Out of an abundance of caution for inclement weather, we have cancelled the outdoor Liturgy of the Palms. We will still hand-out Holy Week bags from 11 a.m. to 1 p.m. from the rotunda. You may pull into the front circle to pick them up. These Holy Week bags have items to aid you in your worship – palm crosses, items for an at-home Stations of the Cross liturgy, and bells for Easter. They will be available for pick-up beginning Palm Sunday from 11 a.m. to 1 p.m. (pull into the front circle), and Monday to Friday between 9 a.m. and 4 p.m. from the parish office.

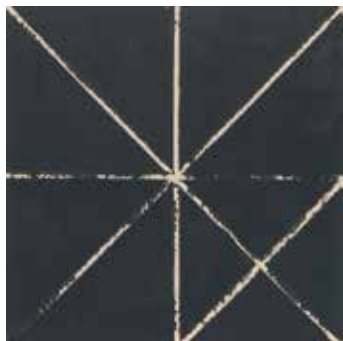
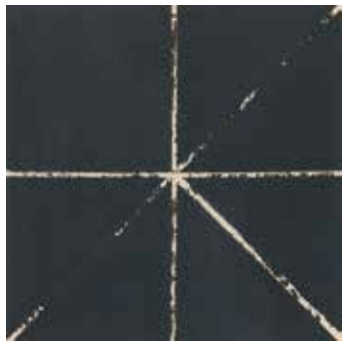
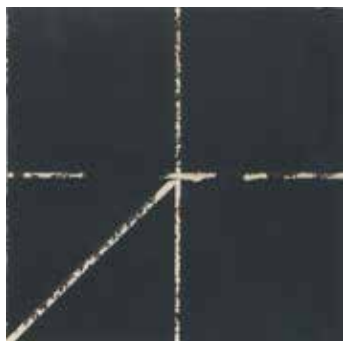
Join us on Zoom to pray the traditional Prayer Book service of Evening Prayer. These simple services will incorporate brief musical offerings.

The Proper Liturgy for Maundy Thursday

Thursday, April 1, 7:30 p.m.

On this holy night, we recall two central events in the last week of Jesus' life: his giving of a new commandment to love others as he has loved us, and the institution of the Eucharist. Both of these events took place in an intimate domestic gathering between Jesus and his friends after a meal. In that spirit, instead of offering a pre-recorded service from the church, we'll gather from our homes — clergy included — for the Proper Liturgy for Maundy Thursday with a celebration of the Holy Eucharist, complete with musical offerings.

Our traditional Good Friday ecumenical service recalls the "seven last sayings of Christ from the cross" with homilies on each of the last sayings. The Rev. Jessie Gutsell Dodson will be joined by homilists from six neighboring churches: Church of the Saviour, United Methodist; Plymouth Church United Church of Christ; First Baptist Church of Greater Cleveland; Forest Hill Presbyterian Church; Peace Lutheran Church; and the Church of St. Dominic, Roman Catholic. 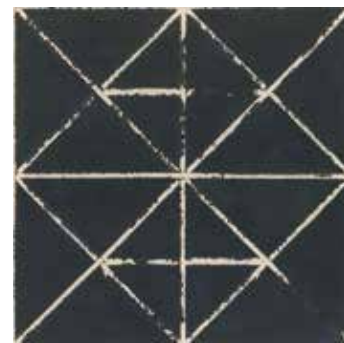
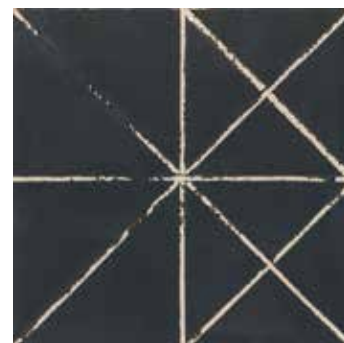

THE GOSPEL OF THE TRIUMPHAL ENTRY

Mark 11:1-11

Gospeller The Holy Gospel of our Savior Jesus Christ according to Mark.

People **Glory to you, Lord Christ.**

When they were approaching Jerusalem, at Bethphage and Bethany, near the Mount of Olives, Jesus sent two of his disciples and said to them, "Go into the village ahead of you, and immediately as you enter it, you will find tied there a colt that has never been ridden; untie it and bring it. If anyone says to you, 'Why are you doing this?' just say this, 'The Lord needs it and will send it back here immediately.'" They went away and found a colt tied near a door, outside in the street. As they were untying it, some of the bystanders said to them, "What are you doing, untying the colt?" They told them what Jesus had said; and they allowed them to take it. Then they brought the colt to Jesus and threw their cloaks on it; and he sat on it. Many people spread their cloaks on the road, and others spread leafy branches that they had cut in the fields. Then those who went ahead and those who followed were shouting,

"Hosanna!

Blessed is the one who comes in the name of the Lord!

Blessed is the coming kingdom of our ancestor David!

Hosanna in the highest heaven!"

Then he entered Jerusalem and went into the temple; and when he had looked around at everything, as it was already late, he went out to Bethany with the twelve.

PASSION GOSPEL

Mark 15:1-39

The Passion of our Lord Jesus Christ according to Mark.

Evangelist As soon as it was morning, the chief priests held a consultation with the elders and scribes and the whole council. They bound Jesus, led him away, and handed him over to Pilate. Pilate asked him,

Pilate Are you the King of the Jews?

Evangelist He answered him,

Jesus You say so.

Evangelist Then the chief priests accused him of many things. Pilate asked him again,

Pilate Have you no answer? See how many charges they bring against you.

Evangelist But Jesus made no further reply, so that Pilate was amazed.

