# FROM THE WARDENS VESTRY UPDATE

We recently marked a full year of virtual Vestry meetings as we welcomed our new members and discussed the themes and plans for the coming year at our February retreat. While reflecting on the last year, we continue to work towards a post-pandemic future for the church. Our goals include a revised long-term plan for engagement, communications, and financial stability which utilizes both our work from the 2019 parish planning sessions and the lessons we have learned during the pandemic. Much of this work will continue through several newer committees, including the Engagement and Communications Committee and the Long-Term Financial Planning Committee.

Recently, the Vestry approved a motion to donate to local COVID-19 relief. Given the broad range of heightened local needs due to the pandemic and the parish's desire for continued outreach, we felt compelled to share some of our blessings with the local community in this time of need.

We all long to return to in-person gatherings, both in our daily lives and at St. Paul's. The staff, clergy, Vestry, and Regathering Task Force have been busy making plans for regathering in person. Our return to normal worship will be phased in over time, so as to maintain safety for all. Plans are coming together for outdoor worship as well as eventual indoor worship, and online service offerings will remain an enduring part of our future. As case numbers decrease and vaccination rates improve, safe regathering appears to be on the horizon. Stay tuned for more detailed information — we can't wait to see you in person!

## A MESSAGE FROM OUR RECTOR

# LEARNING TO LOVE



Anne Hillman, who studies the internal aspects of social change, offers these words:

We look with uncertainty  
beyond the old choices for  
clear-cut answers  
to a softer, more permeable aliveness  
which is every moment  
at the brink of death;  
for something new is being born in us  
if we but let it.  
We stand at a new doorway,  
awaiting that which comes...  
daring to be human creatures,  
vulnerable to the beauty of existence.  
Learning to love.

The days are longer. The skies are brighter. The temperatures are warmer. I see crocuses on my walks. We are emerging from a long, dark winter.

The toll from COVID-19 is heartbreaking — an unimaginable number of lives lost, and with grieving constrained by the absence of our traditional rites of passage. These rites speak to us in deep and meaningful ways; we need to acknowledge the heartbreak and support one another through the necessary grieving. Might we then allow the past year to inspire our actions in the coming year? "...for something new is being born to us, if we but let it." The Easter Season is the celebration of new life, ever-present, ever informed by the past. How might we learn from the past year to live more fully this coming year?

In a recent discussion between Archbishop of Canterbury Justin Welby and Presiding Bishop Michael Curry, Archbishop Welby talked about the Christian commitment to reimagining how we live together in love. Bishop Curry noted that love is not naïve. Hurting each other is naïve. Hurting one another breaks the bonds of humanity offered to us by God for living fully in the breath-taking, complex, wonders of life.

Love is not naïve. Love is the purpose of life: sacrificial love in the interest of others' well-being. The priority of love is clearer after a year that disrupted and confronted our lives. Coming off a season of darkness and in the light of the resurrection, how might we reimagine how we live together in Christ's love? In what areas of our life, and in what ways do we need to learn how to love?

Someday, after mastering the winds,  
the waves, the tides, and gravity,  
we shall begin to harness the energies of Love,  
and then, for a second time  
in the history of the world,  
humanity will have discovered Fire.

## The Sunday of the Passion: Palm Sunday

Celebration of the Holy Eucharist

*Sunday, March 28, available beginning at 7 a.m.*

A pre-recorded service — including the Liturgy of the Palms, a dramatic reading of the Passion Gospel, and Holy Communion — will be available on our YouTube channel and Facebook page.

Outdoor Liturgy of the Palms

*Sunday, March 28, 11:15 a.m. on the front lawn of St. Paul's*

We'll gather for a brief outdoor observance of the Blessing of the Palms and conclude with a carillon rendition of the hymn, "All glory, laud and honor." Worshippers can then grab a Holy Week bag (see above) then return home to view the remainder of the service online. Standard safety protocols, including masks and social distancing, will be observed.

## Maundy Thursday

The Proper Liturgy for Maundy Thursday

*Thursday, April 1, 7:30 p.m.*

On this holy night, we recall two central events in the last week of Jesus' life: his giving of a new commandment to love others as he has loved us, and the institution of the Eucharist. Both of these events took place in an intimate domestic gathering between Jesus and his friends after a meal. In that spirit, instead of offering a pre-recorded service from the church, we'll gather from our homes — clergy included — for the Proper Liturgy for Maundy Thursday with a celebration of the Holy Eucharist, complete with musical offerings.



## Good Friday

Ecumenical "Seven Last Sayings" Service  
*Friday, April 2, available beginning at 12 p.m.*

Our traditional Good Friday ecumenical service recalls the "seven last sayings of Christ from the cross" with homilies on each of the last sayings. The Rev. Jessie Gutsell Dodson will be joined by homilists from six neighboring churches: Church of the Saviour, United Methodist; Plymouth Church United Church of Christ; First Baptist Church of Greater Cleveland; Forest Hill Presbyterian Church; Peace Lutheran Church; and the Church of St. Dominic, Roman Catholic. Karel will offer excerpts from "The Seven Last Words of Our Savior on the Cross" by Joseph Haydn as organ meditations between each homily. Join us on our YouTube channel.

Music for Holy Week  
*Friday, April 2, available beginning at 3 p.m.*

Enjoy the transcendent beauty of sacred music while contemplating the mysteries of Holy Week. Soprano Natasha Simmons and St. Paul's organist Karel Paukert will offer works by J.S. Bach, M. Reger, J. Alain, and the song cycle *Miroir de Peine* (Mirror of Pain) by Hendrik Andriessen based on the poems of Henri Ghéon. These musical meditations will be available on our YouTube channel.

