As the day went by every teacher and support aides came to my class to welcome me back and at the end of the day when I was leaving our principal Mr. Weisgold came out and said he fought for me to come back and I was the only "outsider " they had let in. And I was nervous to come back...Silly me!

Cioci has played a very important part in the positive atmosphere we aim to keep here at the Elk Lake Elementary School. She is always ready to share smiles, 'air hugs' and listen to all sorts of stories. This year we had a very different start to the year - having to keep socially distanced, not having visitors in classrooms, wearing masks, and washing hands a lot. Not being able to be here in person did not stop Cioci from sharing her love with the students here. Every week she would record a video of a story she would read aloud and make sure she sent it first thing Monday morning for the students to see. At times

she would share special messages with students after the story and wished them a Happy Birthday if it was their birthday week. The students loved getting her videos and once she announced that she would be able to start coming in to see them there was a roar of excitement in the classroom. On her first day back there were a few students in one class that spotted her walking toward the building in the parking lot and made sure the teacher knew she was here. The students took turns greeting her from their desks, introducing themselves, and sharing something that they couldn't wait to tell her. It was a beautiful sight to see.
