Update From Our Wardens

IRA gifts:

If you are over 70 1/2, you may be able to make a tax-free charitable gift directly from your IRA to St. Paul's and satisfy your annual required minimum distribution. The IRA charitable rollover became permanent in 2015 allowing donors to make direct contributions of up to \$100,000 per year to qualified charities.

All gifts must be postmarked on or before December 31 for your gift to count during this tax year.

Dear Parish Family,

Shortly after my mom died in October, Jessie gave me a wonderful book by Jan Richardson entitled *The Cure for Sorrow: A Book of Blessings for Times of Grief* (2016). I am savoring this book, slowly reading through it, taking in the peace offered through the words. Here is the ending to one of the blessings

But it's true,
you know.
You will move along
in ways you cannot see
from here,
cannot envision
even in the dreams
that make their way to you
through your most painful
nights.
I don't know how
to end this blessing.
I am still finding it
myself.
But I am here to tell you
there is grace—
my heart,
is there ever grace.
So keep your eyes open,
is all I'm saying.
Try not to miss it.

While these words are helpful to me in grieving my mom's death, I'm wondering if they might be helpful to all of us during this Advent Season over which bleakness hovers. December will be a holiday season unlike any we have ever known, with limited, subdued gatherings, and heartache from the loss of so many people from COVID in this country and around the world. The beautiful words from the Christmas carol based on a poem by Christina Rossetti seem more apt than ever:

Water like a stone
Snow had fallen
Snow on snow on snow
In the bleak midwinter
Long, long ago

But what happened in
that bleak midwinter
long, long ago?
Love, light and
hope came into the

us and that each
season, even each day
brings new life. Read
Richardson's blessing once
again....



There is grace, ever there is grace. So, let us keep our eyes open. Where might we see the grace? In the beauty of the snow falling lightly to the earth, in the festive lights, in the music that moves our souls, in the gift of love, light, and hope...with eyes and hearts open, we will see.

Along with the Staff, I have enjoyed getting to know Nathaniel. We're so glad he has joined the team!






The Longest Night

Sunday, December 21, 7 p.m.

There's an Advent tradition within Western Christianity of inviting people to come together around the time of the winter solstice, when there are more hours of darkness than light. Also known as "Blue Christmas," a Longest Night Gathering is a safe and sacred space to share anguish, to plead with God to remember us, to pray for justice and restoration, even to hope against hope, through our doubts and tears and fears, that "God will set things right all over the earth."

This year, as in years past, St. Paul's will partner with The Church of the Savior to hold this service. We will gather online at cotsumc.org/live

What's a YouTube Premiere?

To be together as a virtual congregation, we will use the YouTube Premiere feature for some of our online services and events this Advent and Christmas. Premieres are like a live stream but for a traditional YouTube video.

We pre-record and upload, as usual, but set a specific time for the first showing. As a viewer, all you have to do is tune in when the video starts. You can even set a reminder to be notified when it does. There will be a two-minute countdown before the video starts, giving everyone a chance to sit down first.

While one of our services is premiering, you'll be to chat, add your own intercession for others to pray with you, and even send an Amen.

- You can still bake cookies. Please package in snack size Ziploc baggies and deliver to the church office by noon on December 14th.

- Donate the actual bags. While we usually use plastic grocery bags, it would be a nice touch to have fabric for Christmas. They should be new bags, reusable grocery size, holiday colors. We need 40. On Saturday morning, the first virtual convention of The Diocese of Ohio began promptly at 9 a.m. on ZOOM. This “location” for a convention provided excellent audio and visual perception. It is a little like watching television, but a bit more interactive. There are a lot of learning curves involved with this type of convention, and today was no exception. I think the experience provided a profound picture of the range of technology experience across the board for everyone involved today. There were a few glitches along the way — but that also happens in person! The level of patience was evident as well. The level of support behind the scenes was, I am certain, extensive, and that resulted in a good experience conducting the business of the people in our Diocese.



Worship:

This was the biggest loss in today’s convention. Understandable in the need to move on without it, I really enjoy the union of attendees at the Convention Worship service

each year. The convention began with a virtual choir, of choristers from around the Diocese, with organ music from St. Paul’s Karel Paukert, and, while it was meaningful and very well done, it was not a hymn that says “Episcopalian.”

Presentations:

The Most Reverend Michael B. Curry, Presiding Bishop of The Episcopal Church, gave a welcome address in which he remembered the “profound need for God” during this time, and the reinforcement of our Diocesan message to “Love God, Love Your Neighbor, and Change the World.”

The Rev. Gay Jennings, President of the House of Deputies, shared thoughts about governance in our church, reminding us of the way we all have a voice when we participate in this governance of holy work.

The Right Reverend Mark Hollingworth, Jr, gave his address prior to lunch. His major points were:

- Like all of us, the question “where do we go from here” looms in the focus of our minds.
- There are difficult decisions being made.
- The need to take extreme measures now to prevent extreme consequences later is diocesan wide.
- Seek justice, love kindness, and walk humbly with your God.
- Love your neighbor as much as you love yourself.
- Live within the context of the present time and place. Here am I, God.

Voting:

We used a voting program called TurningPoint, and it was well explained and easy to use. Gone are the long stretches of time waiting for results, as quickly saw the results with beautiful graphs. Most ballots were uncontested, and the only time we needed a second ballot was to break a tie for the ranking order of General Convention Alternate Delegates (that determines the one for whom expenses would be paid). This goes really fast sometimes, and it can be a little intimidating. Amendments to amendments to a motion are undeniably challenging to even the most experienced parliamentarian. We are fortunate to have excellent parliamentary experience leading the way.

A new Regional Disciplinary Board was approved, with one lay and one clergy representative for each of six contiguous Dioceses: Northwestern Pennsylvania, Ohio, Pittsburgh, Southern Ohio, West Virginia and Western New York.

The Commission on Racial Understanding was renamed the Commission for Racial Justice.

Adjournment:

The convention adjourned shortly before 1:00 p.m. — a most considerable advantage to virtual conventions!