## Holy Saturday

The Proper Liturgy for Holy Saturday

Join us on Zoom for this brief service which recalls the day when the crucified Christ's body lay in the tomb of Joseph of Arimathea.

*Saturday, April 3, 7 p.m.*




## Austin Channing Brown

In Conversation  
Sunday, May 23, 4 p.m.

St. Paul’s Episcopal, Fairmount Presbyterian, Plymouth United Church of Christ, St. Mark’s Presbyterian, and Church of The Saviour United

Methodist Church are thrilled to partner together to host Austin Channing Brown for a virtual conversation on Sunday, May 23, at 4 p.m.

Austin Channing Brown is a media producer, author, and speaker providing inspired leadership on racial justice in America. She is the *New York Times* and *USA Today* bestselling author of *I’m Still Here: Black Dignity in a World Made for Whiteness*. By using an intentional mix of humor, pop-culture, storytelling, and audience engagement, she awakens people to the current realities of systemic racism and the everyday actions which make it possible.



To deepen our experience of her visit, we will be coordinating small groups to discuss her book *I’m Still Here*. There will be two sessions before Brown’s visit, and one session after, all taking place in break-out rooms on Zoom. Break-out groups will each have 7-10 participants and two facilitators. We’re encouraging participants to commit to one group for all three sessions so they can build relationships.



## RITE 13

# A RITE OF PASSAGE LITURGY

During the Sunday Worship Service on Sunday, April 25th, we will celebrate an important rite of passage with our 7th and 8th graders. This special liturgy, called Rite 13, is a way to show our young people encouragement that we have meant to convey all along – words like: “We stand with you as you make your way on your journey; we’re here when you need us; we think you’re terrific; and we love you.” We often assume our teens feel appreciated and accepted as a vital part of our parish, but adolescence can be such a time of uncertainty that some things just can’t be said enough. The Rite 13 Liturgy is a rite of passage that recognizes the God-given gift of a young person’s journey to adulthood.

This is a free gift that we cannot earn and need not prove. It becomes the essence of who we are, an energy that pushes us through adolescence and gives us the power to change the world. Don’t miss this priceless opportunity to pray for our young people and to affirm everything they have to offer.

### Workshop Adventures

# STAFF UPDATES

## Assistant Rector

I am delighted to share the good news that the Rev. John Kennedy will be joining our clergy team starting on April 16.

As I described in the Lent edition of *Parish Notes*, St. Paul's is an unusually active parish, with a breadth of ministries overseen by our clergy. In addition, we have the extensive pastoral needs and relationship opportunities that come with a large parish. Marge LoPresti, our Pastoral Care Associate, is near retirement. The time feels right to adjust our staffing with a new hire: an Assistant Rector who will be the clergy presence to children and youth ministries and will oversee our Adult Formation ministries.



John graduated from Berkeley Divinity School at Yale in May 2019 (Jessie and Brandon's alma mater). Since then, he has served as Associate Chaplain at Kent School in Kent, CT, an independent boarding school in keeping with the Episcopal Church for grades 9 through 12. Prior to attending seminary, he served as Interim Youth Director at St. Mark's Episcopal Church in New Canaan, CT. In addition to his involvement with Children, Youth and Adult Formation, John will share in presiding, preaching, and pastoral care with the rest of the clergy team.

John comes with excellent recommendations from both the Rev. Peter Walsh, Rector at St. Mark's, New Canaan, CT, and former Assistant Rector at St. Paul's, and the Rev. Dick Schell, recently-retired dean of Kent School and former Curate at the Church of the Holy Spirit in Lake Forest during my teenage years — a small world indeed.

Our clergy team is in place: Jessie Dodson oversees Pastoral Care, Newcomers and Congregational Engagement; Brandon oversees Liturgy and Outreach, and John will oversee Adult Formation and be the clergy presence to Children and Youth ministries.

My sincere thanks to the Search Committee for their time and discernment: Diane Banyard, Barbara Hoekstra, Kaneala Nelson, Eustacia Netzel-Hatcher, Tres Roeder, and Erin Wagner. I'm so grateful for their service.

## Director of Music

The final search to round out our staffing is for a Director of Music. After much reflection, research, and discussion, I have decided now is the right time for St. Paul's to hire a Director of Music. Fortunately, our beloved Karel Paukert wants to keep playing the organ and we are thrilled to have him! His new title will be Organist, Director of Music Emeritus.

The Director of Music will work in collaboration with Karel. This person will lead the Adult Choir and supervise the Director of Music for Children and Youth (Kelsey Ferguson), the Handbell Choir Director (Lois Bell) and the Carillonneur (David Osburn). I am seeking a Director of Music who has advanced ability in choral and instrumental conducting, has leadership, organization, and worship planning skills, and who is well-versed in the Episcopal Church's music, traditions, theology, and practices.

The job opening is posted on various websites: Diocese of Ohio, Consortium of Endowed Episcopal Parishes, Union of Black Episcopalians, Association of Anglican Musicians, American Choral Directors Association, and the American Guild of Organists. Our Search Committee represents our Children and Youth Choirs as well as our Adult Choir, and all are musicians: Jason Chance, Susan Gray, Mike Lyford, Julie Micheletti, Dave Mitchell, Nathaniel Powell, and Sandy Simon. I am grateful for the skills they bring to this search to ensure the continuation of our outstanding music program. I have received quite a few resumes, and interviews are underway. More to come!
