5 Star Giving Celebrations

Like the 5 points that make up a 5 pointed star, there are 5 channels of mission giving through which individual United Methodist Women and groups can participate

Pledge to Mission- An individual member's pledge to mission is the amount she decides is her share of the local unit's budget.

Special Mission Recognition A gift to mission in honor of any person in amounts of \$40, \$60, \$100 and up. For each gift an oval gold pin with a cross and a certificate with the names of the honoree and the giver are provided by the National Office of UMW through the conference treasurer.

Gift to Mission (minimum \$5)- A gift of \$5 or more for mission may be made in honor of any individual, and a card will be provided for you to send to the honoree.

Gift in Memory (minimum \$5)- Gifts may be made in memory of any individual, in the amount of \$5 or more. Gift in Memory cards, available free, will be provided to send to the family of the deceased.

World Thank Offering- Spontaneous additional gifts can be given in gratitude for God's abundance and in celebration of the joys of life. This is an opportunity to respond to God's grace one time or collect coins throughout the year.

In 2022, West District UMW began a new unit recognition program which replaces the Mission Today awards that are no longer given by United Methodist Women. We know that all our units are Bright Stars in their churches and their communities, and we want to recognize that. This year, we are including the units that responded for our Bright Star request, but we hope in the future, all our units will respond and be recognized. Listed below are the units to be recognized and a summary of their 2020 projects and missions.

Elizabethtown St Pauls' UMW – The Needlework Circle made and distributed 25 quilts, 54 pocket prayer quilts, and 85 masks. When possible, the group would meet as a small group and would socially distance, but most of the work was done in their homes. Also, St Pauls' UMW donated 92 maternity kits, boxes of fabric and hygiene kits to Mission Central. The American Foundation for Children with Aids, an organization who ministers to families and children in Kenya, was also supported by UMW. St Pauls' continued to participate in the UMW reading program by creating a book exchange and book check outs at church to allow the members to continue to read.

Faith Acts, Palmyra First UMW – A Month of Thankfulness, a Call to Prayer and Self-denial, and a 4-week plan for individual devotions helped to provide Spiritual Growth for their members. The unit met monthly through Zoom and frequent emails. Cards were sent to older members and friends living alone and Christmas mugs were delivered to the homebound members. Treats and notes of appreciation were sent to health care workers and first responders. The Knit Crochet and Pray subgroup made a "Women Knitted Together in God's Good Work" wall hanging/lap robe. Luggage was donated to a domestic violence agency and the TEA reading group discussed The Same Sky to gain a perspective on teen migrants. The unit collected 500 baby/winter items for Lebanon Family health and continued to support UMW through Mission Giving.

Bird in Hand UMW – Because they were not able to meet in person, phone calls and cards and notes of encouragement were shared with each other. Food, soup and bags with kitchen supplies were collected for Conestoga Valley Christian Ministries, Paper products were given to Clare House during the year. The UMW contributed financial aid to help with medical expenses for a church member. And several UMW members set up a craft table in December for homemade gifts for "safe shopping". Using "Jars of Gratitude, funds were collected for UMW's World Thank offering and shoe boxes were filled for children and donated to Samaritan's purse,

Grandview UMW – The Diaper Depot collected 2070 diapers and other items for three Lancaster organizations. The Undie Sunday collection received 511 undies and the Sock It to Me Sunday received 531 pairs of socks for donation to the Food Hub. The Steller Stitchers made and gave 13 prayer shawls and 3 baby blankets. Grandview's sale of Fair-Trade goods continues to receive Top Performer awards and all new members were recipients of Fair Trade gifts. Dorothy's Garden gave 631 pounds of fresh vegetables to the Food Hub, Because of environmental concerns, the UMW purchased a dishwasher so that the church could discontinue to use paper cups and plates. The Grandview readers met by Zoom and completed Level One of the UMW Reading program. To thank the many members and staff for all the work done to continue virtual worship, and continue our personal connection, 24 Mission Recognition pins were presented. Contributions were made to Lumina, Impact Missions, Power Packs and Shalom partnership.

Mission Education Report Mission u

Mission u is an educational event each year to provide Spiritual Growth, Geographic, and Social Justice Issue studies. The three studies for 2021 were:

“Finding Peace in the Midst of Anxieties”; “Bearing Witness in the Kin-dom”; and “Pushout: The Criminalization of Black Girls in Schools.”

In 2021 the school was held virtually by ZOOM with various time options for persons to attend. There was a week-end schedule of 8 hours of study on Saturday and Sunday for “Pushout”; choices of times in the morning, afternoon and evening on Monday through Thursday for all three studies. The evaluations were very positive for this type of interactive learning. Other positives were: less expensive (each course was only \$25 and helping the air quality by not putting more carbon in the air with all of the travel by car to an onsite location.

In 2022 mission u will again be offered virtually with options for attending at various times. The study will focus on Luke 13. Look for future information about mission u to be held in late July.

JUSTICE ISSUES FOR 2020-2024

United Methodist Women are urged to work on two major justice issues for the present quadrennium of 2020-2024:

- (1) Climate Justice
- (2) The Pipeline from Schools to Prison especially for Black girls.

Climate Justice:

Present weather conditions world-wide resulting in floods, fires, record heat waves, air pollution, and contaminated water demands our immediate attention. These conditions and then decided to take some action. They studied about not only the causes, but possible ways that might bring about change and provide a more healthful and productive world. God created a “good” world and gave the stewardship of that world to humankind.

The group of women sponsored a Climate Fair with numerous booths providing information such as safe drinking water and unpolluted oceans and rivers; composting; planting trees to reduce carbon; electric vehicles with focus on school buses; bees and making of honey; recycling; and use of LED bulbs. I would Like to Thank each Member of the West District Conference for all the work you have done planning ingathering this year. If I let



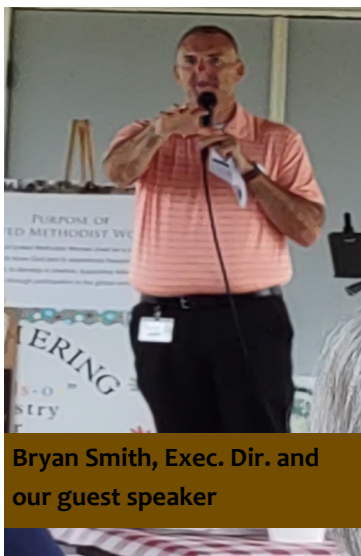
anyone out I'm sorry .

And they also urged car pooling and walking when possible.

Pipeline from Schools to Prison:

Racism is prevalent in schools as much as any place in society. This is especially true for Black girls. Statistics indicate that personal feelings of worth and opportunities for good education are key components for persons to develop their potential and be contributing members of their communities. United Methodist Women provide resources for understanding the present adverse conditions that exist, especially for Black girls. There is also an emphasis on advocating to bring about change.

We can make a difference by reading and studying about present situations; supporting candidates who are committed to bring about justice in our school systems and communities; and sharing the information learned with others and inviting them to join in the pursuit of change.
