Community Foundation of Nova Scotia awards over \$1.5 Million in Grants Through The Emergency Community Support Fund

HALIFAX, NS: The Community Foundation of Nova Scotia (CFNS) is proud to have partnered with [Community Foundations of Canada](#) and the Government of Canada to deliver the [Government of Canada's Emergency Community Support Fund \(ECSF\)](#) throughout the province, and award \$1.12M in the first round and \$467,220 in the second round in project grants to 52 local charities.

The ECSF was a \$350 million fund that was implemented with Community Foundations of Canada, the Canadian Red Cross, and United Way Centraide Canada, in partnership with local foundations across the country to provide support to charities and non-profit organizations serving vulnerable Canadians as a direct result of COVID-19.

Round One of ECSF was distributed over the summer and Round Two launched on October 5, 2020. With Round Two, an additional \$467,220 was invested through the ECSF towards local charities and other qualified donees in Nova Scotia supporting populations experiencing heightened vulnerability during this crisis through initiatives such as shelter renovations, isolation, community outreach, and online and virtual services.

“Canadian charities and non-profit organizations play a vital role in our communities and continue to do so in the face of real challenges as a result of the COVID-19 pandemic. Our government is pleased to support these organizations through the Emergency Community Support Fund so that they can continue to help the most vulnerable members of our communities during these difficult times,” said Ahmed Hussen, Minister of Families, Children and Social Development.

CFNS is pleased to announce the ECSF has supported 20 projects in Round Two serving a diverse range of community needs, including:

- \$25,000 invested in the Every Woman's Centre to fund the *A Helping Hand* project;
- \$25,000 invested in the Boys & Girls Club of Preston to fund the *African Nova Scotia Cohort* project &
- \$25,000 invested in Shelter Nova Scotia to fund the *Sir Sandford Fleming House COVID Dignity and Safety Snugs Renovation*.

“Since the COVID-19 pandemic was declared over nine months ago, community-based charities and non-profit organizations have been working tirelessly to provide emergency support, in particular to individuals and communities experiencing heightened vulnerability,” said Daniel Holland, CEO of CFNS. “Charities and non-profit organizations are pillars of their communities who are working tirelessly to serve. We know the need for funding is still significant and we’re continuing to advocate for broader recovery and stabilization support for the charitable sector.”
