



## Fiddler: A Miracle of Miracles (92 min)


Recommended for all audiences.

One of Broadway's most beloved and long-running musicals, *Fiddler on the Roof's* creative roots and cultural impact are celebrated in this joyous documentary. Max Lewkowicz's captivating film is full of insightful interviews with the musical's creators, performance clips from productions around the world and lively commentary from admirers like Stephen Sondheim and Itzhak Perlman. This heartwarming dedication to the musical phenomenon will have you cheering I'chaim from your seats.



## Standing Up, Falling Down (91 min)

Recommended for mature audiences.



This heartwarming story about family, homecoming and the elusive nature of adulthood stars Ben Schwartz (Parks and Recreation) as Scott, an aspiring comedian who has reluctantly moved back home after failing to hit the big time in Los Angeles. Lonely and bereft, he strikes up an unexpected friendship with his aging dermatologist (Billy Crystal). The comedic

icon all but steals the movie with his understated performance; the authentic connection between the costars gives the film its unexpected resonance.

## Crescendo (102 min)

## Recommended for mature audiences.

Renowned conductor Eduard Sporck is to rehearse an orchestra performance with Israeli and Palestinian youths as a symbol of rapprochement in the peace negotiations. The most varied voices from the ensemble are




heard in this feature film, which intensifies in a slow, steady crescendo toward its moving finale. An impressive cast of Israeli and Palestinian non-actors, led by veteran Peter Simonischek, lends authenticity to this powerful drama, loosely inspired by Daniel Barenboim's West–Eastern Divan Orchestra.

## The Rabbi from Hezbollah (64 min)

Recommended for mature audiences.

Ibrahim Yassin was born in a small village in Lebanon and was destined to follow in his father's footsteps as a farmer and shepherd, but fate had something else in store. As the course of his life turns against him,



death becomes his only wish. But just when it seems as if the story's over, a new one begins that sounds like a work of suspense fiction, placing Yassin at the heart of some of the most daring, dangerous and secret operations Israel attempted in Lebanon in the 1980s and 90s. When once again the earth trembles beneath his feet, he is forced to start all over again. The film sketches an intimate portrait of a man who through tribulations, coincidence and choice became one of Israel's leading spies.

## My Name is Sara (111 min) Recommended for mature audiences.


My Name is Sara tells the true story of Sara Guralnick, a 13 year-old Polish Jew whose entire family was killed by the Nazis in September of 1942. After a grueling escape to the Ukrainian countryside, Sara steals her Christian



best friend's identity and finds refuge in a small village where she is taken in by a farmer and his young wife. She soon discovers the dark secrets of her employers' marriage, compounding the greatest secret she must strive to protect, her true identity.

## Shared Legacies: The African American - Jewish Civil Rights Alliance (95 min)

Recommended for all audiences.



The crucial historical lessons of Black-Jewish cooperation are revisited and revived in this utterly fascinating, urgent call to action. Pivotal events come alive through a treasure trove of archival materials, narrated by eyewitnesses, activists, Holocaust survivors, and leaders of the movement, including prominent figures such as Congressman John Lewis, Amb. Andrew Young, Rabbi Alvin Sugarman, Rabbi Peter S. Berg, Oscar-winning actor Louis Gossett Jr., members of the King family, and many others.

## **Shared Legacies: A Panel Discussion**

Shared Legacies revisits and revives crucial historical lessons about cooperation between African Americans and Jewish Americans, culminating with the Civil Rights era. # The Kurt & Tessye Simon Fund for Holocaust Remembrance

The Kurt and Tessye Simon Fund for Holocaust Remembrance at Temple Beth-El is dedicated to developing educational resources for raising awareness of the Holocaust in both the Jewish and non-Jewish communities. The Fund was created in the hope that all people can learn to protect one another from prejudice, hate and violence.

As part of this mission, the Kurt and Tessye Simon Fund for Holocaust Remembrance has developed the People Next Door program which preserves the stories of twenty-three of our own neighbors in the South Bend area who called Europe home during the Nazi period of the 1930s and 1940s. The goal is to preserve these testimonies of first hand personal accounts, and oral histories of survivors and liberators, with the hope that the public re-telling of these stories will be compelling and inspiring educational resource for the public at large.

Through community programs, such as an Annual Kristallnacht Program at Temple Beth-El and the semi-annual Holocaust Remembrance High School Art and Literary contest, and educational resources including The People Next Door program, we strive to enable present and future generations to keep alive the memory of the victims, in order to prevent a recurrence of such barbarism. Their stories teach us that such degradation and evil should never happen again.
