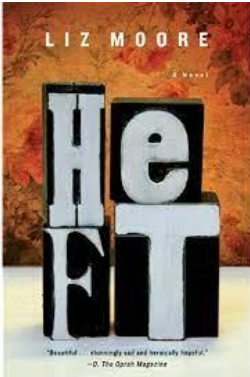

Our next book discussion is September 17<sup>th</sup>, 2023 at 4:00 pm in the Library and via Zoom.

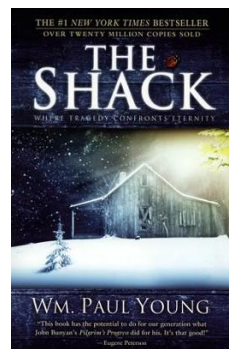
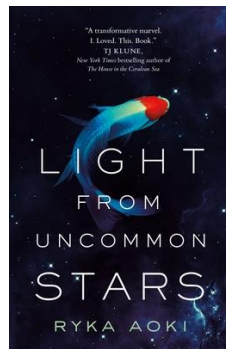
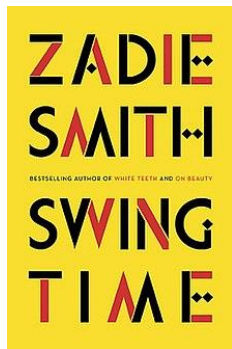
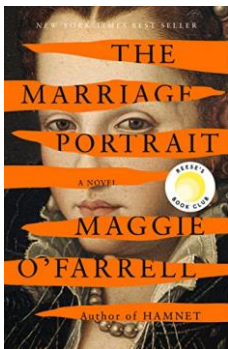

Well, my fears were for naught! It looks like we finally figured out the right wording! Since posting the signs throughout our lot, we have not had one illegal vehicle parked in any of our spots. Our Food Pantry recipients and volunteers have had plenty of parking choices and the mail carrier and other delivery drivers have mentioned the positive change. We'll monitor the situation as the academic year launches but so far, it feels like we off to a good start with clear messaging!

## A SUMMER REFLECTION

I have wonderful memories of my grandparents' house in the summertime. No matter how much the sun was blazing outside, the inside always was dark and cool. There was no air conditioning. They were far too frugal for that kind of luxury. The house was very tidy, windows stayed shut, shades stayed drawn, creating an atmosphere that was cooling and soothing. I remember that it took your eyes a few minutes to adjust to the dimness when you came inside. And then you'd see them, sitting quietly during the hottest hours of the day, watching game shows such as Price Is Right and Let's Make a Deal. My grandmother also enjoyed her "stories" (soap operas), and in later years my grandfather also developed an affinity for Bob Ross and spend many hours watching his show, although he never tried any painting himself.

They got up early, and all chores were done before the heat of the day. They did things the old fashioned way. My grandmother hung clothes on the line

and actually ironed them, after sprinkling them with water and starch. She ground ham in a meat grinder clamped to the kitchen table, and shelled peas. She also tended to some small flower beds, watering them carefully with a galvanized watering can. My grandfather, a retired electrician, puttered

around his shop and did small jobs for elderly friends and neighbors who continued to depend upon him years after his retirement. Meals were balanced and consistent, eaten at a table, properly set, on a red and white checkered vinyl tablecloth, and in the evening they would enjoy their dessert of something like ice cream or My-T-Fine pudding on their porch. Everything was done in slow motion. Life never seemed to progress beyond the 1950's for them, but when we visited as kids, it was certainly a novel, temporary break for us from the crazy, hectic, active lives that we led. But of course I never appreciated it until many years later, when we gradually come to the realization that time - or at least the time allotted to us - isn't infinite.



Although I recognize that now we live in a different era entirely with the ubiquitous electronics and constant influx of news and media and fast food and instant gratification, the older I get the more I find myself valuing that former simplicity and even trying to recreate it. I recently found, at a yard sale, a classic, push reel lawn mower. Memories came flooding back of my grandfather, and even sometimes my grandmother, mowing their small neat lawn with a similar one: the silence except for the soft clickety-clack sound it made, the aroma of the fresh cut grass rather than fumes. So I bought it, and although it is impractical for our very large back yard, I have been using it in the smaller front yard and around garden areas that are a tighter fit or that need a more delicate touch around plantings than a power mower's aggressive and indiscriminate severing. No more cutting down flowers while trying to mow close to the edge! And it is also reassuring to no longer have my toes located so treacherously close to those merciless cannibalistic whirring blades that are just waiting to suck in a digit or two. If a stick or a rock or foot gets in the way of the reel mower, it simply cannot be moved anymore until the obstacle is removed. And, I have found that there is almost something Zen-like about actually being able to form a coherent thought, or even listen to birdsong while mowing the lawn.



Simple things that worked well are now considered obsolete and antique because there are quicker easier ways to get the job done even though sometimes they create new problems. Electronics and throwaway plastic items, polluting our planet, are normal. Many kids today do not have memories of their parents or grandparents hanging out clothes or making pies. We cannot seem to get away from noise, engines, and our need to get things done fast. For what, other than to move on to the next thing? Although there is, of course, progress that I would never trade back to a prior time, such as medical advances and equal rights, I think there can be a better balance - because bringing back some of the simpler methods of doing things can be beneficial to body, mind, earth, and soul. So as much as I'm able to, I'm going to keep trying to recreate ways to bring additional peace and simplicity back into my life. It's been fun, brings back some good memories, and makes me slow down and use all of my senses to appreciate more of God's gifts in this beautiful season of summer.

## SERVICE SEWING, REACHING OUT

School Supply sales have already begun! There are reports that with the students returning in person learning the need for school supplies will exceed the demand from last year. Our Service Sewing team depends upon the savvy shoppers of this community to gather the needed items for the school kits to pack into hand sewn bags for delivery around our nation or where the need is greatest.

Supplies needed for ***School Kits*** are:

- One pair blunt scissors (rounded tip)
- Three 70-count spiral or tape-bound pads of 8" x 10-1/2" ruled paper or pads with 200-210 sheets.  
No loose-leaf/filler paper.
- One 30-centimeter ruler (12")
- One hand-held pencil sharpener
- Six new pencils with erasers
- One eraser, 2-1/2"
- One box of 24 crayons (only 24)
- \$2 for mailing



Supplies needed for ***Health/Hygiene Kits*** are:

- One hand towel measuring approximately 15" x 28" to 16" x 32" (no fingertip, bath, dish towel or micro-fiber towel)
- One washcloth
- One wide-tooth comb removed from the package
- One fingernail or toenail clipper, removed from the package
- One bath size bar of soap, in the original package
- One toothbrush, in the original package
- 10 standard size Band-aids
- \$2.00 for mailing cost

If you'd rather not shop but want to participate you can send in a check to SCC with "Health & School" kits on the memo line and we'll do the shopping for you. Please bring your donations to Worship on Sunday and leave in the Narthex or drop by the Parish House anytime during the week. Patrick is now quite independent in his transportation. He started with a bicycle, which he found rather difficult in the hills of Storrs so quickly was able to purchase a motor scooter. He has his driver's permit and is working toward receiving a driver's license.

Being a Just Peace Church makes a difference in our outreach to persons in need as well as working with systems that need to improve or change. We all have opportunities to enter this ministry at our own pace and level of interest. I truly believe you have made a difference for Patrick. He thanks you for all you have done to help him in his journey in the past four years and in his return as a contributing member of society.
