mailing cost

A REFLECTION BY ELLEN BRADLEY

I recently went on my first camping trip! It was something that I had wanted to do for a long time and finally it happened!

It was just my husband Ted and I, and our dog Willow. We had the most wonderful time. I loved setting up camp, then taking long walks throughout the campground looking at everyone else's festive decorations. Most of the campsites were large motorhomes that were there for the whole season. People hang lights, flags, wind chimes, plant colorful flowers and put out little garden statues. You can tell a lot about someone by their campsite. Some were Red Sox themed, pet themed, angel themed, Disney character themed, one had a yellow faux traffic sign that warned, "Slow: Grandparents at Play", one sign said "Making memories one campsite at a time", and another sign was something about marshmallows getting roasted and people getting toasted. It was great fun to see all these campsites and the fun and humor in it all. Even the transient campsites, like ours, were decorated. We went right ahead and hung a string of lights, a wind chime, and put our "Home is Where You Park It" welcome mat at the threshold of our little pop up camper!

In the evening, of course we made a campfire. We were right on the shores of a lake so the full moon rose and was reflected in the still water as the darkness began its embrace.
