In, with, among, under and above everything we do, the certain plan is to be and share the love and grace of God. Everything else is likely a function of "method for the key moment". Deacon Hahn invited us on several occasions to "sit with the tension" of one consideration or another. Such a difficult task in a life that is so relentlessly shaped by demands for immediate resolution in everything.

On Tuesday this week, the speaker at the TMC Chaplains' Brown Bag Lunch offered a quote that sings. It is a choice gem from Leonard J. Swidler, Professor of Catholic Thought and Interreligious Dialogue at Temple University, Philadelphia, Pennsylvania.

The primary purpose of dialogue is to learn, that is, to change and grow in the perception and understanding of reality, and then to act accordingly.

Change. Grow. Act.

These are exactly the themes of our summer sermons; the study of Richard Rohr teachings on the spiritual life; and our collaboration through the lens of the Strengths Finder assessment. No one in our community of members and "regulars" is outside the ring of dialogue and learning. We are about to engage the ONE-ness we share in Christ through the power of the Holy Spirit.
