BUILDING & GROUNDS PROJECTS & THANKS

This year's properties workdays involved 19 volunteers and a wide range of accomplishments, including tree and shrub pruning, treating areas with herbicides and insecticides, weeding gardens and planting annuals and bulbs. The new Peace Pole and fire lane signs were installed. Antonio's "closet" as well as fabric storage cabinets were cleaned out and rearranged. The Chapel windows were washed and the

building's eaves were prepped for painting. The Deacon's kitchen was straightened. lunk and brush were removed from the property. Other significant projects completed in May include railings on each side of the Pollinator Garden walkway that were erected and painted and the lock mechanism (that works with the Allen wrench) for the main entry door to the Parish House was replaced at minimal cost with a DIY kit. Also, Dana and Lisa Gregus donated a freezer to replace the refrigerator/freezer that failed in Room 201. This will supplement the storage space for frozen goods used for the Food Pantry. Thank you to Dana for delivering the freezer from his home and removing the broken unit.



Work has continued on preparing and painting exterior areas of the Chapel. Special recognition must go to Herb Ridyard. Since the workday, he has shown up multiple times to work on the Chapel. Once the old plexiglass was removed, Herb reglazed the stained-glass window and prepped and painted the trim. A new plexiglass sheet was cut to size and will soon be installed.

Another opportunity for members to become involved in the beautification of our buildings and grounds comes in October or whenever you might wish to volunteer for a project of your own.

OUTREACH MINISTRIES NEWS

Because of your generous pledges, donations were recently given to WAIM, our area Habitat for Humanity and Silver Lake UCC camp for administrative expenses and the scholarship fund. Also, money was sent to Bread for the World, which is lobbying for the Farm Bill that has not yet passed in congress. This bill sets funding for many food commodities and programs such as SNAP.

June 9th was designated as Mental Health Sunday with a speaker from NAMI. Thanks to Kathy Lindner, Josh and Annetta Miller for their leadership in this area. Becoming a WISE church is on the agenda.

Jan Hoyle attended a "Second Chance Rally," sponsored by the Windham Area Reentry Council, to make connections with groups in the area who are helping inmates return to the community. A group, as part of the Just Peace emphasis of our congregational, is currently communicating with an inmate at his request.

Food Pantry Highlights



Attendance at the Food Pantry remains high with new persons joining weekly. We have said goodbye to five excellent volunteers. Alice, who is transferring to Cornell University; Ethan, who has been accepted at UConn School of Dentistry; Gabi who is going on to graduate work in nutrition at Simmons, and Nikhail, who will return to campus in the Fall. A special thank you and recognition to Julie

Menard from the First Church of Christ in Mansfield, UCC, who has been a steady volunteer this year. (We are in need of two regular volunteers on Sunday morning.)

We now have volunteers picking up products weekly from six locations: BigY in Tolland; Cumberland Farms in Coventry; Cumberland Farms at Storrs Four Corners; Dollar General on Middle Turnpike in Storrs; Connecticut Foodshare in Bloomfield, as well as our monthly pickup at Midwest Food Bank in Manchester. This is providing a much wider selection for our pantry guests.

Carolyn Holmy, Jan Hoyle, Jane Joesten, Christine Koskozski and her grandson Cole walked in the Walk Against Hunger: May $4^{\rm th}$ from Dunkin Donut Park to the Capitol Building and back in Hartford.

We far surpassed our \$1000 goal, receiving over \$1500 for our own food pantry.

Spotlight on the Volunteer of the Month

Jan Castle might be described as the Energizer Bunny. Her energy and talents are unending.

Every Sunday Jan is working on the "Tech Team" during the morning worship. But did you know that before that she has helped to cook, serve and cleanup breakfast for our college students? And she is relaxed as she makes each one feel welcome. Some Sundays she will leave the tech team and accompany the choir on the piano. Or she could be the organist when Trisha is on vacation.

After church, if you don't see her at fellowship hour, it is probably because she stopped in the pantry to help out. That's not all she does in the pantry. Every week she places an order with Connecticut Foodshare which requires many online checkins to make sure we can access the items we need as they become available. Of course, she then goes to Bloomfield each week to pick up the 600 to 900 pounds of food that she has ordered, brings it back to the pantry and stocks the shelves and freezers. She also prepares the required reports for CT Foodshare and submits the invoices for payment. You probably know that she teaches music in the Willington Schools Tuesday through Thursday, so her Bloomfield trip is on Monday or Friday.

On Sunday afternoon, Jan is back at church to accompany the choral groups that meet in our buildings. Then on Tuesday, you may find her teaching how to decorate Ukrainian Easter Eggs or meeting with students for conversation. She was a member of the search committee that called Pastor Diane, and is a deacon, our University Student Ministries Coordinator, volleyball coach at EO Smith, a 4-H leader, a wife, mother and grandmother.

A Reflection by Ellen Bradley

In the cold dark winter months, when Spring was still hidden under the snow, my husband Ted answered an ad for a free vintage porch glider. "Needs work", the ad said. Now, that is not known to deter him, but - that really was an understatement! It was truly an awful sight. It was covered with rust, falling apart, and looked like something dragged up from the bottom of a lake! It looked like it should be taken straight to the dump. Who would want to take the time and effort to fix it up? But, Ted declared that it "has good bones" and took it home where he spent several weeks working on it.

He disassembled it, sanded, welded, cut new parts, painted it, reassembled it. The end result was a beautifully reconditioned vintage glider, for our porch. The metamorphosis was absolutely amazing! I guess it didn't need to go to the dump after

all.



This also got me thinking. In all of our own imperfectness, God never gives up on us, either. He sees our value and knows we are worthy of as many chances as we need, giving us unconditional love and embracing us in our shortcomings. God knows that we too all have good bones underneith our imperfections and doesn't abandon us when we fail at something or are broken inside or out. God draws us closer at that time so that we might embrace his love and grace and allow it to change our lives.


In Memorium
