The Sacrament of Holy Communion: <u>All</u> are welcome, including children, to share in the feast at Christ's table. Communion is shared the first Sunday of each month.

The Sacrament of Holy Baptism: We gladly offer the sign and seal of God's grace in the waters of baptism, both to children and adults of any age. For more information, contact the pastor.
