First Reading

Israel, why then do you complain that our God does not know your troubles or care if you suffer injustice? Our God, the everlasting God, the Creator of the farthest parts of the earth, never grows tired or weary. No one can fathom the depths of God's

understanding. God gives power to the faint and strength to the powerless. Even youths become exhausted and young ones give up, but they that wait upon the Lord shall renew their strength. They shall mount up with wings as eagles; they shall run and not be weary. They shall walk and grow faint."

A Litany of Hope

Psalm 121

One: I will lift up my eyes to the hills. From where does my help come?
Many: **Our help comes from God, who made heaven and earth.**
One: God who keeps you will not slumber, nor suffer your foot to be moved.
Many: **Behold, the Holy One who keeps Israel shall not slumber or sleep.**
One: The Almighty is your defender and the shade at your right hand.
Many: **The sun shall not hurt us by day or the moon by night.**
One: The Creator shall preserve you from all evil and care for your soul.
Many: **Thanks be to God, who preserves our going out and our coming in from this time forth, and for evermore.**

Second Reading

John 1: 1-14

In the beginning was the Word, and the Word was with God, and the Word was God. He was with God in the beginning. Through him all things were made; without him nothing was made that has been made. In him was life, and that life was the light of all mankind. The light shines in the darkness, and the darkness has not overcome it. There was a man sent from God whose name was John. He came as a witness to testify concerning that light, so that through him all might believe. He himself was not the light; he came only as a witness to the light. The true light that gives light to everyone was coming into the world. He was in the world, and though the world was made through him, the world did not recognize him. He came to that which was his own, but his own did not receive him. Yet to all who did receive him, to those who believed in his name, he gave the right to become children of God — children born not of natural descent, nor of human decision or a husband's will, but born of God. The Word became flesh and made his dwelling among us. We have seen his glory, the glory of the one and only Son, who came from the Father, full of grace and truth.

Meditation

A Litany of Remembering

One: This candle we light to remember those whom we have loved, and are now hid from our sight. We pause to remember them, their faces, their voices, and the memories that binds them to us in this season.
Many: **May God's eternal love surround them forever.**
(The first candle is lit during a moment of silence.)
One: This second candle we light to acknowledge the pain of loss; the loss of relationships, the loss of jobs, of former homes, of health. We pause to reflect on the pain of the past, for the present is not as we would have it be, and offer it to God, asking that the One who made us would redeem our suffering and heal our world.
Many: **Refresh, restore, and renew us, O Lord, and lead us into your future. We grasp your hands, and seek the embrace of your peace.**
(The second candle is lit during a moment of silence.)
One: This third candle we light to seek grace for ourselves this holy season time. We pause and remember our season of grief; the disbelief, the anger, the sense of being lost, the embrace by the family and friends who stood with us; we give thanks for all the support we have discovered, and for what we did not perceive.
Many: **On this darkest of days, we hold to the deep knowledge that dawn will come, and will always come.**
(The third candle is lit during a moment of silence.)
One: This fourth candle is lit to remember our faith, and the gift of hope which the Christmas story offers to us. Here we remember that God, who came to share our lives, our losses and our griefs, has promised us a place and time where pain and suffering will fall away.
Many: **We remember our Savior Jesus Christ, the Morning Star, who shows us the way that leads through pain to triumph and radiant life.**
(The fourth candle is lit during a moment of silence.)
