Any such nominations shall be submitted in writing, signed by the nominators, and shall be delivered to the Rector not later than twelve days prior to the annual meeting. Thereupon, the nominations shall be deemed closed. [Article IV, Section 5]*

CLERGY REFLECTION

Dear Parish Family,

This past September, I saw a post from a Shaker Heights school teacher, Jackie Conway-Scanlon, reflecting on things she's discovered since she began remote-teaching her 5th and 6th grade students. I've thought about her words often and wanted to do a similar exercise for our own ministry setting. So, here are some of the "silver linings" I've seen since we transitioned to "being the church remotely":



- Thanks to the little Zoom boxes, more people are learning each other's names than I've ever seen before. No nametag ministry, no matter how good, could have helped us with this learning! We're out of our Tucker Hall clusters of friends and family and building relationships across the church.
- We see each other in a different context. Normally we leave our homes and enter into the church building to gather. Now we get to see glimpses of each other's homes, and by doing so we get to know each other in a more personal way.
- Families are generally together more. Gone are some of the unceasing pressures of scheduling ourselves and our kids into oblivion. Families are spending more time together (and worshiping and learning together) more than they ever would've otherwise.
- We're connected to the church across the world. We've been able to collaborate with speakers and preachers across the country that we never would've dreamed of being able to a year ago. Tim Wise, Diana Butler Bass, guest preachers, and soon, Austin Channing Brown have all spent time with our community.
- We're all watching each other learn. Kids are watching parents learn and work and parishioners and clergy are watching each other learn. Generations are teaching each other lessons (even if it's how to unmute!) and it is powerful to see.
- The art of conversation is front and center. Normally many of us talk at once, side conversations take place, and people leave and enter the room. Now we're practicing the art of listening and sharing in even more intentional ways.

Ms. Conway-Scanlon ended her reflection by acknowledging what she really misses. I want to do the same. Here's what I really miss:

- The hubbub and excitement of standing in the Narthex as the acolytes, choirs, clergy, and parishioners enter the Sanctuary.
- The sound of our voices blending together in harmony as we sing hymns. The thrill in my chest when Karel starts "going wild" on the organ.
- Hugs.
- Sitting in my "second office" of Luna Bakery, sharing a cup of tea and meaningful conversation about hopes and dreams.
- Looking around the communion rail and seeing all the faces of the children as we begin the Eucharistic Prayer.
- Filling the sanctuary for important events in our community and personal lives.

What about you? What silver linings have you seen? What will you be excited to do again?

May the new year bring us even more learnings, the space to grieve those who won't return to the building with us, and a joyful reunion when we can safely be together again.

OUTREACH

College Now

College Now, a local scholarship and educational attainment support network, is seeking a new class of mentors to begin this summer. College Now provides financial aid counseling and scholarships, retention services, and advising to over 29,000 students and adult learners. Many of the students are from low-income families and are first-generation college students.

The time investment is minimal, but the results could be big! You'll be asked to send two emails per month and have a check-in with your mentee three times per year.

Dear People of St. Paul's,

I'm delighted to join the St. Paul's community as one of your priests! The Rev. Jessie Gutsell Dodson and I have been good friends since seminary, so I've been hearing about this wonderful community for some time. I can't wait to get to work, and to share in ministry and fellowship with you all.

A little about me: I am a life-long Episcopalian who grew up in Tupelo, Mississippi. But in the meantime, I am excited to begin getting to know you virtually!

Young Adult Formation


Wednesday, January 20, 6:30 p.m.




Baraka (1992)

Au Revoir Les Enfants (1987)

provincial Catholic boarding school, the precocious youths enjoy true camaraderie — until a secret is revealed. Based on events from Malle's own childhood, the film is a subtle, precisely observed tale of courage, cowardice, and tragic awakening.

As It Is In Heaven

Silence (2016)



Concerned, he travels to the island nation with another clergyman (Adam Driver) to investigate, only to find that the country's Christian population are being systematically exterminated. Witnessing the inglorious reality of torture and martyrdom committed against Japanese Christians rocks his faith to the core. Based on Shusaku Endo's acclaimed 1966 novel.

Stacey made phone calls to family, friends, and parishioners, and even KeyBank. KeyBank saw to it that the 26 gift cards we needed were taken care of. One friend of Stacey's, who works in the nonprofit space, donated toys from a recent drive.

"This was the most phenomenal thing I've seen in a long time," Poleda wrote. "We took everything [to Fairhill] and they were stunned at what we brought." This truly was a blessing, an example of what we can do when we're apart, and what Christmas is about.

I'm pleased to report that Brian Thompson, Dennis Coughlin, and I successfully completed the annual Men's Council venture to Target's Steelyard Commons store. (We trace this tradition to at least 2007.)

WINTER CONVOCATION IN (OF COURSE) A NEW FORMAT

Convocation will be held online from February 7th to the 14th with a series of events. Each of the following workshops will be offered once on a weeknight between February 8 and 12. We will use a one-hour (maximum) online format that will begin at 7 p.m. Bishop Hollingsworth will prerecord sermons for Sunday, February 7 and 14, to cap the online event.

Assigned prework will be provided for each workshop (watching a video, reading a chapter or two of something, etc.) so the online time will be spent directly diving into and discussing the content. All events are free, and registration for each particular workshop will be required. You may attend as many or few as you like. Here are the workshops. The schedule and registration information are coming soon.

Looking at God's church now and in the future is a keynote of every Convocation — *The Rev. Sean Steele* is Vicar and founding clergy of St. Isidore Episcopal, a 5-year-old experiment in "Traditioned Innovation" located in Spring TX. St. Isidore is a network of small-batch, sacramental, prayer book rooted missional communities. We will examine aspects of this dispersed church.

Building Relationships is a favorite part of every Convocation — In her new book, *A Family Like Mine: Biblical Stories of Love, Loss, and Longing*, *The Rev. Rosalind C Hughes, Church of the Epiphany, Euclid*, [finds] that regardless of how we define family, the ancient stories of the Bible shape how we claim our place in the household of God today.... Hughes links her personal stories with those of the Bible and offers space for us to do the same." Through prayerful and imaginative engagement, this workshop dances with some of the characters who are our biblical forerunners in faith, members of our faith history, and fellow children of the living God, bringing our spiritual family tree to life. Workshop participants will each receive a copy of Rosalind's excellent book.

Laughter and fun are part of every Convocation — Game Night: *The youth of the Diocese of Ohio* will lead us in a multi-generational, interactive, exciting game night. Followed by Compline. All ages welcome! Games like Pictionary, Hot Seat, Would You Rather, Show and Tell, Trivia, and maybe more!



Spiritual Formation is essential to every Convocation — Building upon a great earlier event at Bellwether, *The Rev. Anna Sutterisch* will lead us in Soultending: Experiential (and experimental) Spirituality. Using our bodies, found objects around our house, and some simple materials, a variety of multi-sensory activities will connect us with ourselves, each other, and God.

Exploring connections between work, faith, and vocation ground every Convocation — *Chef Lonny Gatlin and Farmer Kyle Mitchell* share the ways they experience God and faith in their vocations of hospitality, cooking, farming, and husbandry. Accompanying them on this exploration is *Dr. Kate Giloolly, St. Luke's, Cleveland* who recently finished her Doctor of Ministry degree at Bexley Seabury Seminary.

Worship is an important part of every Convocation — *Bishop Hollingsworth* will offer two prerecorded sermons — one for Sunday, February 7, and one for Sunday, February 14. All parishes are invited to incorporate these sermons into their online offerings for those two Sundays. These sermons, and our shared experiences of them, will kick off and wrap up the Convocation.


