	In the time of King Herod, after Jesus was born in Bethlehem of Judea, wise men from the East came to Jerusalem, asking, "Where is the child who has been born king of the Jews? For we observed his star at its rising, and have come to pay him homage." When King Herod heard this, he was frightened, and all Jerusalem with him; and calling together all the chief priests and scribes of the people, he inquired of them where the Messiah was to be born. They told him, "In Bethlehem of Judea; for so it has been written by the prophet:	
	"And you, Bethlehem, in the land of Judah, are by no means least among the rulers of Judah; for from you shall come a ruler who is to shepherd my people Israel.' "	
	Then Herod secretly called for the wise men and learned from them the exact time when the star had appeared. Then he sent them to Bethlehem, saying, "Go and search diligently for the child; and when you have found him, bring me word so that I may also go and pay him homage." Monday, January 5 — Matthew 2:1–12

The story of the Magi begins with movement. They see a sign, ask questions, and set out on a journey without certainty of where it will lead. These outsiders—neither Jewish nor powerful—are drawn by wonder rather than certainty. Their faith is not fully formed, yet it is sincere enough to risk time, distance, and safety. Epiphany reminds us that God often reveals truth to those willing to seek, not to those who assume they already know. The Magi do not arrive with answers; they arrive with gifts and open hearts. Their journey teaches us that faith often begins not with clarity, but with holy curiosity.

- What questions or longings are drawing you toward God right now?
- Where might God be inviting you to take a step without having all the answers?
- **Prayer:** Seeking God, awaken my wonder. Give me courage to follow the signs you place before me, even when the path is unclear. Amen.

Tuesday, January 6 — Isaiah 60:1–6

Isaiah envisions nations streaming toward God's light, bearing gifts, drawn not by force but by radiance. This vision stands behind the story of the Magi—foreign seekers responding to a light they cannot ignore. God's glory is not confined to one people or place; it shines outward, inviting all to come and see.

Epiphany proclaims that God's light reaches farther than we expect. It disrupts our assumptions about who belongs and who is worthy. When we live as people of that light, our lives become beacons—quiet testimonies that God is still drawing the world toward hope.

- How have you experienced God's light reaching you from an unexpected place?
- In what ways might your life reflect God's welcoming light to others?
- **Prayer:** Radiant God, let your light rise within me. Use my life to reflect your hope so that others may find their way to you. Amen.

Wednesday, January 7 — Micah 5:2–5

Micah names Bethlehem—a small, overlooked place—as the birthplace of a ruler who will shepherd God's people in peace. This prophecy confronts our tendency to look for strength in power, size, or prestige. God's saving work begins not in palaces but in humility.

The contrast between Bethlehem and Herod's Jerusalem is stark. One represents fear and control; the other, trust and promise. Epiphany invites us to reconsider where we place our confidence and whose leadership we truly follow.

- Where are you tempted to seek security apart from God?
- How might humility reshape your understanding of strength?
- **Prayer:** Shepherding God, turn my heart away from false securities. Teach me to trust in your quiet, faithful presence. Amen.

Thursday, January 8 — Psalm 72:1–7, 10–14

This psalm describes a king whose reign brings justice, peace, and care for the poor. Unlike Herod, who clings to power through fear, this ruler governs through righteousness and compassion. Such a vision reshapes what it means to honor true authority.

Epiphany helps us discern the difference between power that dominates and power that serves. When we align ourselves with God's reign, our lives reflect justice, generosity, and mercy—signs of a kingdom that does not disappoint.

- What images of power shape your expectations of leadership?
- How can you participate in God's work of justice and compassion this week?
- **Prayer:** God of justice, shape my heart to reflect your reign. May my actions honor the kind of power that brings life and peace. Amen.

Friday, January 9 — Hebrews 11:1–3, 8–10

Faith, the writer of Hebrews reminds us, is trust in what is hoped for but not yet seen. Like Abraham, the Magi set out without knowing the destination, trusting that God would meet them along the way. Faith is not certainty; it is commitment.

Epiphany faith is a pilgrim faith—willing to move, to risk, to follow God beyond the familiar. Such faith believes that the journey itself shapes us, drawing us closer to the God who calls us forward.

- What step of faith feels risky but necessary for you right now?
- How might God be shaping you through the journey rather than the destination?
- **Prayer:** Faithful God, strengthen my trust in what I cannot yet see. Lead me onward as I seek your promises with hope and courage. Amen.

Saturday, January 10 — Romans 12:1–2

Paul urges believers to offer their lives as living sacrifices, transformed by renewed minds rather than shaped by the world's patterns. The Magi's journey ends with worship, but it does not leave them unchanged—they return home by a different road.

Epiphany invites us to consider how encountering Christ redirects our lives. Worship is not an ending but a beginning, sending us back into the world with new vision, new priorities, and renewed purpose.

- In what ways might God be calling you to travel "by another road" this year?
- How can worship shape your daily choices and commitments?
- **Prayer:** Transforming God, renew my mind and redirect my path. May my life be shaped by your truth and guided by your love. Amen.


