



### The Chef: **GABRIELLE CONIGLIO**

Private chef Gabrielle Coniglio, 30, began her cooking career as a lunch lady at an all-boys Catholic school in New Orleans after she graduated from Loyola University New Orleans. "I'm not sure if it was my ladling skills or the way my hairnet rested upon my head, but my lines during the lunch rush were always the longest," jokes the Palm Beach native. Soon after, she landed a job under chef Tory McPhail at Commander's Palace. She continued honing her culinary skills in positions at Jean-Georges' Perry St in New York, her own family's vegan eatery, and then in Los Angeles, where she was a private chef for A-list movie and music industry celebs. In 2019, she returned home and launched Overboard Palm Beach, through which she offers elegant grazing boards and private chef services. "I look forward to growing my brand in my hometown and ultimately opening a storefront with ready-to-eat meals sourced from local, sustainable ingredients," Coniglio shares.

### The Innovator: **PARIS PRINCE**

A recent graduate of FAU High School, Paris Prince, 18, is now a student at Florida Atlantic University majoring in neuroscience. The West Palm Beach resident founded SPods, a company that focuses on developing innovations within global health and, more specifically, creating products for hand hygiene. After consulting with health organizations such as UNICEF and Doctors Without Borders to gather real-time information, Prince redesigned her SPods to provide a handwashing solution for those without an external water supply. Prince has received grants from the National Science Foundation I-Corps, won several competitions including the Florida League of Cities' MuniMod, and been selected for many prestigious programs, such as FAU's startup incubator, Tech Runway. Her aim to license her patent-pending product for global commercialization is supported by numerous grants.

### The Connector: **SAÏDA FLOREXIL**

West Palm Beach resident Saïda Florexil was born hard of hearing and became profoundly deaf by age 16. After receiving her MBA from Lynn University, Florexil, now 25, founded a company called Imanyco to advocate for communication accessibility for the hard-of-hearing community. One of the company's main projects is Comunity, a first-of-its-kind app that makes it easier for deaf and hard-of-hearing people to identify who is saying what during in-person group conversations by separately transcribing and color-coding each speaker's words in real time. Florexil has received support from organizations such as 1909, FAU Tech Runway, and even Google, and her work has been recognized by entities ranging from national news outlets to the Global Entrepreneurship Network to the U.S. Department of State. But the entrepreneur and patented innovator isn't done yet. "My goal is to continue improving the technology we are working on at Imanyco and to make South Florida more deaf-friendly by training, educating, and collaborating with local organizations, leaders, and innovators."



### The Cool Customizers: **KENDALL AND LIBBY GLAZER**

Now a popular line of customizable goods, Stoney Clover Lane was born in 2009 on the bedroom floor of Palm Beach teenagers Kendall and Libby Glazer. Now aged 30 and 28, respectively, the sisters have evolved Stoney Clover Lane from beaded bracelets to a full-blown travel and lifestyle accessories brand with a large digital presence and brick-and-mortar locations in Palm Beach, Manhattan, East Hampton, New Orleans, Newport Beach, and Nashville. The Glazer sisters, who split their time between New York City and Palm Beach, have also inked Stoney Clover Lane collabs with brands like Disney, American Girl, Barbie, and more.