Now at the festival he used to release a prisoner for them, anyone for whom they asked. Now a man called Barabbas was in prison with the rebels who had committed murder during the insurrection. So the crowd came and began to ask Pilate to do for them according to his custom. Then he answered them,

Pilate Do you want me to release for you the King of the Jews?

Evangelist For he realized that it was out of jealousy that the chief priests had handed him over.

But the chief priests stirred up the crowd to have him release Barabbas for them instead. Pilate spoke to them again,

Pilate Then what do you wish me to do with the man you call the King of the Jews?

Evangelist They shouted back,

All **Crucify him!**

Evangelist Pilate asked them,

Pilate Why, what evil has he done?

Evangelist But they shouted all the more,

All **Crucify him!**

Evangelist So Pilate, wishing to satisfy the crowd, released Barabbas for them; and after flogging Jesus, he handed him over to be crucified.

Then the soldiers led him into the courtyard of the palace (that is, the governor's headquarters); and they called together the whole cohort. And they clothed him in a purple cloak; and after twisting some thorns into a crown, they put it on him. And they began saluting him,

All **Hail, King of the Jews!**

Evangelist They struck his head with a reed, spat upon him, and knelt down in homage to him. After mocking him, they stripped him of the purple cloak and put his own clothes on him. Then they led him out to crucify him.

They compelled a passer-by, who was coming in from the country, to carry his cross; it was Simon of Cyrene, the father of Alexander and Rufus. Then they brought Jesus to the place called Golgotha (which means the place of a skull). And they offered him wine mixed with myrrh; but he did not take it. And they crucified him, and divided his clothes among them, casting lots to decide what each should take.

It was nine o'clock in the morning when they crucified him. The inscription of the charge against him read, "The King of the Jews." And with him they crucified two bandits, one on his right and one on his left. Those who passed by derided him, shaking their heads and saying,

All **Aha! You who would destroy the temple and build it in three days, save yourself, and come down from the cross!**

Evangelist In the same way the chief priests, along with the scribes, were also mocking him among themselves and saying,

All **He saved others; he cannot save himself. Let the Messiah, the King of Israel, come down from the cross now, so that we may see and believe.**

Evangelist Those who were crucified with him also taunted him.

When it was noon, darkness came over the whole land until three in the afternoon. At three o'clock Jesus cried out with a loud voice,

Jesus Eloi, Eloi, lema sabachthani?

Evangelist which means, "My God, my God, why have you forsaken me?" When some of the bystanders heard it, they said,

All **Listen, he is calling for Elijah.**

Evangelist And someone ran, filled a sponge with sour wine, put it on a stick, and gave it to him to drink, saying,

Bystander Wait, let us see whether Elijah will come to take him down.

Evangelist Then Jesus gave a loud cry and breathed his last.

Silence is kept.

Evangelist The curtain of the temple was torn in two, from top to bottom. Now when the centurion, who stood facing him, saw that in this way he breathed his last, he said,

Centurion Truly this man was God's Son!

THE GREAT THANKSGIVING *Eucharistic Prayer A*

Celebrant God be with you.

People **And also with you.**

Celebrant Lift up your hearts.

People **We lift them to the Lord.**

Celebrant Let us give thanks to the Lord our God.
People **It is right to give our thanks and praise.**

Celebrant It is right, and a good and joyful thing, always and everywhere to give thanks to you, Almighty God, Creator of heaven and earth. Through Jesus Christ our Lord. For our sins he was lifted high upon the cross, that he might draw the whole world to himself; and, by his suffering and death, he became the source of eternal salvation for all who put their trust in him.

Celebrant Therefore we praise you, joining our voices with Angels and Archangels and with all the company of heaven, who for ever sing this hymn to proclaim the glory of your Name:

All **Holy, holy, holy Lord, God of power and might,
 heaven and earth are full of your glory.
 Hosanna in the highest.
 Blessed is the one who comes in the name of the Lord.
 Hosanna in the highest.**

Celebrant Holy and gracious God: In your infinite love you made us for yourself; and, when we had fallen into sin and become subject to evil and death, you, in your mercy, sent Jesus Christ, your only and eternal Son, to share our human nature, to live and die as one of us, to reconcile us to you, the God and maker of all.

Jesus stretched out his arms upon the cross, and offered himself, in obedience to your will, a perfect sacrifice for the whole world.

On the night he was handed over to suffering and death, our Savior Jesus Christ took bread; and when he had given thanks to you, he broke it, and gave it to his disciples, and said, "Take, eat: This is my Body, which is given for you. Do this for the remembrance of me."

After supper Jesus took the cup of wine; and when he had given thanks, he gave it to them, and said, "Drink this, all of you: This is my Blood of the new Covenant, which is shed for you and for many for the forgiveness of sins. Whenever you drink it, do this for the remembrance of me."

Therefore we proclaim the mystery of faith:

All **Christ has died.
 Christ is risen.
 Christ will come again.**

Celebrant We celebrate the memorial of our redemption, Almighty God, in this sacrifice of praise and thanksgiving. Recalling Christ's death, resurrection, and ascension, we offer you these gifts.

Sanctify them by your Holy Spirit to be for your people the Body and Blood of your Son, the holy food and drink of new and unending life in Christ. Sanctify us also that we may faithfully receive this holy Sacrament, and serve you in unity, constancy, and peace; and at the last day bring us with all your saints into the joy of your eternal kingdom.

All this we ask through Jesus Christ our Savior. By Christ, and with Christ, and in Christ, in the unity of the Holy Spirit all honor and glory is yours, Almighty God, now and for ever.
