PERCEPTIONS PROGRAM SHOE DRIVE



Perception Programs, Inc., a nonprofit organization that promotes wellness through innovative and holistic behavioral health care for individuals in our community offers a variety of services to our clients such as: counseling, various kinds of therapy, residential treatment, recovery programs, and various other risk and harm reduction services. We are holding a Shoe Drive for the community with the shoes going directly to our clients who need them. This Shoe Drive is being conducted because through

work with the community and the homeless we have many requests for assistance with shoes. Unfortunately, Perceptions Programs are unable to provide any shoes and other local agencies have not been able to assist with this need either. Many individuals are reporting sore feet and/or wounds on their feet due to shoes that do not fit.

This initial drive will run from Sunday, October 1st – Wednesday, October 11th. We are looking for all types of shoes, many of these shoes will go to the homeless literally living outside. While we are looking for <u>any</u> shoes particularly sneakers and boots for women and adults are needed. Perceptions Programs will provide dress shoes for those that need work or interview shoes and clothing.

Monetary donations may be made to assist this program. Make checks payable to 'SCC' with 'Shoe Drive' in the memo line. We will collect the contributions and send one check to the program on behalf of the church. Thank you for considering this vital community need.

Joining with others, making friends, socializing and speaking so others are listening is a basic way to improve our own mental health.

At the lunches, after we eat and chat a bit, a facilitator will share a poem, a reading or a prayer and each person present will have the opportunity to speak and share their feelings or whatever they would like to share. You can pass if you wish. Others will listen. The only rule is there will be no "cross talk". Later when you are outside you can chat if there is other conversation you would like to have. This is called a "sharing circle". Kathy experienced it often when she used to attend programs at the Kripalu Center for Yoga and Health in Lenox, Mass. It can be very powerful.

It can also help us to "listen" to others without interrupting with our own stories.



HERITAGE SUNDAY FELLOWSHIP FESTIVITIES





EXPLORING A PART-TIME PASTOR POSITION

- What are the needs of our congregation that could be met through a part-time, ordained clergy position? Shared preaching? Presiding over communion, funerals, etc.? Faith formation? Pastoral care?
- How might the position be configured? 20 hours per week? On particular days of the week?
- What would the budget look like for such a position?

The Governing Board is assembling a committee to explore these questions with Pastor Diane and learn how associate pastor positions are structured in other congregations of the Southern New England UCC Conference. All are welcome to be part of the conversation.



OUTREACH NEWS

Our pantry is busier than ever. The students are back in full force and there are new guests every day that we are open. Our CT Foodshare Biannual Visit will take place on Thursday, October 12, at 12:45. This is a required visit by CT Foodshare and a sharing of ideas, as well as an audit of our procedures.

Our pantry receives food products the second Tuesdays of each month from Midwest Food Bank. It is all free to us. Three or four of us plan to support their fundraiser dinner and auction, Harvest of Hope, with Geno Auriemma as speaker on October 26th. This food bank is run almost entirely by volunteers from churches in the Manchester area. If anyone from the congregation would like to attend, please give your name to Jane or Ray Joesten or Jan Hoyle so we can register you. The cost is \$150 per person. This food bank is a significant source of our resources.

Outreach, through the pantry, is preparing for distribution of food for Thanksgiving. Your donations are always welcome and needed. It seems that Thanksgiving is a long way off, but it will be here soon. The pantry is having to purchase more food than in

prior months. We are continually running out of peanut butter and jelly, oil, dish detergent, clothing detergent and personal care items.

The **Just Peace Team will meet after church on Sunday, October 8,** to address ways that they may help an incarcerated individual who has requested assistance in living a more productive, responsible life. Anyone interested in this discussion is welcome.

Funds have recently been distributed from the budget to the Covenant Soup Kitchen, the WAIM Energy Assistance Program and Back To School Uniform Fund. Both are drawing deeply on their resources. The need for heating assistance is so great that Outreach is recommending that funds from the December Fair be designated to WAIM for heating assistance.

LESSONS FROM A POOL TABLE

New hobbies can collide with our lives quite unexpectedly. Did you ever really have a connection with something new that you've tried on a whim, and end up getting so much enjoyment out of it that you wonder what you have done without it all these years? That is what happened to me with pool.

Five years ago at our B&B in Aruba, which had a large, ornately carved pool table in the courtyard right outside our room, we decided to try a game.

There was not an abundance of enthusiasm on my part - yet. The last time I played any pool whatsoever was when I was a kid; and our neighbors, who had six boys and much cooler toys than we did, had a pool table in their basement. We didn't follow rules or anything back then, mostly terrorized each other with the pool cues, so I basically had no experience at all.

But that evening we played, and each evening thereafter, soon progressing to "let's hurry up and get back to the B&B so we can shoot some pool", all the while getting more fun and competitive until the end of our trip arrived and we reluctantly were playing our last game. Or so I thought.

As soon as we got home, my husband began looking for used pool tables for sale on Craig's List and was fortunate enough to find one, which now resides in our basement. It was no small feat to get it there and reassemble it, but we did it, and have been able to continue with this fun evening ritual. We even found a Spanish radio station to complete the mood, as while in Aruba we regularly listened to lively music from a radio station coming from Venezuela.

I always seek a deeper reason for things that impact my life in such a way, with no exception here. Pool feels more than a game. The balls scattered onto the table are cheerful and colorful like giant peanut M&Ms, and I have begun to think of each ball as something that is worrying me in my life, an obstacle to peace, closeness, justice, or happiness. To make a conscious effort to sink a ball in a pocket feels something like watching the obstacle disappear before my eyes, reminiscent of an activity we did at a workshop I attended once that used flash paper to burn our problems or invisible ink to make them disappear. Although symbolic, it sends a powerful message of renewal. If you don't sink the ball the first time, try another angle, perspective, or technique, and try again. In life, God gives us many chances to re-do things that didn't work out the first time.

So there is something really satisfying about hearing the thunk of the balls colliding from an accurate shot, and therapeutic about sinking each one into a pocket, watching them disappear, like problems being solved one at a time, until the table - and our soul - has been cleared. Rack 'em up!!! Amen.

SERVICE SEWING, REACHING OUT

School Supply sales have already begun! There are reports that with the students returning to in person learning the need for school supplies will exceed the demand from last year. Our Service Sewing team depends upon the savvy shoppers of this community to gather the needed items for the school kits to pack into hand sewn bags for delivery around our nation or where the need is greatest.

Supplies needed for *School Kits* are:

- One pair blunt scissors (rounded tip)
- Three 70-count spiral or tape-bound pads of 8" x 10-1/2" ruled paper or pads with 200-210 sheets.
 No loose-leaf/filler paper.
- One 30-centimeter ruler (12")
- One hand-held pencil sharpener
- Six new pencils with erasers
- One eraser, 2-1/2"
- One box of 24 crayons (only 24)
- \$2 for mailing

Supplies needed for *Health/Hygiene Kits* are:

- One hand towel measuring approximately 15" x 28" to 16" x 32" (no fingertip, bath, dish towel or micro-fiber towel)
- One washcloth
- One wide-tooth comb removed from the package
- One fingernail or toenail clipper, removed from the package
- One bath size bar of soap, in the original package
- One toothbrush, in the original package
- 10 standard size Band-aids
- \$2.00 for mailing cost

If you'd rather not shop but want to participate you can send in a check to SCC with "Health & School" kits on the memo line and we'll do the shopping for you. Please bring your donations to Worship on Sunday and leave in the Narthex or drop by the Parish House anytime during the week.
